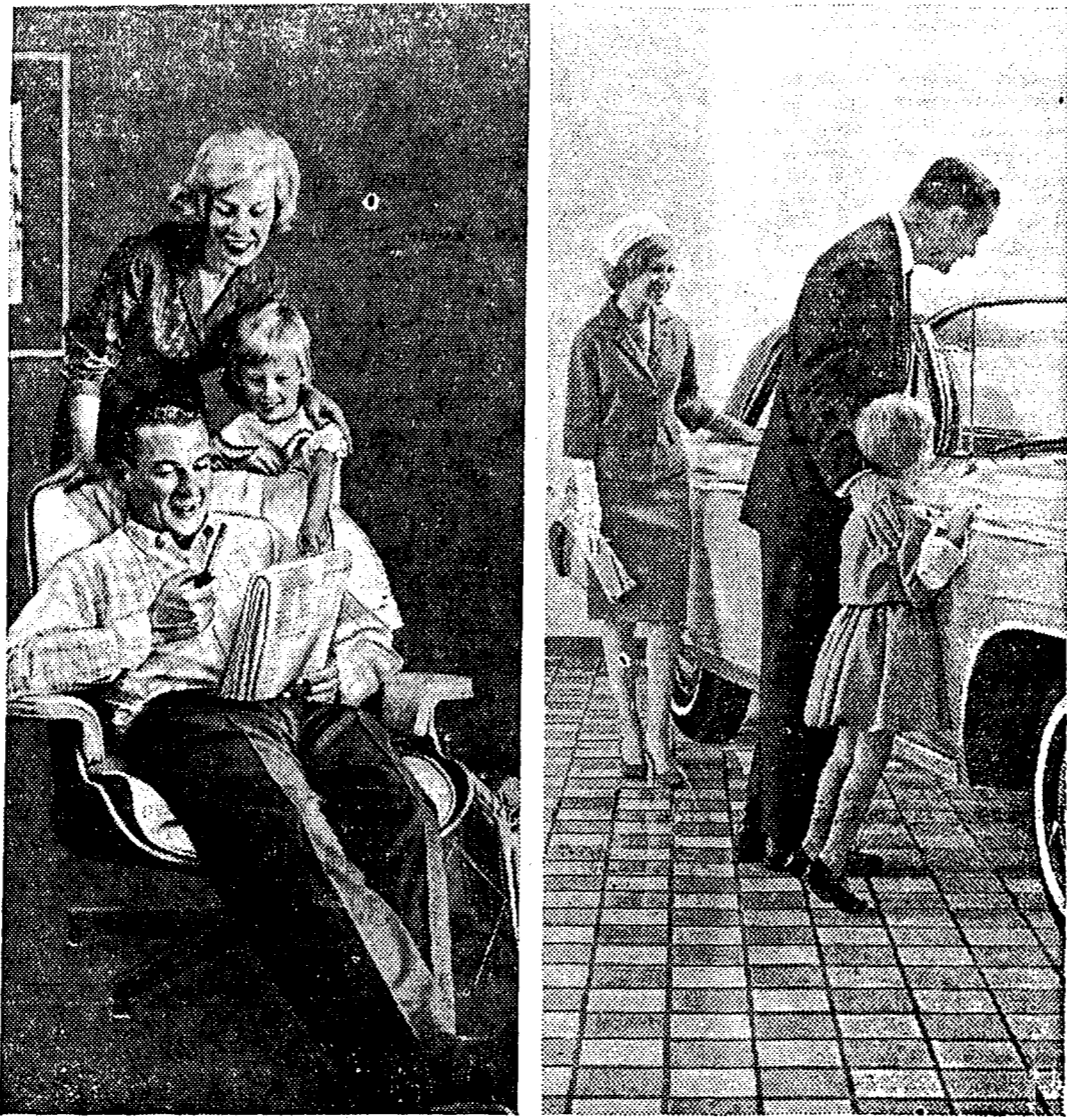

FINAL SNOW SURVEY MADE

The snow survey on Moscow Mt. was taken Saturday by Jim Logan and John Holman of the University of Idaho Engineering Experimental Station, and Bob Vollrath of the Soil Conservation Service. The only snow remaining on Moscow Mountain is on the protected north slopes at higher elevations.

