District Maintenance Work

Maintenance work throughout the district was done during the summer as follows:
Juliaetta Elementary — The first grade room was painted with a citron base and off-white ceiling, and down to board level. The trim was painted a toffee color.

The third grade room was painted with an off-white ceiling and down to board level, and a pale peach on the base pattern. Here also the trim was a toffee color.

The girls' lavatory was painted a pale pastel pink with an off-white ceiling and down half-way on the walls. The trim was varnished.

The boys' lavatory was painted a pale yellow with the ceiling and half-way down the walls an off-white. The floor was painted a light gray. Several new fixtures were added to the boys' lavatory.

The kitchen and cafeteria were painted off-white, and cabinets white with the base painted with speckled paint. The floors through the building were cleaned and sealed.

The Juliaetta Fire Department burned the banks to the playground to insure fire safety for the area.
Southwick Elementary

A new water pump pipe into the well was installed, and a liquid level control put on the pump. With this level control it is hoped that adequate water pressure can be maintained at the school.

The front hallway in the school was repaired and painted, and all window casing painted. All the floors in the school were cleaned and sealed.
Kendrick Jr.-Sr. High

All floors were waxed and buffed. The gymnasium floor was sanded, remarked and sealed. Fourteen new lockers were added in the main hall and 20 new ones in the girls' dressing room.

Just west of the school approximately 500 yards of dirt was distributed on the area and this fall it is planned to level and seed the area for a playground.

Several new pieces of equipment

were purchased for the coming school year which included:

A wood lathe from Idaho Military Surplus; an Opaque projector received on Title III, also a tape recorder for use in the Juliaetta Elementary School.

Two buses were purchased, a new 48-passenger to replace the KB7, and a 1966 Chev. car (this latter Army surplus) to replace the 1950 Chev. car bus.

School Board Meets
The Joint District No. 283 school board held their regular meeting on August 14th. At the time bids, for stove oil, gasoline and coal were considered, as follows:

Union Oil Co. For gas at Southwick, \$2.79 per gallon, and at Kendrick, \$2.19. Stove oil, for 3,500 gallons, \$1.15. Was awarded the Stove Oil bid. Delivered at Southwick.

Mobil Oil Co. Submitted gas bid for 12,000 gallons at \$2.93 per gallon, and .1615 per gallon for stove oil. Was awarded the gas bid.

Nelson Truck and Fuel. Submitted and was awarded the coal bid at \$13.00 per ton for approximately 50 tons; to be delivered at the Juliaetta elementary school.

Deobald's Standard Oil. Submitted a gas bid of \$2.99 per gallon for 12,000 gallons, and .1594 for stove oil.

Medical coverage for pupils riding the school vehicles was raised from \$500.00 per person to \$1,000.00 per person. Magnuson Insurance Agency will handle the vehicle insurance for the coming year.

The majority of the school bus routes will be the same as the 1961-1962 (last year) term. There will be some minor changes but the families involved will be notified before school starts.

School hours will be the same as they were last year — with school starting on daylight saving time.

101 BUSHEL WHEAT CUT BY DENNERS

Dave and Don Denner of Kendrick and Juliaetta harvested a 101 bushel crop of Gaines Wheat off of 22 acres this past week.

Dave Denner said that the crop was grown on American Ridge, on green manure land, and the seed had been certified.

The crop was sown on September 15, 1961, and in March of this year 40 pounds per acre of nitrogen was applied to the ground. Seeding was done at the rate of 25 pounds per acre.

Denner said that other wheats had been averaging around 70 bushels per acre.

TOT SUFFERS DEEP BURNS SATURDAY

Janet Lewis, two-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Norman Lewis, received painful and serious burns over most of her body and one arm and hand, Saturday shortly after noon.

Janet moved backward, lost her balance and sat down in a "canner" of hot water, moments after it had been used for scalding chickens which her mother was dressing. Fortunately the water had cooled somewhat, and the burns upon her hand and arm were the only third degree ones.

She was rushed by her father to the Gritman Memorial Hospital at Moscow. As of Tuesday her doctor reports that she is in good shape and doing well. However, she will be hospitalized for several more days. Her mother is with her at the hospital.

FIRE RAVAGES SOME 800 ACRES SATURDAY - SUNDAY; LOSS HIGH

Gusty winds fanned a combine-set fire on Saturday afternoon that scorched more than 800 acres before it was brought under control early Sunday evening.

Two homes, several barns and sheds, a new combine and nearly 100 acres of crops were destroyed during the 30-hour blaze that raged out of control from time to time Saturday and Sunday.

The fire started on the Herman Renfrow property on Little Bear ridge, when a new combine caught fire from causes unknown. The fire quickly spread throughout the combine, destroying it, and fanned by a high wind raced down over the edge of the canyon and toward Big Bear ridge.

