ONLY TWO FIRES DURING PAST WEEK

Only two fires were reported within the Kendrick Fire Protective District during the past week, according to State Fire Warden Norman Lewis. Lewis said that due to recent weather conditions the fire index has been way down, and blazes have been at a minimum for this time of year.

The two fires, one last Thursday at Lewiston; and one on Monday on the Andy Cox ranch, have been the only two.

That of last Thursday, near the Lewiston sewage disposal plant, burned about 30 acres of cheat grass and brush. Little damage resulted.

Monday's fire on American ridge was caused by an over-heated emergency brake on a truck hauling from a stubble field on the Andy Cox ranch. Firemen from the Kendrick station were dispatched, and had the 1 1/2-acre blaze under control within a few minutes. The blaze was just starting into a barley field when brought under control.

WEATHER "BLOWS HOT AND COLD"

Residents of this area, and particularly of the Potlatch River valley have had a wide variety of weather from which to choose over the past week.

Last Thursday was a "sizzler," with the thermometer recording a reading of 97 degrees.

Friday dawned cloudy and "muggy," and during the late evening a very brief thundershower arrived, but the humidity remained high.

Sometime Friday night it began to rain, and by mid-morning Saturday a total of .22 of an inch was recorded on gauges — and the temperature had fallen to a mere 77 degrees.

Sunday morning it was still cooler, and the reading for that day was 73 degrees, with just a trace of moisture falling during the early morning hours. Sunday was a beautiful day, and those who did any traveling reported air crystal-clear, and mountains visible for many, many miles.

Monday was cloudy and over-cast, with brief sunshine, and again a reading of 73 degrees.

Monday night the area was again visited by a thunderstorm, which brought the night temperature down to 58 degrees.

An Ohio State Supreme Court reporter, vacationing in Idaho, escaped injury Monday morning when his station wagon rolled over as he was attempting to pass a logging truck.

Paul Charles Bovey, 62, Columbus, Ohio, lost control of his new station wagon when it slid off the shoulder of State Highway 7, about five miles east of Kendrick. The vehicle dropped into a four-foot ditch and then rolled once, landing on its wheels. Damage was estimated at \$400.00.

CEDAR QUALITY TO GO ON RESEARCH

U. of I. Moscow — Although Western Red Cedar is a very popular wood, not much research has been done on its wood quality criteria. Hoping to correct the situation is James R. Crooks, University of Idaho, College of Forestry, research fellow from Arlington, Virginia.

"We hope to develop wood quality criteria for Western Red Cedar on which silviculture, management, genetics and marketing applications may be based," said Crooks.

Work on the three-year project began this spring at the university, sponsored by the U. S. Forest Service. Under the University of Idaho cooperative fellowship, Crooks will major in forest genetics and work toward a Ph. D. He received his bachelor's degree from the University of Florida in 1961.

LATAH COUNTY FAIR DATES SET

Moscow — It's fun to exhibit at the Latah County Fair, coming on September 13, 14 and 15. As an exhibitor you can show your prowess as a gardener — but share the fruits of agriculture with your neighbors.

If you follow a few simple rules you will probably win a prize — that is, if your exhibit is better than the next man's. If it isn't, then congratulate him and try to beat him next year. Let's start with fruit, and since the apple is king of fruits, let's discuss it first.

Usually apples are listed by variety (and five apples constitute an exhibit).

It says five fruits, and it means just five, so don't make it four or six. Be sure to leave the stem in. The judge will count against the exhibit if the stem is pulled out. The hole left by the stem makes an entrance for rot. It must be in perfect condition to win.

About vegetables — rules are not as well defined as on fruits. The judge will place them on uniformity, truthness to type, freedom from blemishes and defects, and on good edible qualities. Usually the premium book tells you to leave about one inch of tops on root-crop vegetables such as turnips, beets, carrots, parsnips, etc. If it does not, do so anyway.

Again — read the premium book and follow the rules for every type and kind of vegetable. The rules vary at each fair.

ROAD WORK BIDS BEING CALLED

Lewiston — "Bids are being called, to be opened Aug. 28," says Phillip Marsh, district engineer, "on two projects in the Kendrick area, and when completed they will provide a very good road system there."

The two projects are:

Southwick-Kendrick, known as Idaho Federal Aid Project No. S-4-771(3) in Nez Perce and Latah counties. This item is the construction of roadway, drainage structures and a roadmix bituminous surfacing on 6,559 miles, and seal coating of 6,896 miles of State Highway No. 7, Southwick toward Kendrick.

The oil mat is to be 22 feet in width. The project also includes some re-alignment of the present road, particularly at the top of the Waucher Gulch grade. Work is to be completed before September 1 of 1963.

The other project is the construction of a 141-foot long pedestrian walk on the Big Bear Creek bridge just east of Kendrick, on State Highway 42, known as Idaho Federal Aid Project No. S-4769(8) in Latah County. Work on this project is to be completed within 60 days.

Bids were called for on this same project last year, but rejected, as being too high.

HIGH SCHOOL WRITING CONTEST

The Ladies Auxiliary to the Veterans of Foreign Wars announced this week the opening of its 28th annual National High School Writing Contest. The topic will be, "What I Can Do For My Country."

