LELAND HOUCK DIES AT LEWISTON SUNDAY MORNING

Leland W. Houck, 76, Clarkston, a salesman for Morgan Bros. & Co. wholesale grocery firm at Lewiston until his retirement some 10 years ago, died Sunday morning at 8:15 o'clock at St. Joseph's Hospital in Lewiston of a heart ailment. He had been ill three years, and had suffered an attack and was hospitalized two days previously.

Mr. Houck had a varied career, which included, among other things, serving as a foreman for a truck on which all new Dodge vehicles were tested at Detroit, and also operating his own garage at Juliaetta.

Houck was born May 25, 1886, at Wayne, New York, and received his elementary and high school education there. He also attended colleges in that area, receiving a degree in teaching, and degrees in architecture and accounting.

He moved to Havre, Mont., in 1910 to homestead and at the same time served as an accountant for the Weyerhaeuser Timber Co., handling accounts for the firm's lumber yards in northern Montana.

In 1913 he came to Lewiston for the first time, to live until 1915, and served as bookkeeper for the former 500 Cab Co. He moved to Detroit in 1915 to serve as Dodge test track foreman, and then in 1920 moved to Juliaetta to live 10 years. There he operated Houck's Garage.

He moved to Clarkston in 1930 to live, and has been there continuously since. The family home is at 426 4th Street.

He was united in marriage to Ruth Glenn at Lewiston, April 23, 1915.

He was a member of the Methodist Church.

Surviving besides his wife are a son, Loren L. Houck, Clarkston, and a granddaughter and two great-grandchildren.

Funeral services were held Wednesday at 2:00 at the Brower-Wann Chapel. Officiating was the Rev. Grace Gordon of the Asotin Assembly of God Church. Interment was in the Moscow Cemetery.

Moscow — Participants in the Soil Bank program whose contracts expire in 1962 have been notified that they may continue the diversion of this land in 1963. Land on which conservation reserve contracts have expired in previous years cannot be included in the 1963 program.

Clarence A. Jensen, chairman of the Latah County ASCS committee stated that only eight Latah county soil bank participants are affected by this new regulation. Payment rates are expected to be a continuation of the 1962 rates. One major change upon renewal permits grazing with a 50 percent reduction in payment rates.

60 YEARS AGO REQUIREMENTS

From Spokane Daily Chronicle, Nov. 28, 1900 — No person shall be admitted to teach in the grade school of the city of Spokane who has not at least a second grade certificate, who is not a high school graduate and who has not taught at least two years in the grade schools of a city of 10 or more teachers, or one third longer in places of less number of teachers down to four rooms, and twice as long in country schools and small grade schools up to five rooms. A teacher must be at least 18 years old.

The above is a synopsis of the new rule governing the hiring of teachers for Spokane's grade schools which finally was adopted at a meeting of the board of education yesterday afternoon.

BASKETBALL TEAM IS HIT HARD

U. of I., Moscow — University of Idaho hopes for one of the best basketball teams in a decade received a severe jolt recently when the institution had to declare Charles (Chuck) White, high-scoring senior forward from Kirkland, Washington, ineligible for further amateur sports competition. Reason: White has signed a professional baseball contract with the New York Yankees.
 "Basketball coach Joe Cipriano learned of this from White," said Director of Athletics J. Neil (Skip) Stahley. "The rules of amateur athletics are clear. We had no alternative but to declare White ineligible."
 "Coach Cipriano has worked hard to build a well-rounded team for the coming year, and has been dealt a severe blow by the rules of professional baseball which permit signing of a student before graduation of his class. This is another example of the cold, calculated, impersonal approach taken by professional baseball toward young men of college age who should be permitted to complete their education without having dangled before them the glitter of a contract. Relentless badgering of young college men to sign a contract too often shows no consideration for the best interests of an individual."
 White plans to finish his senior year at the university, but he cannot participate in either basketball or baseball at the institution.
 The highest scoring basketball sophomore and junior in Idaho history, White was signed by a Yankee scout for an undisclosed sum. White has also lettered two seasons for the Vandal baseball squad as an outfielder. In basketball, White was being eyed for all-American honors this year.

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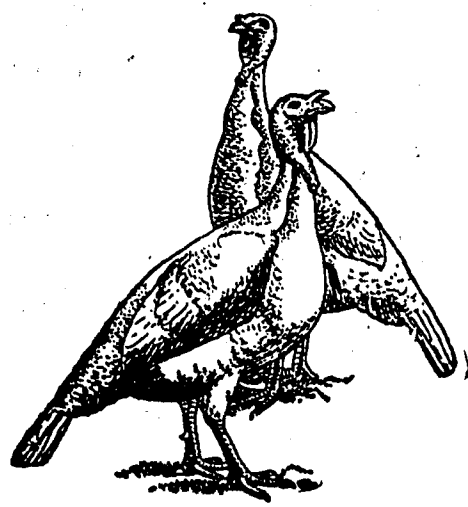

SNOW IS ONE OF BEST MULCHES

U. of I., Moscow — "Snow is probably the best mulches ever devised," said Prof. William H. Snyder, University of Idaho horticulturist. "You can't improve on nature in this regard. However, you can't always count on snow coming around at the right time. Therefore, gardeners should make plans to protect their plants by other means."

Use loose, freely aerating material, Snyder recommended. Any material which does not pack tightly against the ground is good for mulching. Good materials are boughs cut from evergreen trees, oak leaves and excelsior. Maple leaves are usually not good to use because they tend to mat tightly against the ground and smother the plants.

Do not put the mulch around the plants while the weather is still warm and sunny. Leave the mulch on late in the spring, later than you would normally think necessary.

Smart parents let their children learn some things by experience.

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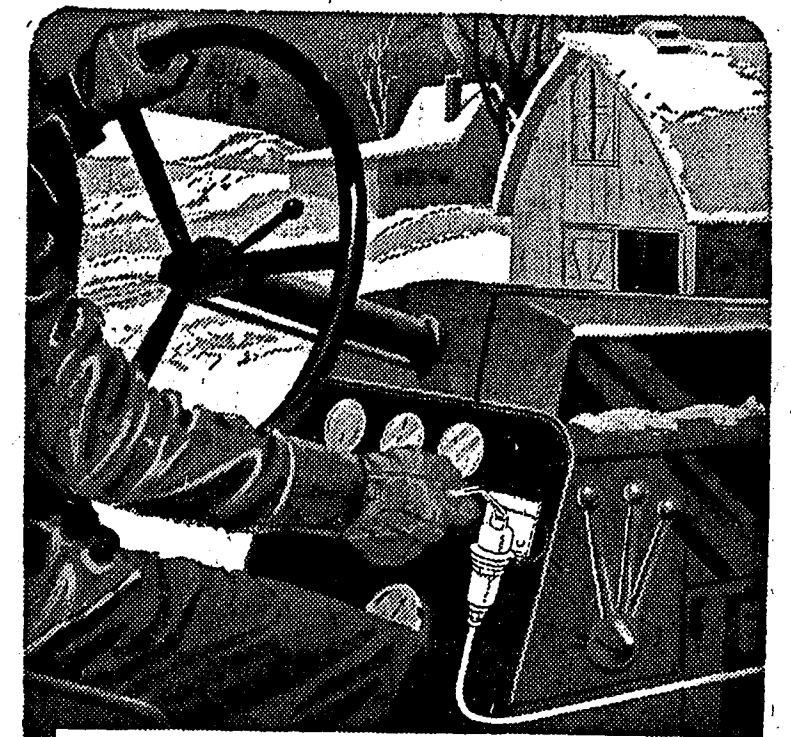
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
