Mrs. Ernst Fliger Dies

Mrs. Ernst Fliger, 88, a resident of Juliaetta since 1906, died Wednesday morning of last week at 4:30 o'clock in the Pine Manor Nursing Home at Coeur d'Alene. Death was attributed to the infirmities of age.

Mrs. Fliger (Martha Marie) was born Dec. 8, 1874, in Germany. She moved to the United States and to Bingham Lake, Minn., when she was two, living there until 1904. She spent the next two years in Germany, then moved to Juliaetta in 1906.

She married Fliger Nov. 24, 1898, in Minnesota. He died in 1941. Mrs. Fliger was a member of the Zion Lutheran Church of Juliaetta.

Surviving are a son, Carl, Juliaetta, and seven grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

Committal services were held Friday morning at 10:30 at the Juliaetta Cemetery, with the Rev. Theo Meske of the Zion Lutheran Church officiating. Arrangements were in charge of Brower-Wann Funeral Home at Lewiston.

This is the same type of surgery undergone by Judy Lohman, Southwick; Eddie Corkill, Kendrick; and Don Wright of Genesee — with whose cases most local residents are very familiar.

The 26 pints of blood needed for the operation were given by Air Force personnel at the Biloxi School of Instruction, Biloxi, Miss., where Ginger's brother, Clinton Trout, is stationed as an electronics instructor. To give the family a "boost" financially on this very expensive surgery the Kendrick Community Lions Club began a drive for funds — purchasing a two-year-old buckskin horse eligible for registry, which someone else will own the night of January 18.

Donation tickets, which bear the donor's name, may be obtained at any Kendrick place of business — and the money thus given goes to a really fine cause — the restoration of a 16-year-old girl's health. **IDAHO VANDALS HAVE "RIVAL"**

U. of I. Moscow — Since 1918, the University of Idaho athletic teams have roamed the west alone under the name "Vandals." But now they have company — the athletic teams of Terrace Heights Elementary school at Yakima, Wash. The Yakima youngsters have also adopted the name Vandals.

A letter received last week at the university from Robert P. Lawrence, principal, told of the name adoption and requested a picture of a Vandal for making emblems. The version of the Vandal now used by University of Idaho teams is a pretty tough looking customer with a sand-paper beard, and the grade school was sent tamer impressions of the Vandal designed years ago. Even these should be tough enough for grade school athletes.

Although the name "Vandals" has been challenged from time to time because of its connotation, it has stuck with University of Idaho athletic teams for almost a half-century. In 1918, the Idaho basketball team was wrecking the hopes of teams from bigger institutions, and Harry Loyd (Jazz) McCarty of Lewiston, sports editor of the student newspaper, "The Argonaut," began to toy with words. He had referred to the Idaho team as the "Heckers" — after Coach "Heck" Edmondson — but now he switched to "Wreckers."

This name reminded scholarly Dean Edward M. Hulme, college of letters and science, of one of history's most efficient wrecking crews — the pelt-wearing, shield-bearing warriors of early central Europe known as the Vandals. McCarty seized upon the name for the Idaho basketball team. By 1921, all university athletic teams were called "Vandals."

**TWO-CAR CRASHES**

Boise — "An abnormally large number of Idaho's 1962 two-car collisions have occurred on straight stretches of highways," it was announced this week by the Department of Law Enforcement.

In a special study of the first 11 months' two-car fatalities, it was found that slightly more than 85 per cent of those occurring on well-marked highways were on straightaways, the Department said. The remaining 35 per cent were divided almost equally between collisions occurring on highway curves and at intersections with other highways.

At the same time it was revealed that the reverse situation existed in two-car collisions on county roads under the jurisdiction of counties and local improvement districts. In these accidents, 60 per cent of the fatalities occurred at intersections, 20 per cent were on straightaways and the remainder were divided between crashes on the crests of hills and on curves.

These two-car crashes have cost the lives of 101 people so far this year.

Idaho's one-car accidents, which for several years have accounted for a higher proportion of traffic deaths than the national average, showed an increase of 17 percent over the first 11 months of last year, Law Enforcement officials reported. The off-the-road accidents and those involving cars hitting fixed objects or overturning on the roadway have accounted for 112 deaths, it was reported.

