The score by quarters follows: First quarter, 19-11, Kendrick. Half: Kendrick 31, Nezperce 29. Three-quarter mark: Nezperce 50, Kendrick 42. Final tally: Nezperce 66, Kendrick 48.

High scorer for Kendrick was Eldon Fry with 12 points, closely followed by Doug Armitage with 11.

For Nezperce it was Dick Ingram with 29 points and Dick Westwells with 14.

In the Jr. Varsity contest which began at 6:30 the Nezperce Indians walked off with the Kendrick scalp 52 to 33. In this contest the halftime score was: Nezperce 16, Kendrick 13.

## TROY TROJANS DEFEAT TIGERS TUESDAY EVE

Old-Fashioned Bean Soup

Old-Fashioned Bean Soup, Idaho Style (makes 10 generous servings)

2 1/2 cups (1-pound) Idaho Great Northern Beans  
12 cups (3 quarts) water  
meaty ham bone

1 large onion, finely chopped  
1 small bay leaf  
2 cloves garlic, minced

Soak washed beans in measured amount of water overnight or place over high heat; bring to boiling point and boil rapidly 2 minutes. Remove from heat. Cover. Allow to stand 1 hour. The beans are then ready to cook. Add ingredients as listed to beans and the soaking water. Bring water to boiling point. Reduce heat, cover tightly, and allow to simmer for about 2 hours, or until beans are almost tender. In the meantime, prepare these ingredients...

1 cup mashed potatoes, leftover or cooked instant  
1 cup thin-sliced celery

1 cup diced raw carrots, salt and pepper as desired

Add to beans and ham bone. Taste for seasoning. Cover and simmer 1 hour longer. Remove ham bone and cut off the meat. Dice it and add to soup. Reheat to just boiling, stirring carefully to avoid breaking beans. Makes 10 hearty servings.

To serve: One-half cup heavy cream or undiluted evaporated milk may be stirred into the soup just before serving. Garnish top with snipped parsley and chives combined. Or, if little or no meat on the ham bone, put thin-sliced frankfurters over top of soup. Or crumbled broiled bacon bits. Or tiny bread cubes browned in butter.

## DISABLED VETS MUST REPORT

Spokane — This year's income reporting time comes one month earlier than usual for disabled veterans and dependents of deceased veterans on VA pensions in Washington and Idaho. Leonard A. Clemens, contact representative of the VA Hospital, Spokane, explained this week.

Along with their November 30 checks, all VA pension recipients received enclosed tabulating cards. They carry the words, "please do not mutilate." It is important that these instructions be followed.

On these cards beneficiaries must report all income received during 1962, and that expected in 1963. Income means everything, including Social Security payments, except, of course, VA pension payments themselves.

Law requires the VA to use these reports to determine continued eligibility of pensioners and in some cases to make adjustment on the basis of increased or decreased outside income.

The important thing is getting those cards back from the beneficiaries.

Prompt and accurate reporting can save the VA — and the beneficiary — both delay and headache.

HUGE SUMS TO BE SPENT

Misoula — A total of 1200 men are employed by the Forest Service on 12 national forests of the northern region, Boyd L. Rasmussen, Regional Forester, has announced.

These men have been employed since \$1.6 million in Accelerated Public Works Program (APWP) funds were allocated to the Forest Service northern region on October 29, for use on those forests in counties with high unemployment. Rasmussen said these funds to Montana, \$577,000; eastern Washington, \$230,000, and northern Idaho, \$813,000, will be expended on projects in eligible counties before the end of the calendar year.

The APWP, signed into law by President Kennedy in September of 1962, was designed to help in the initiation and speed-up of state, local and federal public works projects that would help provide immediate useful work for the unemployed and under-employed in labor surplus areas. Rasmussen explained that the program is being administered by the Forest Service on National forests in cooperation with the ARA of the Department of Commerce.

As of November 24, 43 percent of the northern region's APWP funds had been used to provide work in eligible counties.