Moscow Mountain snow course, which is the highest in the watershed, still has an average snow cover of 13.2 inches with a water content of 4.9 inches. The May 1 survey of last year showed a snow cover of 14.4 inches with a water content of 5.9 inches.

The snow surveyors were able to drive the snow courses, but with some difficulty. The roads are wet and muddy on the south slopes, and partially covered by ice and snow on the north slopes.

The snow survey on Moscow Mountain is taken each year from Decem-

ber 1st to June through the cooperative efforts of Professor C. C. Warnick of the engineering experimental station, University of Idaho; Lath Soil Conservation District supervisors, and the Soil Conservation Service.

YOUTH CAMP HAS OPENINGS

Boise, State Forester Roger L. Guernsey announced today that there are still many openings for the Idaho Youth Conservation Camp to be held again at Priest Lake. He said that applications have been coming in rather slowly with only eleven of the counties heard from so far. This means that any able bodied young man between the ages of 14 and 17 who wishes to attend this camp has an excellent chance of having his name drawn. Sixty-three (63) boys will be selected, with each County allotted the same number of boys as the County has Representatives in the Legislature.

The State Forester emphasized that Camp Pioneer is not a camp for delinquents. He said they expect to have a good cross-section of boys from all over the State and from all walks of life, just the same as at the first two camps. He said that the boys learn to live and work together in one of the world's finest workshops - they work hard, play hard after work and on weekends, and eat heartily. The camp is designed to develop boys mentally, physically, morally, and spiritually.

Boys are paid \$30 per month with board and room furnished, plus transportation to and from camp, medical care, and boots and socks. Any boy interested should write immediately to the State Forester, Boise, for an application blank. The deadline for returning applications is May 20. The camp will start on June 24 and close on August 18.

IDAHO EXHIBITS SHOWN IN OHIO

By privilege of a welcome-guest invitation, Idaho is exhibiting at this year's Greenville, Ohio, Sportsman's Show May 21 through 25 though no budget money is available for a booth or space at the event, Louise Shaddock, head of the State Department of Commerce and Development stated today. The friendly interest of the Ohio show's sponsors made it possible for the state to send a real 'welcome to Idaho' exhibit to this area which has always sent a big share of tourists and visitors here.

Four posters in color will show Idaho's famous Indian-bred Appaloosa horse, fantastically shaped mountains and jewel lakes, a water fall typical of the state that has falls higher than Niagara, and a ghost town of gold rush days. Idaho's color folder and official highway maps will be provided and as a practical help to visitors from the Mid-west a large volume of booklets which locate Idaho's many hundreds of public campgrounds, parks and picnic areas in every inviting setting for outdoor enjoyment including mountain, wood, lake and river locations, and among Idaho's unrivaled primitive and wilderness areas. 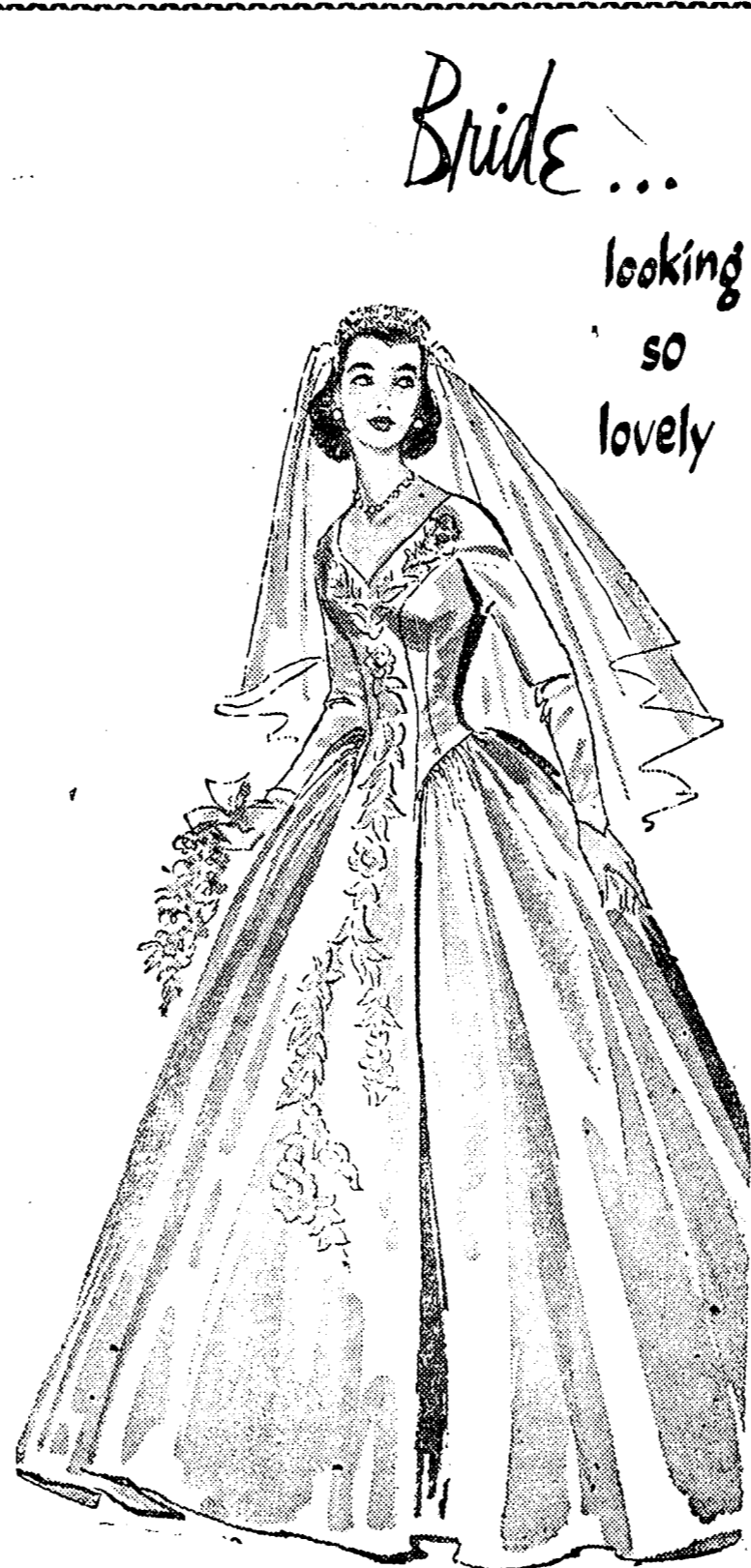

