Don't fly a kite near electric or power lines.
Don't run across streets or highways while flying kites.
Don't touch fallen electric wires.

IT'S MARCH AND DON'T FORGET IT!

If any local resident was about to forget that it was March, the weather Sunday and Monday reminded him of the fact in no uncertain terms.
Following several truly beautiful March days, Sunday dawned cold and windy, with chill gusts, and alternate periods of sunshine - a day that kept most folks indoors.
Monday was truly a March day. We had sunshine, rain, wind, hail, snow - and well, you name it, we had it. True, the temperature was not low, but the wind had a bite to it that reminded you spring was not yet here.
In the canyon tulips and daffodils are up to a height of about four inches, snow drops are beginning to fade, and lilacs are heavy with leaf buds.

KITE FLYING CAN BE DANGEROUS

SOIL TESTING IS VERY IMPORTANT

Moscow - Soil testing has started with a bang, reports Homer Futter, Latah county agent. Latah county led all other counties in the state in number of soil samples taken in 1962.

Taking deep soil tests to measure nitrogen is a difficult job but, by the increased interest, farmers value the help given.
The testing for nitrogen is an exacting job and then only gives a partial measurement. Nitrogen is a gas, and in the soil is in the forms of ammonia, nitrite nitrogen and nitrate nitrogen. The soil test measures the ammonia and the more important nitrate nitrogen but does not measure the nitrite.
Nitrogen released from the breakdown of organic matter must be estimated. Testing for nitrogen requires sampling the soil up to six feet deep by one-foot increments. To test a field the farmer determines the soil type that represents the majority of the field, then proceeds to take samples in three spots and combines to make a single soil sample.
Many farmers find it easier to call on their fertilizer dealer for help. Most of the fertilizer dealers have trained field men who will, for a small charge, take the samples.
Soil test sample kits are available at the county agent's office, but Futter warns that the test is only as good as the sample, and testing requires care and patience.
Tests reported this spring show a wide variation in nitrogen levels between fields. Those fields with heavy applications of nitrogen put on last fall show large amounts of nitrogen in the three and four foot levels. It is important to not only know the amount of nitrogen, but the location in the soil.
Gaines wheat seems to be more critical than other wheats as to having adequate amounts of nitrogen within reach of the root zone.
Soil testing will tell the farmer the levels of potash, phosphorus and sulphur besides the acid alkaline balance of the soil.

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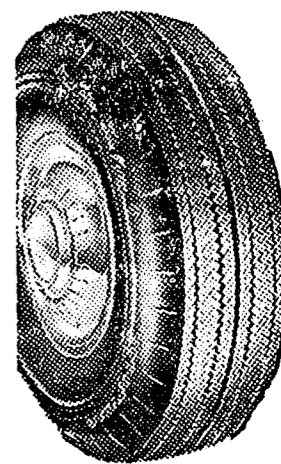
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
