## PLANNED PUBLIC MEETING OCT. 30 ON EDUCATION

Tuesday evening, October 30, Kendrick High School will be the spot for a joint meeting of the P. T. A., I. E. A., School Trustees, and the public. The planned meeting with the prospective legislators of Latah and Nez Perce counties, of this coming legislature, will begin at 7:30 p. m. — and it is hoped to have a real attendance.

The general purpose of the meeting is to permit candidate legislators to inform the public on issues coming up this session of the legislature. Questions the legislative candidates will talk on will be:

1. In their opinion what are the chief problems confronting our public schools.
2. Do you think we need more money for the education of our boys and girls.
3. Will you support the measures requiring the state to provide at least 50 percent of the cost of maintenance and operation of the public schools.
4. If you believe that more revenue is necessary for public education and other essential agencies of government, from what source should this come.
5. Who is going to "carry the ball" on these measures.

Each prospective legislator will be given time to speak on the above topics, for about 10 minutes. After all the legislative candidates have spoken there will be a question-and-answer period.

This meeting is open to the public, and it is hoped that everyone in the area will attend to meet the legislators, most of them candidates for office. It is believed that the session will be very informative and educational.

## J. G. (JACK) TRAVIS DIES OF HEART ATTACK OCT. 17

John G. (Jack) Travis, 80, a resident of the Southwick and Kendrick areas for nearly 40 years, died at his home here Wednesday, Oct. 17, at 12:25 p. m., of a heart attack.

Mr. Travis was born Oct. 6, 1882, at Mason City, Iowa. He spent his childhood there and in Nebraska. In 1906 he moved to North Dakota, and on March 23, 1907, he was united in marriage to Mabel Hagen at Botineau, North Dakota. She passed away on Dec. 6, 1960.

Mr. and Mrs. Travis moved to Canada in 1912, to Spokane in 1921, and the following year to Lewiston, and in 1924 to Southwick. Here they farmed, and Mr. Travis operated a truck as a sideline, also hauling mail from Southwick to Kendrick.

In 1944 the family moved to Kendrick, purchasing a home in the east part of town, and he began the operation of a furniture store, closing it out some 10 to 12 years ago.

For the last 10 years Mr. Travis had served as justice of the peace and police judge at Kendrick.

He was a member of the Kendrick Grange.

Survivors are his son, Herman, of Grangeville; five grandchildren, Mrs. Jim Jessup of Grangeville; Mrs. Everett Bryant of Cottonwood; Mrs. Ranford Russell of McCall; Don Travis, Lewis-Clark Normal School student, Lewiston, and Jim Travis of Kendrick, and seven great grandchildren. He is also survived by three sisters, Mrs. Mary Mills and Mrs. Elsie Impson, both in Florida, and a sister in Nebraska.

Final rites were held Saturday at 11:00 a. m. at the Kendrick Community Church, with the Rev. David Braun, pastor, officiating. Hymns were played by Mrs. Robert Magnuson.

The Kendrick Tigers broke a two-year losing streak which extended over 15 games Thursday afternoon of last week when they defeated the Prairie Pirates of Cottonwood 42 to 7 in a District 2 eight-man contest at Cottonwood. Kendrick didn't win a game all last season and lost its first six in a row this season.

Ross Magnuson scored on an 80-yard run on Kendrick's first play from scrimmage. Tom Thornton converted, to set the stage for the victory. In following play Thornton scored on a 20-yard run, Roger Nelson adding the extra point, and Doug Armitage scored on a 20-yard run, Magnuson converting, before Jerry Sonnen scored Prairie's only touchdown late in the first quarter. He also added the extra point.

The scoring pace slackened after the furious start and Kendrick added one touchdown in each of the last three periods.

Dean Brocke scored from two yards out, Magnuson converting in the second quarter. Thornton went 20 yards, with Rogers converting in the third; and Magnuson passed 80 yards to Fred Silfow and then ran the extra point in the last quarter.

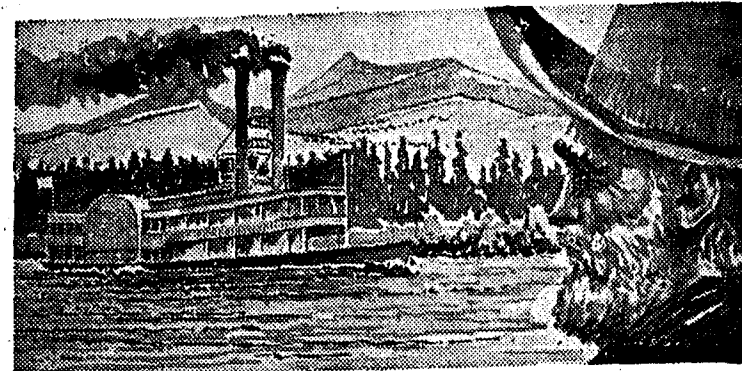

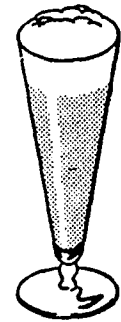

**TRIM EXCESS FAT FROM VENISON**

If you don't like the wild flavor of venison, trim off the fat. That's a suggestion from Mrs. Ruth J. Shane, Latah County Home Agent. With the opening of the big-game season, hunters are bringing in deer and elk. Housewives are turning their attention to cooking methods that will make the meat taste best.

