

TIGERS BOW TO PIERCE IN 8-MAN SEASON OPENER

The Pierce Foresters shut out the Kendrick Tigers 26-0 at Pierce last Saturday afternoon in the opening District 2, eight-man high school football league game for both clubs. Pierce held a 20-0 lead at the half-way point.

Harry Stenzel scored first for the Foresters, breaking loose on a 20-yard run in the first quarter. He also ran the extra point. Pierce was back again before the first period ended as Lon Williams completed a 10-yard scoring pass to Joe Crawford. Stenzel ran over the conversion.

Williams got away on a 20-yard touchdown gallop in the second quarter and then broke loose for 75 yards in the third quarter for the final two Pierce touchdowns. Neither was converted.

The next game on tap for the Tigers will be played on home ground and will be this Friday night, at 7:30. At that time they will meet the Genesee Bulldogs.

The Genesee Bulldogs are favored for the contest, having 31 members out for practice, and also having dumped the Cullisac Wolves 46 to 6 this past week.

Leslie Mallory, 72, Deary, a retired woods foreman for Potlatch Forests, Inc., died Wednesday night, Sept. 5 at the Deaconess Hospital in Spokane. He had lived at Deary since 1916. He was born Sept. 30, 1889, at Elwell, Mich., and came to the Deary area in 1910. He retired from his P. F. I. position in 1954.

Mr. Mallory was a member of the Deary Odd Fellows; Moscow Elks Lodge, and Potlatch Forests White Pines Club.

BURNED-OVER AREA TO BE RE-SEEDING THIS FALL

Re-seeding of burned-over canyon land, blackened in the recent holocaust on Bear Creek, just north of Kendrick, is being planned by the land owners involved. Approximately 1,000 acres of timber and grassland were destroyed in the two-day blaze, as well as a great deal of personal property. There was almost a complete kill of timber and brush in the path of the fire, and there is apt to be very little re-growth of desirable grass because so much was charred. A layer of ashes and bare soil now makes an ideal seed bed for grass, and this is the opportunity to get some desirable vegetation underway.

The Soil Conservation personnel, who have been studying the burned area with some of the farmers, feel that airplane seeding of the grass should be done late this fall — possibly late October or November. The late season is considered best because it avoids the risk of early sprouting which possibly insufficient moisture to carry it into winter. Most successful seedings of this type have been made late in the year. The grasses considered as most adapted to the Bear Creek site are: Orchardgrass, Alta Fescue, and Crested Wheatgrass. Exact recommendations on the seeding mixture will be worked out soon.

Use of small-sized seeds is important in airplane seeding, to get the best possible germination. Also it is advantageous to have some good forage grasses, and also get some grasses in the mixture that will have a vigorous seedling, and provide soil protection for the watershed over a long period of time. It is planned to have a mixture of grasses that will take hold in both the areas of deep soil, as well as the dry, rocky sites, all of which are on steep slopes.

SETTING UP ROAD CAMP

Murphy Brothers Construction Co. of Spokane, successful bidder on the new Southwick-Kendrick link of the Ashaka-Kendrick highway, began last week-end the task of setting up a camp. They are locating it on what is known as "Woodchoppers Flat," a semi-level spot about half-way up the Wauncher Gulch grade.

We understand that they plan to begin work immediately, using as their starting point the Silflow farm near the Cameron Junction, and will work toward Kendrick. Considerable heavy equipment, including bulldozers carry-alls and Euclids has already arrived, and more is said to be on the way.

According to information available to us they will work this fall as long as the weather will permit, and resume again in the spring.

M&H BEGIN WORK ON NEW PLANER

Work began this week on a new planer operation at the Mead and Howard Lumber Co., Inc., plant in Juliaetta. The plant is to be erected on the site of the old Puckett Saw Mill.

Raymond Howard said that clearing away of the old mill has begun, and that work on a new green chain and planing shed would begin immediately. The new shed will be in the shape of an "H", with the main body to be 150x48 feet, and the arm extension will be 40x20 feet.

No date has been set for the completion of the new shed, but the new planer is already at the location, having arrived some two weeks ago.

At one time there had been some consideration given to having the new planer located in Kendrick adjacent to the Mead and Howard Mill. This, however, did not develop, and the location will remain in Juliaetta.

COMMUNITY DUMP AREA OUT OF HAND SO NEW RULES SET

The Community Project dumping area, south and east of Tschantz Bros. ranch, near Southwick, will have more stringent rules regarding its use, according to Gordon Peters, a member representing the group.

Peters said that many infractions of the rules of public dumping in the area had occurred, and that rules and regulations will be made more specific if the area is to remain open.

"One of the main infractions is the improper disposal of dead animals," Peters said. He added that state law prohibits the disposal of dead animals in an open dump area, and said that violators of this law will be prosecuted, as well as made to remove the carcasses. He also noted that persons are not conforming to the rules of the designated dumping area.

"There will be signs to direct people to the area allowed for dumping, and signs to show where it is prohibited," Peters stated. He also added that residents knowing of violations of these rules are to contact him at once.

People are urged to correctly use this dump area, and not take advantage of the Community Project which made it possible. Those who will not follow the rules, he added, will be subject to as severe a fine as the law will allow.

"Shall Section 3 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Idaho be amended so as to permit Chinese, and persons of Mongolian descent, not born in the United States, to vote, serve as jurors, or hold civil office?"