Pearl Hazeltine, whose home and contents was lost to the blaze said that he witnessed the fire from its beginning, and said, "I knew it was coming our way across the canyon, and was coming down the hill faster than a man could run!"

Hazeltine said that he immediately unhooked his equipment and began plowing fire breaks to protect the land on the top of the hill.

By early evening the inferno had reached the rim of Big Bear ridge and had begun working into the fields of Herman Hinrichs, Pearl Hazeltine, Henry Lien, Homer Emmett and Edwin Forest. The blaze burned to the edge of the property of Alex Larson and Oscar Slind, however, no crops were lost by the latter, due to the presence of bean and summer fallow fields.

As the fire raced up the Big Bear Ridge side late Saturday, it consumed all of the buildings on the William Bamberry ranch. The cattle on the bench at the time were all saved, having been driven into a green alfalfa field.

As the fire raged across the edge of the canyon, it consumed the Pearl Hazeltine home and all of its contents; burned several of their buildings, and burned the buildings surrounding the Henry Lien home, leaving the house, through the efforts of five men, who back-fired around it and thus saved it. Mr. Lien also lost his tractor and other machinery.

The Herman Hinrichs home caught fire several times, but by chopping portions of the house away, it was saved. A total acreage of crops lost is not known at this time, and no total estimate of damage has been compiled as yet, as least so far as we have been able to learn.

By early Sunday afternoon the wind again whipped the fire across established lines, and started down the canyon toward Kendrick. It was feared for a time that the Albert Westendahl home, near the foot of McCloud Gulch, might be in danger, and the Kendrick fire truck was dispatched to the scene. However, newly established fire lines some 200 yards distant from the home, held.

State Forester Norman Lewis said that when efforts to stop the blaze, as it raced down the slopes of Little Bear ridge failed, he called for "Borate" (a chemical fire retardant) to be used. He said that turbulences were so great that he was notified the planes could not get off the runway at Lewiston — and if they had been able to become airborne, they would have had to drop the borate from such an altitude that it would not have been very effective, if at all.

About 4:30 p. m. Sunday a light rain began to fall, and the fire lines held. A fire guard was set up Sunday night by the weary firefighters, and mopping operations began Monday morning, and were still going on Tuesday afternoon when another light rain fell.

The local Forestry department was assisted in the fight by a truck-pumper from Deary; one from Troy and one from Genesee — plus farmers with tractors, plows, discs, and many other types of equipment. The Mead & Howard Lumber Co. at Kendrick had a big dozer and a crew in the fight, as did the Rausch Lumber Co. of Troy.

Mr. Lewis extends his sincere appreciation and thanks to everyone who assisted.

DR. WEGNER'S BODY FOUND IN LAKE PEND OREILLE MON.

Spokane — The body of a Spokane dentist, who had been reported missing Sunday afternoon, Aug. 19, was found by divers Monday, Aug. 20, in about 40 feet of water in Lake Pend Oreille, near a commercial resort at Bayview, Idaho.

Kootenai County Coroner Dr. William Wood of Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, said it appeared that Dr. Arthur H. Wegner, E17811 Apple Way, Spokane, slipped and fell into the lake Sunday morning while getting into his boat at the resort. No autopsy was held.

The search for Dr. Wegner started about 4 p. m. Sunday. Divers went to the lake when the victim's boat was found floating a short distance from the dock. His glasses were found on the dock. The search was halted a few hours later because of darkness.

The body was found after an hour's search Monday morning. Deputies said no one saw Dr. Wegner fall into the lake. He was last seen around 8 a. m. Sunday walking toward the dock where he had kept his boat for the past two years.

Dr. Wegner lived in his office building at Greenacres. He is survived by two sons, Dr. Elden A. Wegner of Greenacres, Wash., and Dr. Eugene A. Wegner of Seattle, Wash.; and four grandchildren. He is also survived by three brothers, Carl of Fairfield, Wash., Aug. F. of Kendrick, and Albert of Wenatchee, and one sister, Augusta Rogers of Moscow, Idaho. He was a member of the Lutheran Church and the American Dental Association.

Funeral services were held on Thursday, Aug. 23 from the Thornhill Chapel of the Valley, with Pastor Theodore Meske of Cameron officiating. Casket bearers were nephews of Dr. Wegner — Glen, Wayne and Vern Wegner of Kendrick; Werner Wegner of Fairfield; Kenneth Wegner of Wenatchee and Wilson Rogers of Moscow. Burial was in the Pines Cemetery in the Valley.