The writing contest, begun in 1935, is intended to put before the student some of the problems of patriotism, citizenship or similar topic about which he or she must study and learn in order to write the essay.

During the last school year some 40,000 students wrote on the contest topic, "America the Beautiful — How Long Without Clean Water?"

The U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare supplied students with free kits of background

readings on water and the importance of pollution control, and awarded to each state winner a special certificate. Dr. Albert E. Burke, Cheshire, Conn., an authority on conservation and world affairs, served as chairman of the national judges.

Students in all public, private and parochial high schools are eligible to enter the contest. National prizes are: First, \$1,000 cash; second, \$500; third, \$250; fourth, \$100, and gold medals. There are 20 other cash awards for honorable mention. State and local contest winners receive additional Auxiliary awards which may vary with the community.

SMALL BANDS OF PRIMITIVE MEN LIVED IN IDAHO

Small, migrant bands of primitive men lived and hunted in southern Idaho as early as 10,000 years ago.

This fact was established in a report issued by the Idaho Bureau of Mines and Geology based on archaeological and geological research in the Browns Bench area, southwest of Twin Falls near the Idaho-Nevada border. Single copies of the report, titled "Primitive Man of Browns Bench — His Environment and His Record" may be obtained from the bureau at the University of Idaho.

Dr. Alfred L. Bowers of the University of Idaho and C. H. Savage of the Idaho Bureau of Mines wrote the report illustrated by photos and drawings of some of the 22,159 stone and pottery specimens recovered from the principal digging site.

Recovery of abundant stone artifacts of many types and ages and in various stages of completion establishes the region as an important artifact-working area of primitive man. With his rude economy, ancient man found in this locality an ample supply of raw materials suitable for shaping into useful implements.

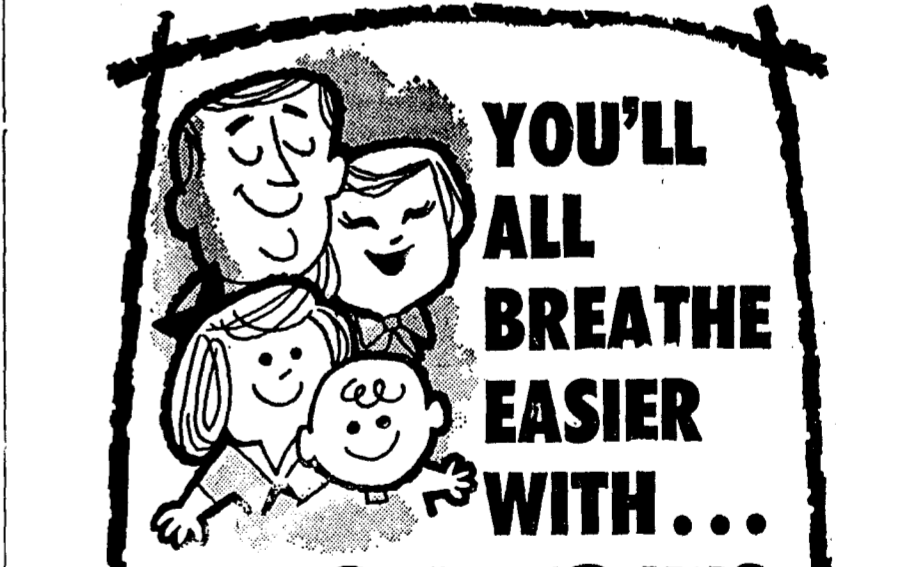

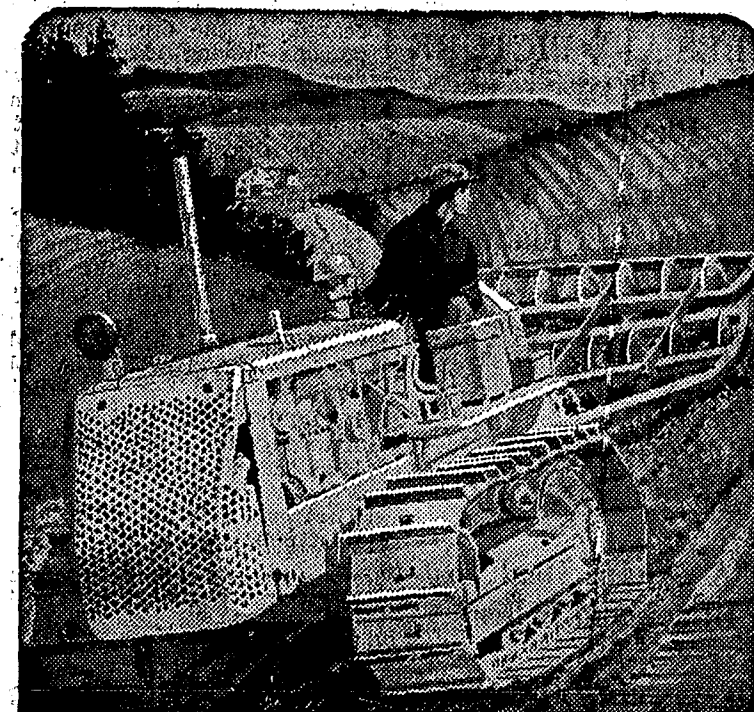