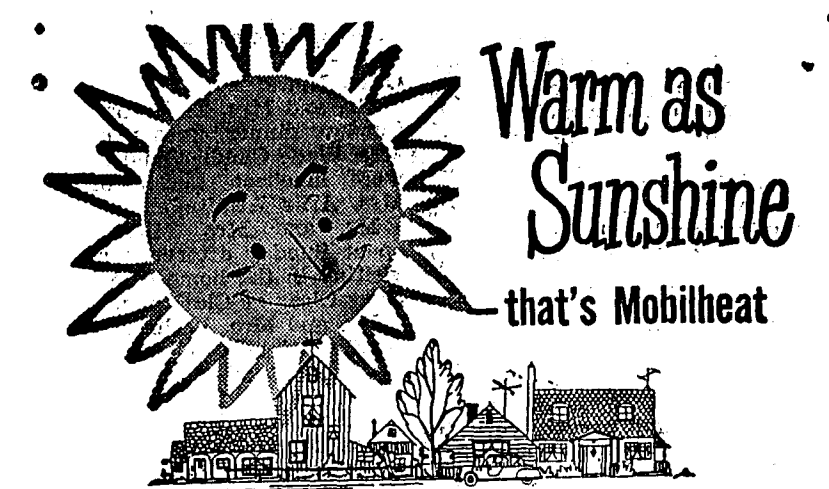

**CHRISTMAS SEALS ARE USEFUL ITEMS IN LIFE**

Boise — The promotion of tuberculosis testing projects in Idaho schools is one of the activities financed by Christmas Seals, according to John A. Mather, M. D., director of preventative medicine for the Idaho Department of Health, and a board member of the Idaho Tuberculosis Association.

The Tuberculosis Association furnishes field consultation to volunteers, educational supplies, pays for the first follow-up X-rays for positive reactors to the test, and cooperates with the State Health department in over-all planning, Dr. Mather added.

Several counties launched such a program this fall. In Lemhi county a school testing program at Salmon involving first and eighth graders was recently completed. While it is too soon to assess definite results, it is reported that two first and one eighth grade pupil were positive reactors.

In Salmon, the local physicians pooled their efforts and administered the tests. Volunteer nurses and members of the local tuberculosis committee assisted in the organization of the project, furnished the educational supplies, and paid for X-ray films. Tuberculin testing materials were furnished by the state health department, and health department staff members will have charge of the follow-up work.

In Canyon county, at Parma, four local physicians with the aid of local nurses, and medical help from the state department of health, tested approximately 900 school children. In this school system, 5 children were found to react to the tuberculin test. Sixteen of these were recent converters, having been exposed to an active case of tuberculosis in a classmate. The active case, as well as all other reactors to the test,

are currently under treatment, Dr. Mather said.

Seven counties in the Magic Valley area: Twin Falls, Jerome, Blaine, Minidoka, Lincoln, Cassia and Gooding, are launching a program to test all first and eighth graders in their schools immediately. Dr. Luther Thompson, medical director of the South Central District Health department, is in charge of this work.

A number of northern Idaho counties have for the past several years, carried on fairly extensive tuberculin testing programs, Dr. Mather reports. In every case the Tuberculosis Association is giving substantial assistance with these programs.

## PRIVATE UTILITY PAYS HUGE REAL TAX BILL

Final payment of the Washington Water Power Company's 1962 Idaho property tax in nine north Idaho counties will total \$888,171.04, according to Dean Hollenbeck, local representative for the utility.

"This second-half payment will bring the 1962 total to \$1,779,802.06" Hollenbeck said.

Mr. Hollenbeck pointed out that W. W. P. is the largest taxpayer in eight of these nine counties, and the number two taxpayer in the ninth county.

"Our Idaho property tax is \$53,102 more than it was last year," Hollenbeck said, "and on a county-by-county basis is two and one-half to three times what it was ten years ago."

"I think we would be derelict in our responsibility to the free enterprise system if we did not point out the Bonner county situation," Hollenbeck said. "In that county we will

pay total 1962 taxes of \$612,119.31. Of this total, \$540,608 will be for our Cabinet Gorge plant. Our tax bill represents almost 36 percent of the total county tax value

"Also in Bonner county you will find the Albeni Falls power plant, which is almost exactly the same size as our Cabinet Gorge plant. The big difference is that Albeni Falls contributes not one thin dime in taxes to the county!"

Mr. Hollenbeck said that if the W. W. P.'s Cabinet Gorge plant were tax exempt as Albeni Falls, it would mean that the taxes of the remaining taxpayers in Bonner County would increase by more than fifty percent.

Second-half tax payment to be made in each of the nine counties by W. W. P., with the 1962 total following, are: Benewah, \$26,186, \$52,368; Bonner, \$306,000, \$612,119; Clearwater, \$25,698, \$51,397; Idaho, \$38,212, \$76,396; Kootenai, \$160,394, \$320,769; Latah, \$67,407, \$134,816; Lewis, \$21,035, \$42,071; Nez Perce, \$161,868, \$323,737; and Shoshone, \$81,308, \$162,617.

Among the appeals being stressed in the moral responsibility program are: "Successful Driving Is More Than Knowing Where the Brake and Gas Pedals Are" — it is more than knowing the difference between red and green traffic lights. It is tempering knowledge with conscience and moral responsibility — it is staying completely sober on the road!

