Road Receive Storm Damage

Following several days in which the thermometer never rose above the thawing mark the temperature began to change Friday — climbing into the 40's, and with it came rain. The rain began the task of softening the icy snow although it had little effect on the frozen ground, which had a frost depth of about 14 inches.

The rain continued part of Friday

The rain continued part of Friday night, and Saturday morning it really began to pour, continuing the de-luge almost all of Saturday night. With the temperature in the mid-40's Bear Creek, Cedar Creek and the Potlatch river began a rapid rise — for the mail and return by way of with water flowing over the icechocked stream beds, the ice being the mail for hours — but we got it! about a foot in thickness.

About 1:30 Sunday afternoon the ice began to break, and chunks as and grinding down the river. For a time it was feared a jam would form between the Louis Wright property across the river at the foot of Sperry Grade, and the Mead & Howard Inc., sawmill at Kendrick. Mr. Wright used a pike pole and a heavy axe and managed to keep the first huge chunks from jamming, and when open water was available the majority of the chunks went grinding and bobbing by, with no area have felt the damage of Monday night's semi-cloudburst. The Cedar Creek road is open to one-way traffic only; the Sperry grade received considerable damage on the lower end; Little Bear ridge grade was closed for a time, slides and washouts blocking it until mid-morning and debris, and several deep ditches until mid-morning, when it was cleared by the state crew. much as 10 feet square went bobbing grinding and bobbing by, with no damage to anyone.

COUNTY ROAD REVISION ASKED OF IDAHO LEGISLATURE

The Latah County Commissioners appointed a committee Monday afternoon, Jan. 28, to take to the Idaho Legislature a bill calling for a mandatory vote of the people in the counties of Idaho to form larger

highway districts. At a meeting Saturday at the Courthouse enough support was gained among county highway district and good road district commissioners and municipal officials that the commissioners decided the bill should be taken to the legislature. About 70 attended the Saturday meeting. They represented all high-way and good road districts in the county and most of the municipal-

The bill to be taken to the Legislature calls for Idaho counties to be required to vote for one of three systems of controlling and maintaining secondary roads in the counties. They are:

(1) Having all secondary roads placed under the control of the

(2) Having one highway district Border Print Pictures." Each mem-three-man board of highway commis-

(3) Having two or more highway districts formed in each county, the size determined by each district hav-ing at least 200 miles of roads and an assessed valuation of \$4 million, or

The bill known as "County Local Option Secondary Highway Reorganization Act," was submitted to the 1957 legislature and was approved by the house, but failed by one vote in the Senate.

The meeting Saturday was prompted by action of the county advisory committee recommending the bill be taken to the Legislature, and the fact that residents of Good Road District No. 1 (in the Cedar Ridge and Linden area) and the Princeton-Harvard Highway District in northcentral Latah county) have petition-ed the commissioners to dissolve