The remaining 41 traffic deaths were: 22 pedestrians; three bicycle riders; four killed in car-train crashes; one horseback rider whose mount was hit by a car, and ten people killed in seven three-car mixups.

U. of I. Moscow — Preliminary tests taken by students vying for places in the University of Idaho team to appear on the nationally televised "G. E. College Bowl" program showed results even higher than expected, according to T. J. Prichard, acting dean of the college of letters and science.

**THOUSANDS APPLY FOR NATIONAL SCIENCE GRANTS**

U. of I., Moscow — The National Science Foundation has granted to the University of Idaho a total of \$170,600 for three separate institutes to be held for eight weeks on the campus next summer.

Purpose of the institutes is to improve the quality of teaching of science and mathematics.

The institute for secondary school teachers of science and mathematics received \$97,900. In its seventh year, the course directed by Dr. Edgar

Graham, associate professor of chemistry and executive secretary of the Research Council, is open to 75 teachers.

The fourth Summer Institute for high school teachers of mathematics has received a grant of \$45,500. Thirty-five secondary teachers will be selected to take part. Dr. Hans Sagan, head of the mathematics department, is in charge.

Dr. William Barr's idea of relating insects to studies of biology because insects are plentiful for study has resulted in a grant of \$27,300. It will be the second summer institute in entomology for 20 secondary school biology teachers. Dr. Barr, a professor of entomology, will direct the institute.

Competition for the institutes is keen by the teachers. Last year a total of 5,200 high school teachers from all parts of the nation inquired about attending the three sessions.

A total of 1,944 teachers wrote for applications for the 75 openings in the institute for teachers of mathematics and science; 2,500 for the 35 places in the mathematics institute, and 512 for the 20 spots in the entomology course.

Under each of the programs, those selected receive a grant of \$600 plus

a dependency allowance and a travel allotment.

The bulk of the applications last year came from Idaho, California and Washington. Interest in them is far and wide, as applications also arrived from Japan and Guam, as well as all parts of our nation.

**ELASTIC CONCRETE IN THE FUTURE?**

U. of I., Moscow, Elastic concrete? Well, not exactly. But air-entrained concrete is more pliable and elastic than regular concrete, according to Eric Wilson, University of Idaho extension agriculture engineer, and this characteristic makes it ideal for use in cold weather areas.

Air-entrained concrete simple means that tiny air bubbles are trapped in the cement paste that makes the concrete. These air bubbles expand and contract when there is freezing and thawing. Under the same conditions, regular concrete cracks and buckles.

Air-entrained concrete will withstand from 10 to 20 times as many freezings and thawings as regular concrete, and therefore is especially suited for use in all outside flatwork such as driveways, patios and sidewalks.

Air-entrained concrete costs about the same as regular concrete, according to Wilson, and is easier to place and finish.

The same methods of mixing are used with air-entrained concrete as with regular concrete. And here Wilson cautions that well-graded aggregate and sand be used. Ideally the larger pieces of aggregate are surrounded by smaller pieces of aggregate. These in turn are surrounded by smaller and smaller particles of sand. All are bonded together with the cement paste.

Concrete becomes concrete when the chemical agents in the cement powder react with water. As this reaction takes place and water is used up the mass hardens. If too much water is used, the excess must either evaporate or it is within the mass. Trapped water weakens concrete, making it more susceptible to damage through freezing and thawing.







**Santa Claus, Indiana, Got Famous Name Christmas Eve, 1882**

Although many towns have names directly or indirectly associated with Christmas, there is but one town named Santa Claus — in Indiana.

Except for a lucky break, the town would have had another name and hence would not have enjoyed the annual fame that it gathers around the Yuletide season.

The original intention to name the town Santa Fe, fell through when the officials at Washington suggested that the town be named something else, since there was already a Santa Fe in New Mexico.

On Christmas Eve, in 1882, the citizens held a mass meeting to select "another name, but every one proposed was discarded for one reason or another. The meeting was about to break up when Santa Claus, making his yearly visits to children in the neighborhood, strode in to get warm. He was in costume, and his arrival put one name in every mind. — And so the town was named Santa Claus!

**HOLLY WREATHS**
