EXCHANG STUDENT TELLS OF BRAZIL

U. of I., Moscow — Brazil is famous for its coffee, and Carol Falk Priest River, Idaho's International Farm Youth Exchange delegate in Brazil comments on her first hand experiences.

"Some of my hot families had coffee trees," she reports. "The coffee is picked by hand, dropping on a cloth spread around the coffee tree. After harvest, the coffee is winnow-

ed to separate coffee fruits from dirt, twigs, stones and leaves, and is then washed."

"The coffee is then spread for drying under the sun. During the drying under the sun, it is necessary to turn the coffee over frequently in order to avoid fermentation. The husks are removed from the dried coffee by pounding with a heavy piece of wood in a hollowed out log. After roasting over a fire for about 40 minutes, the coffee is ground, Carol reports, and always just after the water boils. Then, as she puts it, "We drink a little coffee with our sugar."

The Brazilians love their hot, thick, sweet coffee, the IFYE delegate explains. Everyone drinks coffee, even the young children. At present, Carol Falk reports she

is with her seventh family in Brazil. Their home is almost at sea level, and the climate is hot.

"One day it was 114 degrees," Carol reports. "I could not believe that this is the end of the winter season in Brazil. The heavy rains are during the summer months of November to March. There are three major types of climates in Brazil: equatorial or tropical, sub-tropical, and temperate. Crops are planted and harvested varying with the area but many of the crops are planted the year around.

The young people of the present era, we are happy to report, are doing quite well despite the fears of the older generation, which remembers its childhood!

POTATO GROWERS USE STARCH TEST

The potato industry uses the specific gravity of a potato as a very convenient way of telling the solids and starch content of the potato. High specific gravity also generally indicates high quality.

In Idaho, the weight-in-air, weight-in-water method is the most common method used to determine specific gravity. But how accurate is it? What are the effects of water temperature? Tuber temperature? Soaking? Water purity?

To find out, University of Idaho horticulturists at the Aberdeen Branch Experiment station conducted a series of tests. Carrying out the tests were W.M. Tritani, W.C. Sparks and W.H. Weinheimer.

The researchers soaked potatoes for varying lengths of time and determined the specific gravity after each soak period. They varied temperature of water and took measurements. Tubers were also measured at different temperatures. Measurements were made with distilled water, tap water, "dirty water," and water containing dissolved salts.

Each test resulted in different specific gravities, proving that different conditions will affect specific gravity reading. Since more and more contracts between processor and producer are being written based on higher payments for higher quality as measured by specific gravity, more care should be taken to maintain constant conditions from one measurement time to the next.

"A tuber-water temperature of approximately that of tap water is suggested," the university horticulturists explain. "The tuber temperature can be adjusted by soaking in tap water of desired temperature. They will come to equilibrium in approximately one hour. Take all measurements carefully and accurately."


