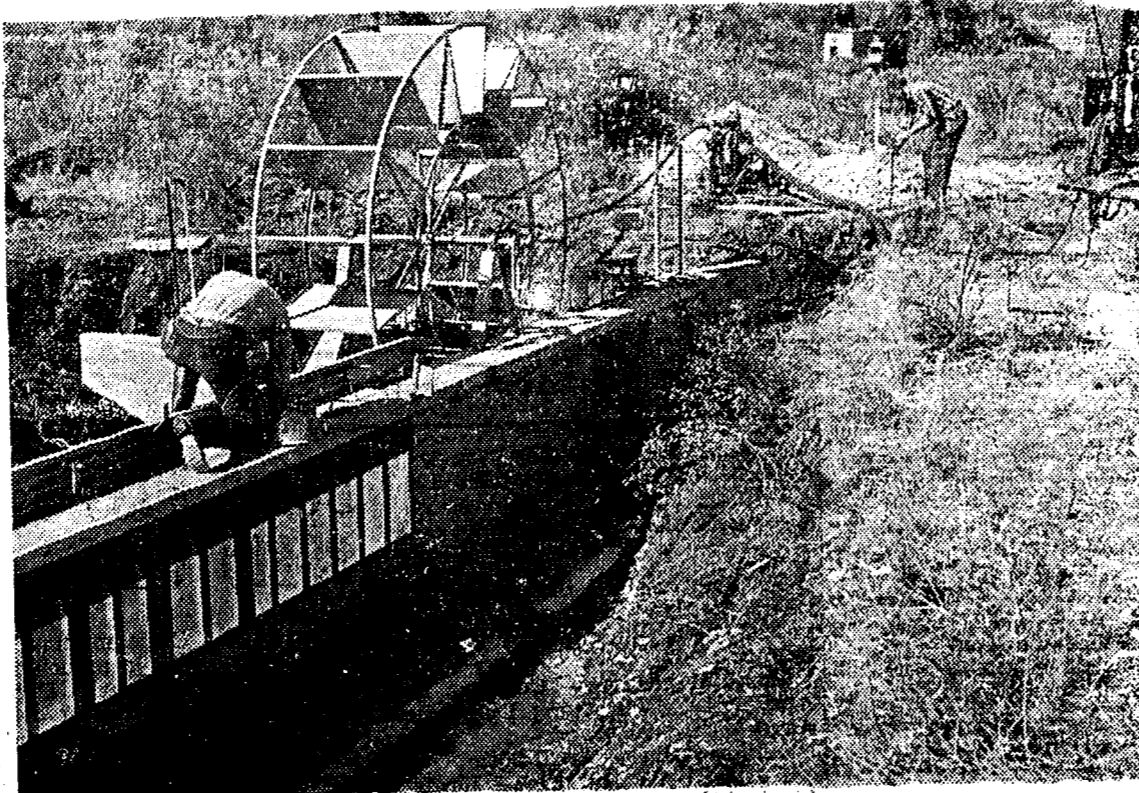

TRAINING FOR THE COLLEGE BOWL

U. of I., Moscow — Ever wonder what became of the famed "Quiz Kids?" One of the youths who confounded the adults with the right answer to tough questions in the 1940's is a member of the University of Idaho faculty.

Dr. Richard A. Porter, assistant professor of chemistry, an old hand at quick recall of information, is helping the University of Idaho's G. E. College Bowl team prepare for its television appearance on April 21.

The soft-spoken professor is a member of the faculty teams which have been competing with students Burton Hunter, Bonners Ferry; George Alberts and Stephen Merlan, both of Moscow, and William Siverly, Lewiston.

The television situation is duplicated at the Radio-TV center on the campus. Questions, buzzers and balls are similar to those in the New York studios, and television cameras move in and out on the contestants.

Faculty members like Dr. Porter have been challenging the students in the race to the correct answer. Still a "Quiz Kid" Dr. Porter has just accepted an appointment for a summer position with the Rand Corporation to work with high level problems in military operations. He has also worked as a consultant to the Lawrence Radiation Laboratory of the University of California.

