## MRS. BRUCE WILSON KILLED IN CAR CRASH MONDAY

Orofino — Mrs. Esther M. (Bruce) Wilson, 51, Kendrick, was fatally injured at 4:25 p. m. Monday at Orofino in a collision with a 40-ton chip truck. Mrs. Wilson was pinned in the car but was quickly freed and was alive when she was removed. However, she died enroute to the hospital. The accident occurred on the Lewis & Clark Highway at its intersection with the Clearwater bridge leading into Orofino.

Officers said Mrs. Wilson had come out of Orofino in her 1955 Chevrolet and had stopped at the end of the bridge at a stop sign. She then pulled onto the Lewis & Clark Highway and was making a left turn to head east toward Kamiah. She pulled into the path of the 1960 Kenworth chip truck driven by Jerry Triplett, Kooskia, who had come from the Twin Feathers unit of Potlatch Forests, Inc., at Kamiah. Triplett blew his horn and applied his brakes, sliding 100 feet before the crash. At the same time he swung left to try to avoid the car. The truck went another 27 feet after the crash on the roadway and an additional 131 feet on the shoulder of the road and in the ditch, before turning over on its side in the ditch. The driver was uninjured.

The car also traveled 162 feet after the crash and turned end for end, but stopped on its wheels.

Lawrence Schilling, driving the second car behind Mrs. Wilson, turned back immediately into Orofino and notified the sheriff's office and city police, and arranged for an ambulance and a wrecker. The wrecker had to be used to pull the door of the car open and free Mrs. Wilson. She suffered multiple injuries. — Lewiston Tribune.

Further details are lacking at this time.

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## TWO FIRES ERUPT AS INDEX BEGINS TO CLIMB

Two fires, totaling nearly 250 acres in area, erupted in the Kendrick Fire Protective District over Sunday and Monday. High winds raised the "Burning Index" to more than 40 by Sunday afternoon.

A 240-plus-acre grass and brush fire was reported to the Kendrick District about mid-morning on Sunday. The blaze was reported about two miles above Lenore on the north side of the Clearwater River.

The fire was apparently set by a crawler tractor as it crossed a patch of rock. A spark from the tractor pad appeared to be the cause, Fire Warden Norman Lewis said.

Included in the brush and grass fire, two out-buildings were reported to have been destroyed. They were said to have had little value. To the fire went one pumper and seven men from Kendrick; one pumper and two men from Orofino, and 50 or 60 farmers were on hand to combat the blaze. It was still being closely watched late Monday.

On Monday, a 1/2-acre fire was reported on the grassy hillside below the Paul Supple ranch on the lower end of Little Bear ridge. The fire was controlled and extinguished by early afternoon by men from the Kendrick station.

Monday's fire was presumably man set, Lewis said.

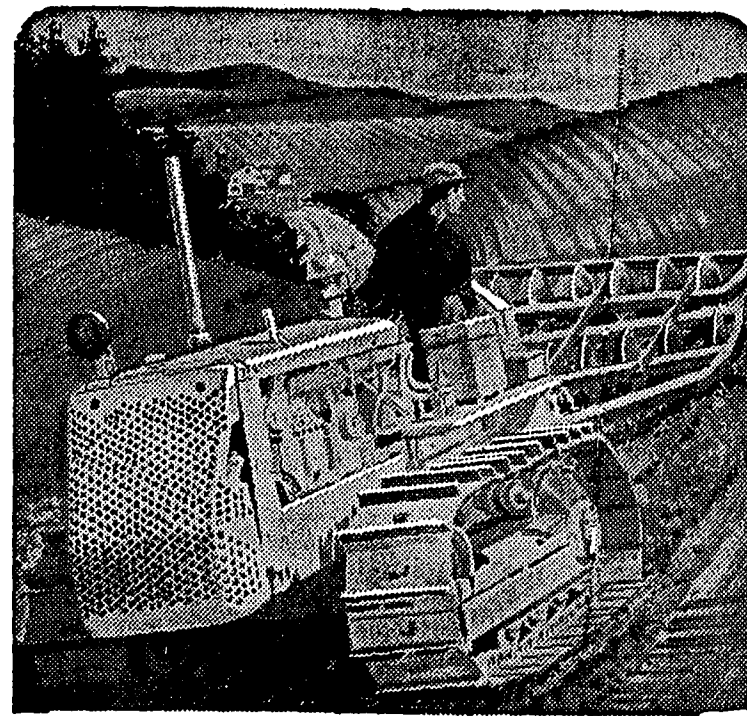