## ALFALFA CROP IS HUGE ONE

U. of I., Moscow — Idaho harvested its largest crop of alfalfa seed in 1962, and ranks second in the nation, Howard Roylance, agronomist of the University of Idaho extension service said this week. The harvest of 18 million pounds was one-third larger than the crop of 1961. Idaho production has tripled in the past five years.

Idaho is second to California. A large percentage of the Idaho crop is grown in Owyhee, Canyon and Twin Falls counties.

While the national harvest is declining, Roylance said, the Idaho trend is to larger acreages and bigger yields. In California, the leading state for several years, he said, much land previously in alfalfa seed is being used for other purposes.

About eight and one-half million pounds of the Idaho crop is certified seed, which means it is marketed at a premium price.

Growing conditions were favorable in Idaho this past year, Roylance said. Weather was good at the critical periods. Pollination by alkali and leaf-cutter bees was unusually successful. Populations of the bees have been increased.

**WINTERIZE YOUR MACHINERY NOW**

U. of I., Moscow — "Don't be caught, winterize your machinery now," Eric Wilson, university agricultural engineer, warned Idaho's farmers today.

For equipment that won't be used during the winter, follow these steps:

1. Clean off chaff and dirt. Such material holds moisture and rust will form. Use a steam cleaner or a commercial de-greaser. Even a hose and hot water will work.
2. Coat all exposed, unpainted surfaces with a film of oil or grease.
3. Drain engine oil and refill with new, clean oil.
4. Clean and flush cleaning system and leave drained.
5. Drain fuel tank. This is especially important since any fuel, gasoline particularly, will form a gum if left standing for three months or so. This gum will clog carburetor jets and cause starting problems next spring.

"If you are going to be using some of the farm equipment during the winter, protect it the same as you would your car or truck," Wilson said.

Protect the engine's cooling system with a good grade of anti-freeze. Drain the crankcase and refill with a lighter grade. In the case of a tractor Wilson also recommended installing a lighter grade of oil in the transmission and possibly final drive.

Be sure every grease fitting is filled with grease, not only to lubricate, but also to keep out moisture, which means corrosion.

See to it that the engine is well tuned for easy starting in cold weather, and the battery and generator in good condition.

**EUROPEAN STUDY TOUR PLANNED**

U. of I., Moscow — Plans for the 1963 European Study Tour for students of the University of Idaho are well under way, according to Dr. E. Malcolm Hause, associate professor of history and political science, who will conduct the summer event.

The tour will begin in New York City in mid-June and return in mid-August. The group will spend 56 days on European soil visiting England, Holland, Belgium, France, Monaco, Italy, Austria, Switzerland and West Germany.

As a summer school course in social sciences, the tour may earn up to eight university credits. One may take it without course credit if he does not wish to perform the study requirements.

"A significant characteristic over the last ten years of Idaho's tours is their high educational value," said Dr. Hause. "Not only does the student have the equal opportunity to see what the tourist usually sees for fun and pleasure, but he is also treated to select educational programs of various types all along the tour routes."

In view of the expected rush of tourists to Europe this summer, Dr. Hause urged interested persons to make their reservations soon. He may be reached at Room 323 of the University of Idaho Administration Bldg. at Moscow.

**March of Dimes Helps Youngster With 'Assist' from Coincidence**

Kathy Anderson is too young at 18 months to understand coincidence. This is the story of how it tipped the balance in a life-and-death battle for her—hopefully, in favor of life.

The first child of Mr. and Mrs. James Anderson of Grundy, Va., Kathy was born in December, 1960 with spina bifida—a severe birth defect in which the spinal column fails to close completely. Its cause is unknown and there are too few specialists in its treatment.

Mrs. Anderson had been sent home uncertain of her baby's future, while Kathy remained in the hospital. The doctors were undecided on the next move.

**Helpful Neighbor Phones**

Ten days passed. Then the Andersons' telephone rang. It was a neighbor who had just read a magazine story about Linda Breese of Columbus, Ohio, the 1961 March of Dimes Poster Girl.

The article, in the monthly publication of the Loyal Order of Moose, told how Linda, also a spina bifida victim, had undergone an operation at Children's Hospital in Columbus, and was now making steady progress under a program of treatment and rehabilitation at the March of Dimes-financed Clinical Study Center there.

Mrs. Anderson, whose father-in-law is a Moose member, read the article for herself and promptly called her family physician, Dr. Thomas McDonald. They agreed on an immediate call to the Breese family, 200 miles away.

Mrs. Breese confirmed the story. She also praised the skills of Dr. Martin P. Sayers who had performed the operation on Linda and of Dr. William O. Robertson, director of the March of Dimes-supported Center.