ATTORNEY GENERAL'S STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

This proposed amendment of the Idaho Constitution is designed to give naturalized Chinese citizens of the United States and other citizens of Mongolian descent, not born in the United States, the right to vote, to serve as jurors, and to hold civil office. Section 3 of Article VI of the Idaho Constitution, as now in effect, disqualifies certain persons from voting, serving as jurors or holding civil office and among those disqualified are "Chinese or persons of Mongolian descent not born in the United States".

The amendment, if approved, would delete that portion of the said section which prohibits naturalized Chinese citizens, and other citizens of Mongolian descent, from voting, serving as jurors, or holding civil office. Though identifying only Chinese, the proposed amendment would also apply to citizens of Japanese ancestry, and all other naturalized citizens of Mongolian descent, which, as stated, would enable them to vote, serve as jurors, or hold civil office on the same basis as other naturalized citizens.

Idaho is the only State with such discrimination against any naturalized citizen, and the Idaho State Legislature unanimously recommended that this question should be placed before the voters.

(S. J. R. NO. 6)

"Shall Section 2 of Article 6 of the Constitution of the State of Idaho be amended so as to declare every citizen of the United States, twenty-one years old, who has actually resided in this state for sixty days next preceding the day of the election, if registered as required by law, is a qualified elector for the sole purpose of voting for presidential electors?"

ATTORNEY GENERAL'S STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

This proposed amendment of the Idaho Constitution is designed to give all citizens who have actually resided in the state of Idaho for sixty days next preceding the day of election, and who are otherwise qualified, the right to vote for presidential electors. Section 2 of Article VI of the Idaho Constitution, as now in effect, provides that citizens in order to vote, shall have resided in the state for six months next preceding the day of elections. The amendment, if approved, would permit those citizens who have resided in the State for only sixty days to vote for presidential electors. The requirement that a citizen shall have been an actual resident for six months next preceding the general election would continue to apply in voting for all other officials.

(H. J. R. NO. 10)

"Shall the Constitution of the State of Idaho be amended by amending Section 2 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Idaho to delete the designation of probate courts and courts of Justices of the Peace as constitutional courts, but preserving the designation, as constitutional courts, of a court for the trial of impeachments, a supreme court and district courts, and preserving existing inferior courts until changed by law; to give the legislature the power, by law, to establish courts inferior to the supreme court and prescribe the jurisdiction of same; and to provide that the courts shall constitute a unified and integrated judicial system for administrative and supervision by the Supreme Court; by repealing Section 21 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Idaho to delete constitutional provisions relating to the jurisdiction of probate courts; by repealing Section 22 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Idaho to delete constitutional provisions relating to the jurisdiction of justices of the peace; and by amending Section 6 of Article 18 of the Constitution of the State of Idaho, as amended, to provide that the designation of a probate judge as a constitutional county officer shall continue until otherwise provided by the legislature, and to provide that a probate or other county judge may be a county officer if provided for by law?"

ATTORNEY GENERAL'S STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

This proposed amendment of the Idaho Constitution is designed to vest in the Legislature of the State of Idaho power to eliminate the probate courts and the courts of justices of the peace as constitutional courts and further, power to establish courts inferior to the Supreme Court and to prescribe the jurisdiction of such inferior courts which shall constitute a unified and integrated judicial system for administration and supervision

"The judicial power of the state shall be vested in a court for the trial of impeachments, a Supreme Court, district courts, probate courts, courts of justices of the peace, and such other courts inferior to the Supreme Court as may be established by law for any incorporated city or town."

The proposed amendment if adopted would change said Section 2 Article V to read thus:

"The judicial power of the state shall be vested in a court for the trial of impeachments, a Supreme Court, district courts, and such other courts inferior to the Supreme Court as established by the legislature. The courts shall constitute a unified and integrated judicial system for administration and supervision by the Supreme Court. The jurisdiction of such inferior courts shall be as prescribed by the legislature. Until provided by law, no changes shall be made in the jurisdiction or in the manner of the selection of judges of existing inferior courts."

The proposed amendment, if adopted, would also repeal Sections 21 and 22 of Article V of the Idaho Constitution which set out the jurisdiction of the probate courts and courts of justices of the peace respectively. Further, the proposed amendment would also amend Section 6 of Article 18, of the Idaho Constitution which Section specifies the various county officers. The probate judge is listed therein as a county officer; and the proposed amendment, if adopted, would provide that the probate judge would continue to be a county officer "until otherwise provided by the legislature" and that "a probate or other county judge may be a county officer if provided by law."

ACCIDENT CAUSES NUMEROUS

Boise — Right of way violations, following too closely, and speeding, in that order, lead the field in circumstances contributing to accidents.

Speeding, drunken driving, and stop sign violations, not necessarily in that order, are the top hazardous violations for which citations are issued by law enforcement officers.

The three violations which contribute to the most accidents are the most difficult to enforce unless they lead to crashes. For instance, a driver cannot "fail to yield the right of way" unless there is another vehicle nearby. When a careful driver avoids a collision with a vehicle whose driver fails to yield, there is seldom, if ever, a charge filed against the errant motorist.

By the same token, the driver who changes lanes, turns into a driveway or makes a left turn without signaling, isn't in trouble with another vehicle and seldom with the law unless there is a wreck. He is technically a violator and a careless driver whose sloppy habits indicate habitual violations "if he can get away with them."

It is almost impossible to charge a driver with following too closely unless he is involved in an accident or unless there is a complaining witness. While there are recommended distances between cars for safe driving, there are no statutory specifications. "Too close," almost always means that distance in which the car cannot be stopped before it hits the vehicle ahead.

Arrests for speeding, drunken driving or ignoring a stop sign are more often than not definite, and do not require the involvement of another vehicle for legal prosecution.

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