The Idaho team in the G. E. College Bowl will be after a total of \$9,000 in scholarships which can be amassed by winning on five straight programs over teams from other schools.

With faculty like Dr. Porter to help sharpen their wits, the Idaho team is "getting in shape" for the difficult trail to the \$9,000, which begins on April 21.

WHAT TO DO WITH PERENNIAL PLANTS

U. of I., Moscow — When to divide perennial plants that have become over-grown is a common question with home gardeners at this time of year.

William H. Snyder, University of Idaho horticulturist, has the following suggestions: Divide the plants after they have finished blooming. This means spring blooming plants are usually divided in mid-summer, and fall blooming plants are divided in the late fall. Plants divided in the fall commonly re-set in the spring early enough to give the plant adequate time to establish itself before blooming again.

"After perennials grow for a while," Snyder explains, "the root system grows and becomes matted. The good, vigorous plants are at the edge of the clump. The centers of clumps three or four years old are dead and non-flowering. These should be discarded, and only the new plants at the edges re-set."

Snyder stressed that new, luxuriant plants are less subject to insects and disease, making the job of growing them easier. With plants that mat tightly, such as Shasta daisies, Snyder suggests digging in on both sides with a spading fork and lifting the clump out. Cut the roots apart with a sharp knife and re-set. "Perennials have the ability to take a lot of punishment and neglect," Snyder points out, "but they generally respond to light feedings with complete fertilizers. Use a tablespoonful of 4-12 fertilizer about the base of the plant and work it in well after the plants are established and growing."

PROPOSE POWER SUPPLY FOR DAM

Spokane — The Washington Water Power Co. has submitted a proposal to supply the electric power needed during the construction of the big Bruce's Eddy dam on the Clearwater river, according to Kinsey M. Robinson, chief executive officer of the utility.

Some preliminary work is now being done at the Bruce's Eddy site and WWP has been providing electric power to three contractors involved in this early work. The big 300,000 kilo-watt project will be constructed under the direction of the U. S. Corps of Engineers, and it is expected that bids for actual construction will be sought in the near future.

Robinson said that W. W. P. is the only power supplier in the area with adequate facilities already available to serve the temporary power load the construction program will require.

"We have a 110,000 volt transmission line that virtually passes over the Bruce's Eddy site," he said, "and sale of construction power by W. W. P. can result in substantial benefits to the State of Idaho and the federal treasury through added tax payments by the company."

DRUNKEN DRIVERS MUST PAY PRICE

Boise — Convicted drunken drivers can no longer plead that driving a car is necessary for their regular livelihood in an effort to obtain a restricted driving permit, the Department of Law Enforcement announced last week.

A bill carrying the emergency clause, which makes it operative immediately upon being signed, completely eliminates the temporary restricted driving permit for the convicted drunken driver and makes him a passenger or pedestrian for at least 90 days. It was one of several signed by Gov. Robert E. Smylie within the ten-day grace period after the legislature adjourned.

The new statute merely changes from mandatory driver's license revocation upon conviction for drunken driving to mandatory license suspension for 90 days for the first offense; six months for the second offense if within two years, and a year's suspension for the third offense if within a three-year period.

Under the former system of revoking the license of the convicted drunken driver, a so-called "hardship" clause made it possible for the issuance of a restricted "driving permit" upon recommendation of the judge entering the conviction and upon a showing that the regular livelihood of the person whose license or driving privilege had been revoked required such person to operate a motor vehicle. The temporary, restricted permit can no longer be issued when a license has been suspended.

YOUTH CAMP PLANS BEING MADE

Boise — Camp Pioneer No. 3, the Idaho Youth Conservation Camp authorized as a permanent project by the 37th session of the Idaho State Legislature, will open Monday, June 24, and end Sunday, August 18, says State Forester Roger Guernsey.

He said 63 boys will be selected — each county to be authorized the same number of boys as it has members in the state House of Representatives.

The state forester said that the general aim will be to select boys by public drawing as in the past. "However," he added, some Legislators and others feel strongly that some screening should be done to select the more needy boys, boys from broken homes or boys who appear destined to become school drop-outs.