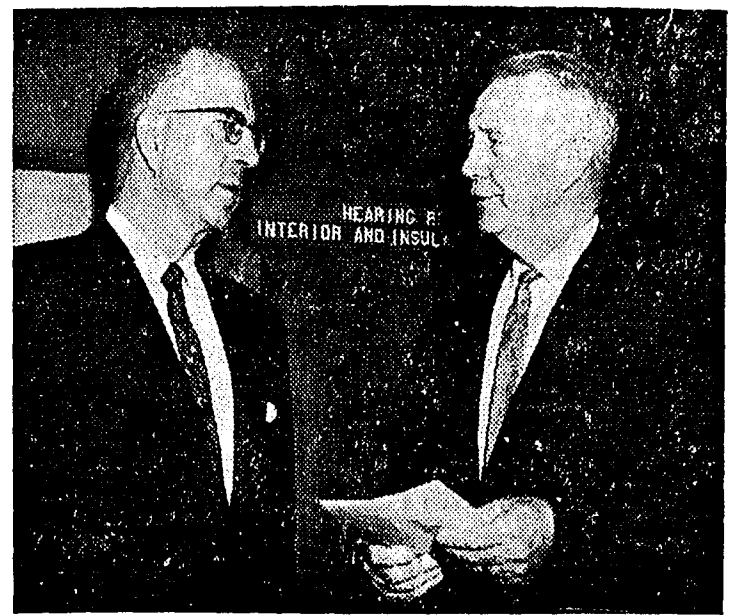

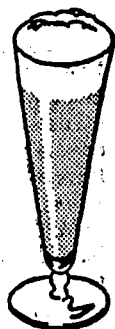

TAXES DUE

Boise — Internal Revenue officials remind truck owners that the federal highway use tax is due on August 31st. Revenues collected go into a highway trust fund created by Congress to help finance the government's interstate highway building program.

Highway use taxes on trucks range from \$81 to \$180 annually for each vehicle subject to the tax.

All trucks which are operating on public highways are subject to the tax. All trucks operating on public highways are subject to this tax if they meet certain unloaded weight and axle specifications and are registered by state law. Information booklets and return forms are available at all Internal Revenue service offices.

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33-1902 EXEMPTION FOR CAUSE. When a duly licensed physician or psychiatrist shall certify in writing that the physical or mental condition of a child is such that it does not permit attendance at school and upon a finding by the board of trustees that the best interests of the child or school will be served by exempting such child from the provisions of Section 33-1901, then the board of trustees may grant such exemption during the continuance of such disability. A petition for exemption for such cause may be initiated by the child or by its parent or guardian.

The board of trustees may also exempt from the provisions of Section 33-1901, any child who is an habitual truant or whose conduct is, in the judgment of the board of trustees, disruptive of school order and discipline and of the instructional effectiveness of the school. Before a child shall be exempted for such cause the board of trustees shall notify the parents or guardians of such child and afford them an opportunity to appear and show cause why such exemption should not be granted. Any child exempted for such cause shall be deemed to come under the purview of the youth rehabilitation law and the board of trustees shall notify the probate court of the county in which the child resides.

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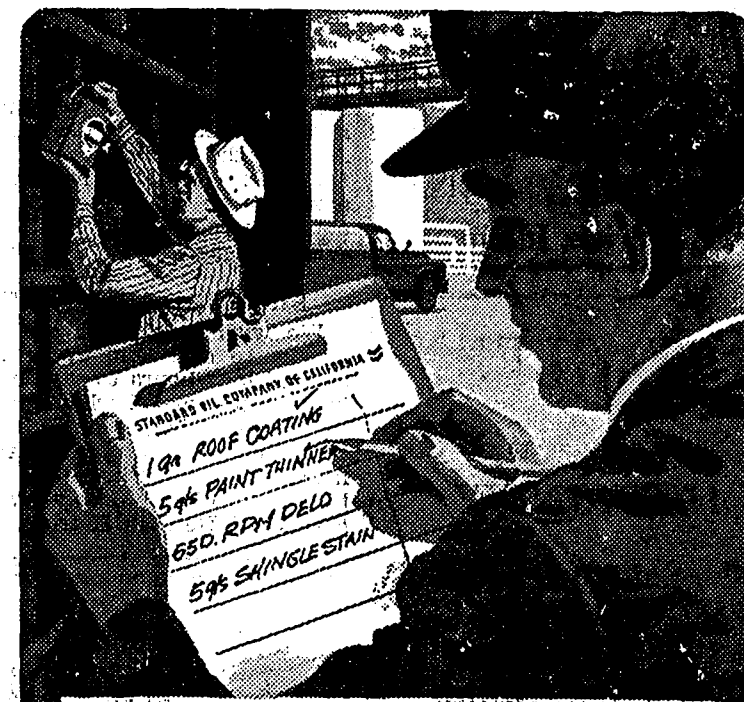
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
