

# SEED RANGE LANDS IN LATE FALL

U. of I. - Fall is a good time for reseeding range lands, according to Ralph S. Samson, University of Idaho Extension conservationist.

Late fall seedings are best in areas of low annual precipitation. The seed does not decay during the winter, and germination takes place early the next spring so that seedlings can become established before the moisture supply is gone, Samson explains. At least one additional year for growth should then be allowed before livestock are permitted to graze the land.

For best success in reseeding rangeland, a good seedbed is most important. Grass seed needs a good firm weed-free seedbed, Samson emphasizes.

Today, with good equipment available, good seedbed preparation does-\$669 n't pose the problem it did in previous years.

In low rainfall areas, an excellent grass to plant is the new strain of crested wheatgrass, "Nordan." Siberian wheatgrass is also weed.



There are "saturated" and "unsaturated" fatty acids. "Saturated" means filled to capacity with hydrogen. "Unsaturated" means to have the capacity to take up additional hydrogen atoms, and "polyunsaturated" means any fatty acid capable of taking up four or more hydrogen atoms per molecule.

Though there is some evidence that polyunsaturated fats help control the blood cholesterol level, the polyunsaturated fats combine readfly with oxygen to become rancid. This rancidity may take place in storage, in the digestive tract, or in tissue. This presence of such rancid products is characteristic of aging and atherosclerosis. Therefore, since the stability of polyunsaturated fat is so unpredictable, caution in advising the use of large amounts of polyunsaturated fat in the diet seems desirable. Also important are naturally occuring antioxidants, or protectors, such as vitamin E although their effectiveness is altered by other substances in food and the body.

"The committees views with caution drastic changes in the American diet," Miss Bring emphasizes. "However, evidence exists for encouraging regular and moderate exercise, maintenance of desirable body weight, moderation in the choice and amount of fat eaten as well as in the total food intake, and maintenance of adequate and balanced diet."



### BEER CONSUMPTION **GAINS IN IDAHO**

Boise — Consumption of beer and ale by Idaho citizens increased last yearover 1960 levels, it was reported in the Centennial edition of the Brewers Almanac, the annual fact book of the brewing industry published by the United States Brewers Association.

The 1961 consumption volume reached 279,933 barrels, compared with 267,461 barrels in 1960. Per capita use of beer and ale likewise increased from 12.4 gallons in 1960 to 12.7 gallons last year.

The current year's production of Idaho hops will add more than three million dollars to farm income, according to reliable estimates. In addition, between 14 and 14 million bushels of choice malting barley produced by the State's farmers will find its way into the brewing industry.

Countrywide, 1961 was the biggest year in sales and production in the history of the American brewing industry, and thus it fittingly marked the 100th anniversary of the United States Brewers Association. The Association, oldest incorporated trade organization in the nation, was founded August 22, 1862,

Sales in 1961, as represented by tax-paid withdrawals of malt beverages, reached an all-time high of over 89,000,000 barrels of 31 gallons each, a 1.3 per cent increase above

Production figures for 1961 also broke all records with a barrelage of 95,027,408, or 1.7 percent better than 1960. For three years running, sales and production have exceeded the previous year's and have established new all-time highs.

Per capita consumption of beer and ale averaged 15.0 gallons, virtually the same as 1960. Among popular beverages beer stands just after milk and coffee and leads soft drinks, tea, distilled spirits and wine. Per capita consumption, the Brewers Almanac points out, was based upon the entire population, regardless of age. If persons under 21 were excluded, and other groups weighed to reflect their customary use of malt beverages, the 1961 per capita consumption came nearer to 23.2 gallons.


Among the states, New York again led in beer production with 11,294,060 barrels, nosing out Wisconsin by a scant 95,000 barrels. But Wisconsin held onto first place in per capita consumption with 25.5 gallons to Nevada's 24.6.

Among the nations, United States consumption of nearly 89,000,000 barrels was far in the lead, with West Germany next at 48,686,000 barrels. In per capita consumption, however, the United States with 15.0 gallons was outranked by Belgium with 34.3, Luxembourg with 34.1, and by Australia, West Germany, New Zealand, United Kingdom, Austria, Denmark and Canada.


