WANT A SPECIAL LICENSE NUMBER?

Notice has been received from the office of the Latah county assessor to the effect that vehicle owners wishing to renew or request reserved numbers for license plates for 1963 may do so from now until November 23. Those having reserved numbers in the past have until October 31 to renew previous numbers. After that date those numbers will be given to the first one making the request until November 23.

All requests must be accompanied by the correct remittance for the year of the vehicle plus \$5.00 mailing fee for each set of plates also giving year, make and type (car, pickup or truck) of vehicle. Owners requesting plates for more than one of the same type vehicle should designate which number is to go on which vehicle.

Figuring costs is simple. The schedule is:

Passenger cars for years 1961, 1962 and 1963 models, \$17.50; 1959 and 1960 models, \$15.00; 1958 and 1957 models, \$12.50; 1956 and 1955 models, \$10.00; 1954 and older models, \$7.50.

Trucks: (Maximum weight 6,000 lbs., 1956 and older, \$10.00; 1957 and newer, \$17.50.)

Special numbers requested for trucks over 6,000 weight personal application must be made at the office of the assessor.

Persons with out of state titles wishing Idaho license plates should make personal application in the Assessor's office to be informed on the requirements and procedure.

WALKWAY UNDER CONSTRUCTION

The "Walkway" on the state highway bridge spanning Big Bear creek between the new High School and Kendrick is now under full construction, with Hansen Construction Co. of Spokane as the contractors.

KENDRICK F. F. A. PLACES FIRST IN LAND JUDGING

The Kendrick F. F. A. and their instructor, Doug Christensen, went to Moscow Saturday, where the team, composed of Harry Riley, Bruce Vincent and Fred Cope finished first in the annual land judging contest. Alternates going were Leonard Ekman and Charles Lackey.

Other schools competing and how they placed were: Lapwai, 2nd; Bonners Ferry, 3rd; then Genesee, Moscow and Troy.

Kirk Rush, Future Farmers of America instructor at Moscow High School, directed the contest, which tested the skills of the participants in such areas as judging depth of soil, water run-off, movement of air and water in the sub-soil, and in making recommendations about the possible treatment of the land.

This is the third first place win for the local Chapter, they having won two previous stook judging contests.

LOSSES HEAVY IN STATE TIMBER

"The State of Idaho is suffering tremendous losses of mature timber being killed by disease and insects", State Forester Roger Guernsey announced today. Guernsey headed a party of State Forestry officials who completed a three-day inspection of State timber sale areas in the Clearwater area last week. Accompanying the State Forester were Jack Gillette, Deputy State Forester, and Gordon Trombley, Assistant State Forester, from Coeur d'Alene, and Fred Kisabeth, Area Forester, and Cecil Aldrich, District Forester, both from Orofino.

The State Forester said that he and his forestry staff estimate that losses of state owned timber to disease and insects in the Clearwater and Floodwood areas alone will exceed 70 million board feet this year. "It could easily be 100 million feet or more", he said. The greatest current losses are the result of blister rust disease in white pine. "This loss is not only tremendous, but shocking, when you realize that it equals or exceeds the amount of timber we will sell this year in the same area", the Forester said. The Foresters estimate the loss in excess of \$1 million dollars for this year alone, and they expect equal or greater losses for several years to come. Guernsey said that the losses are so widespread that there is no hope of salvaging the bulk of the trees killed this year. He said "this would be so even if we had roads everywhere and the market was excellent, and neither of these conditions exists."

The State Forester reported that generally speaking the State's forest ownership in the Clearwater looks good where there has been logging. He stated that "most of the logged areas are covered with thrifty, reserved trees and reproduction or young growth, and these forests are alive, vigorous, and productive."

This is especially true of the areas logged during recent years since the State has hired professional foresters to plan and supervise timber sales. The unlogged timber stands, and especially the mature white pine stands, are a depressing sight to see. These stands are dying and wasting away, are losing value every day, and the once majestic green giants are turning into grey skeletons by the thousands."

The State Forester said the Forestry Department is considering a 2-pronged attack to minimize losses. "First, we know we could save great blocks of inaccessible white pine by spraying techniques perfected just during the last couple years. Secondly, such a mammoth spray project would need to be complimented by an all out effort to accelerate the harvest of timber by pushing road development and offering timber at attractive prices."

DEE MAGNUSON WINS SCHOLARSHIP

Dee Lynette Magnuson, a freshman at the University of Puget Sound in Tacoma, Wash., has been awarded one of 500 National Methodist Scholarships by the Board of Education of the Methodist Church. Dee is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert E. Magnuson, Kendrick.

National Methodist Scholarships cover tuition and fees up to \$400 and are granted on the basis of superior academic standing, leadership ability, participation in church affairs, character, personality and need.

Funds for the support of National Methodist Scholarships are received from local Methodist churches on the basis of a church-wide offering on Methodist Student Day, the second Sunday in June. These scholarships may only be used at accredited Methodist colleges.