"Game Cookery Guide" published by the University of Idaho Extension service is full of timely and useful suggestions. One tip is about "gamey" taste that some people find objectionable. "Always trim excess fat away before cooking," the booklet advises.

"The wild flavor is concentrated in venison fat. Bacon and salt pork can be used to replace this fat in different ways. Larding is inserting slivers of salt pork into the lean meat with an ice pick or skewer. Or you can grease the roast or fry since bacon is likely to be dry after cooking. The natural fat of venison solidifies easily. Serve it piping hot."

Cooking time depends on the animal's age and condition of the meat. Most people like venison well cooked, but it gets dry and flavorless if it is cooked too much.

When fat is added, ground venison is ideal for mincemeat, meat loaf, and casserole dishes. Deer and elk burgers are a tasty change from the beef variety. They are a fine way to make use of the less tender cuts.

The booklet also contains information on cooking duck, pheasant, and fish. There is a section on smoking fish and game. The guide was compiled in cooperation with the Idaho Fish and Wildlife Service.

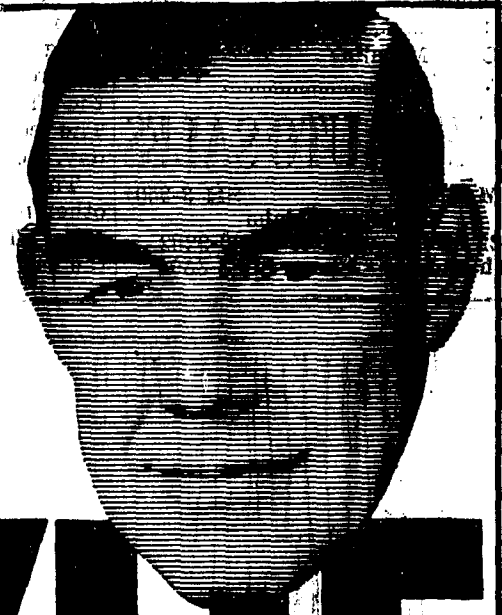

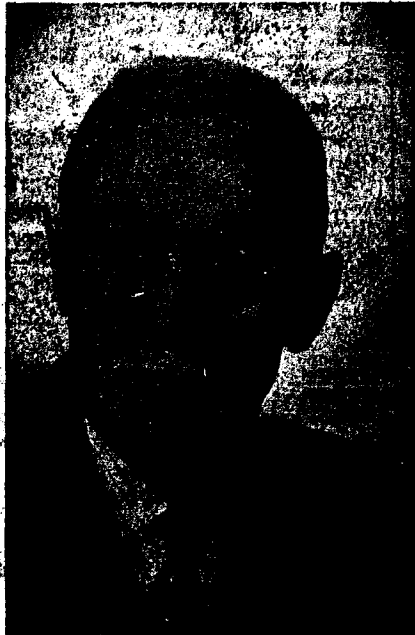

## IFY DELEGATE TELLS OF LIFE IN BRAZIL

U. of I. — The dairying business in Brazil is strange indeed, according to Carol Falk, Priest River, Idaho's International Farm Youth Exchange delegate.

In her latest report from Brazil, Carol tells of living with a host family owning a dairy. "Work begins before dawn with the milking of 20 cows by hand," she reports. "Some of the milk is separated by a hand-turned separator, but the majority is taken to a dairy by horse and cart every morning."

"The cows in Brazil are milked by first letting the calf nurse, then tying the hind legs together bringing the rope around, tying the calf to the front legs during the milking. The cows are milked only once a day," explains Carol.

The cattle feed is sugar cane and other plant (capim) similar to sugar cane. These are ground and fed to the cattle in hollowed-out logs. Dur-

ing the day the men cut the sugar cane and capim, and the oxen carry it to the corral to be ground the following morning, according to the IYYE delegate.

Transportation is always a problem in the back areas of Brazil, Carol reports. Maintaining education for children is difficult because of the lack of transportation. This lack also accounts for difficulty in organizing and continuing 4-S Clubs in Brazil. (Carol explains that 4-H Clubs are 4-S Clubs in Brazil because Head, Heart, Hand, and Health start with an "S" in Portuguese.)

Despite the difficulty, however, the Brazilian 4-S Clubs are living up to their symbol of "ProgreDir Sempre" or "Progress Always," Carol reports, and explains, "The immediate growth is small, but the long range view is a new generation coming up with new ideas, new methods, and a new outlook for a country that is abundant in natural resources."
