

## JAMES LOHMAN NARROWLY ESCAPES DEATH SUNDAY A. M.

James Lohman, Southwick, son of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Lohman, is reported as improving at St. Joseph's Hospital in Lewiston, following an early morning accident here Sunday, when his car struck a truck, flipped over and threw him into the street. The time of the crash was set at 3:00 o'clock Sunday morning, as near as could be determined.

Mr. Lohman, 25, suffered deep and severe head and facial cuts and shock.

Kendrick Marshal E. M. (Bill) White, who investigated, said Lohman's car flipped over and landed on its top after hitting a parked truck in the rear, and pushed it into a parked car, both on Kendrick's Main Street.

Lohman was traveling east, apparently at an excessive rate of speed, when he struck and pushed the truck into the car, both owned by Wm. Bamberg of Kendrick, and parked in front of the Kendrick Cleaners, White said.

The 1955 International truck, which was parked with the gears in compound, was spun sideways and pushed some 20 to 25 feet up the street, and then nose first across the sidewalk. It in turn jammed into the rear of Bamberg's 1954 Chrysler.

Lohman's car, a 1956 Chevrolet sedan, flipped over and landed on its top after striking the truck, and stopped in front of the Kendrick Fire Station.

Mr. Lohman was thrown from the car onto the pavement. Dr. D. A. Christensen was called, administered first aid, and then took him to the Lewiston hospital for surgery and treatment.

White said Lohman's car was damaged beyond practical repair. He estimated damage to Bamberg's truck, due to a sprung frame, at between \$400 and \$500, and to the Bamberg car at about \$300.

Mr. Lohman was alone in the car at the time of the crash.

Latest report, Tuesday, was to the effect that James was doing nicely now, and out of danger. How long he will be a hospital patient is not known at this time.

## WATCH FOR CATTLE GRUBS

Moscow — Cattle grubs that will cause loss of weight and unmarketable hides next year, should be controlled now.

To obtain the best possible results, users are urged to follow the manufacturer's recommendations as printed on the container.

Co-Ral, a product of Chemagro Corporation, and Ruelene, a product of Dow Chemical Co., can be used as a spray or in a dipping vat. In the stronger solutions both can be applied by the "Back Line Pour-On" method.

Another effective systemic insecticide is Trolene (Ronnel), also a product of Dow Chemical Co., which can be added to the animal's feed.

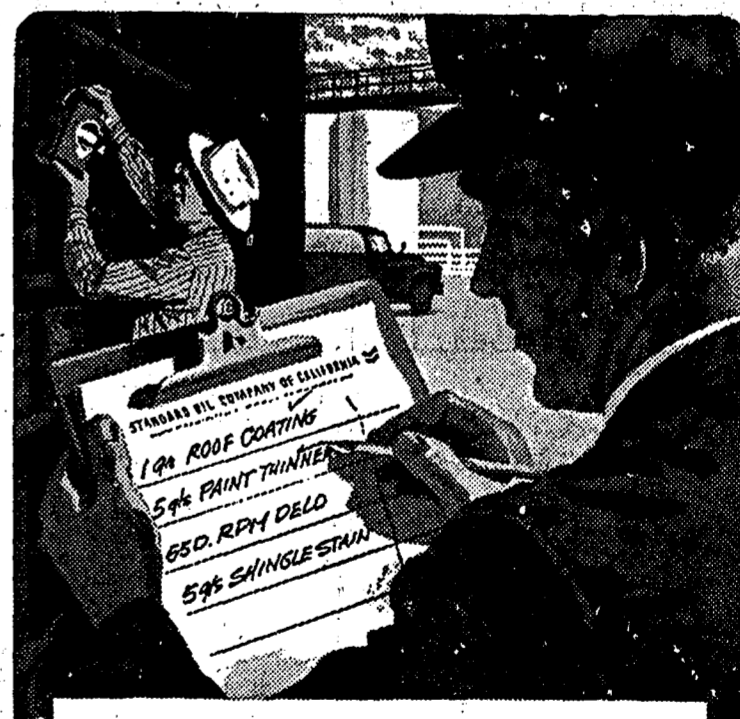
