The taxes are figured to raise about \$80,000 to \$90,-000 per year.

The proposed levy, as explained by the association members, are figured to be 1 per cent of the per acre return on the crops. For example: The price of lentils is now about 6 cents per pound. The assessment would mean that for each 100 pounds of lentils grown by the farmer-producer, one pound would go to support the proposed commission.

Thompson said: "We believe the majority of the farmers in Idaho who raise peas and lentils are in favor of having a commission. If we did not feel that way we surely wouldn't strive to have a commission set up by the Legislature."
"The Kendrick 'No' vote will not

affect the plans of the association to send the bill to the legislature," said Thompson. "The bill is now drafted in its final form."

But Clemm said he disagreed .. "That the farmers haven't been adequately queried nor have they been really informed."

"At that meeting in Moscow (an Association meeting early in December) there were about 100 men at the meeting, but the vote was only 47 for a commission and 5 against what about those who didn't vote? asked Mr. Clemm.

Thompson replied that he believed many of those present at that time did not have the right to vote, as they were not pea and lentil growers. Clemm said the farmers should