With Dr. McDonald making the arrangements, Kathy was soon taken to Columbus for surgery by Dr. Sayers. The operation was successful, but Kathy then began to develop hydrocephalus, or water on the brain, which frequently accompanies the open spine condition. Dr. Sayers inserted a plastic tube which drains the excess fluid from Kathy's head

into her body to be absorbed. Kathy went back home to Grundy in February of 1961 after spending a month at Children's Hospital, but she's been a regular visitor since.

Faithfully each month from March through October, Mr. and Mrs. Anderson drove 650 miles, round trip, between Grundy and Columbus, leaving home at midnight to reach Children's Hospital at 8 a. m. and returning the same afternoon.

**Centers Fight Crippling**

The expert medical team at the March of Dimes-supported center in Columbus and those in more than 50 other centers are working to improve diagnosis, treatment and rehabilitation techniques to help make possible nearly normal lives for the victims of crippling birth defects, arthritis and polio.

Jim and Barbara Anderson can only hope that the work of Dr. Robertson and his associates will bring a promising future to Kathy. But they can personally endorse his diagnosis of their daughter's disposition.

"She's a lively, happy baby who loves to have people around her," says Mrs. Anderson. "We try to keep her from getting spoiled but it's not easy."

"What can you do with four grandparents who have only one grandchild to fuss over?"

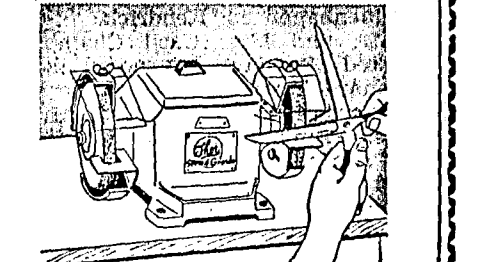

Q. Is it possible to sharpen scissors with a portable electric bench grinder?

A. Scissors can be touched up if you have a good-quality, fine-grit wheel in your bench grinder. Apply the blade so the bevel lies accurately upon the wheel with the blade crossing it at right angles. Draw the blade across the wheel from heel to point.

Do not run the blade back and forth, but start each stroke at the heel of the blade, and be sure

to dip the blade in water frequently to cool the metal. When finished, rub the blades lightly with steel wool before cleaning.

Tips from readers: For persons who use a ladder a great deal, identify the center of balance once and for all by painting a band around each side member. When you have to carry the ladder, pick it up at one of these marks and you can walk away without having to juggle it to and fro searching for the balancing point.

You can avoid cracking plaster walls when hanging pictures if you drill the hole for the nail with an electric drill. Be sure the hole is a little smaller than the nail. For an added precaution put a small piece of masking tape over the spot before drilling.

The life of abrasive sheets used with portable power sanders, especially disk types, can be lengthened by covering the back of the abrasive sheets with masking tape. By doing this racking and tearing of the abrasive is discouraged when they are subjected to long periods of activity.

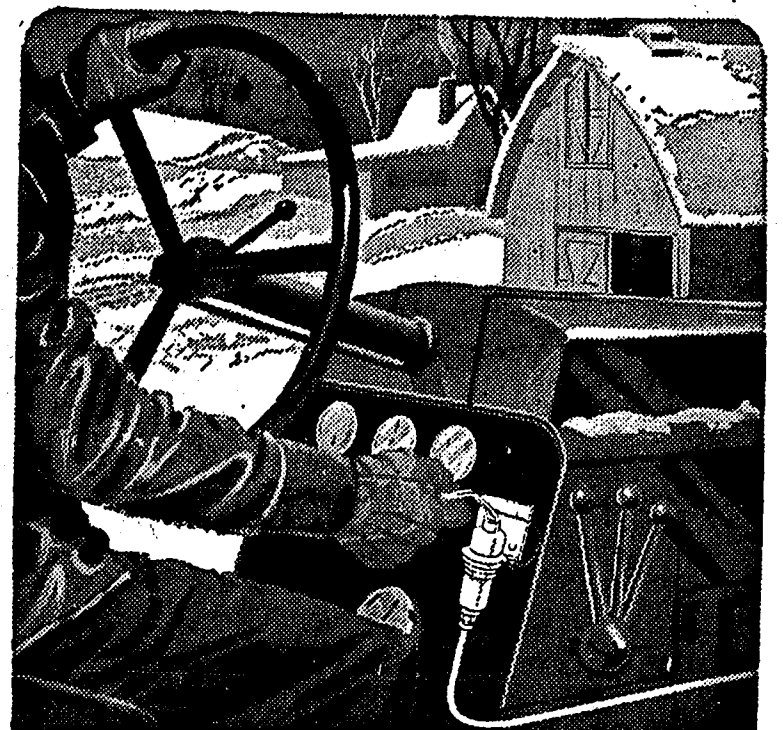