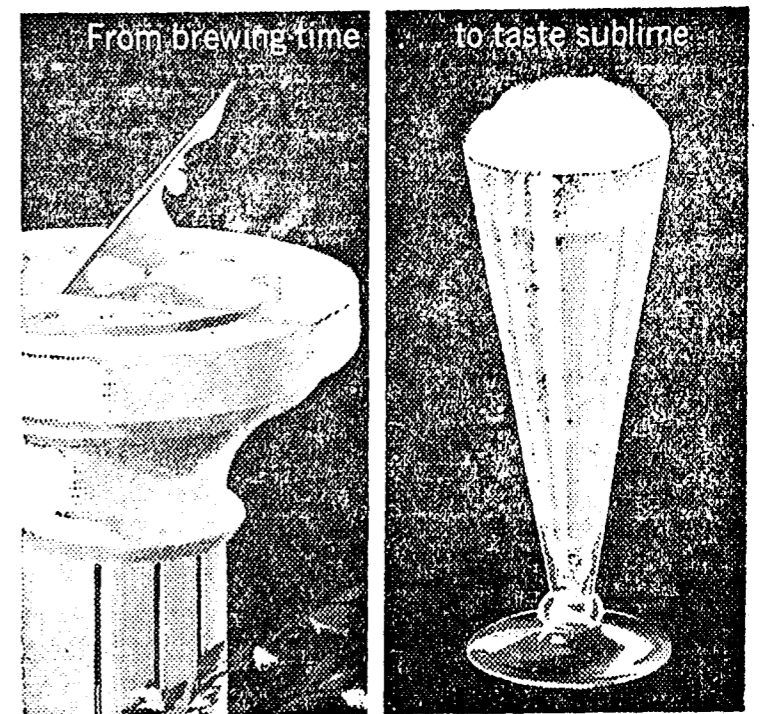

LOAD LIMITS OFF

Effective immediately the speed restriction and load limits will be removed from State Highway 43 between Mile post 48.7 and Elk River. Present load limits are a maximum of 300 lbs per inch width of tire with 12,000 pounds maximum on any one axle, with 10,000 pounds allowable on front axle if equipped with 10 inch tires or larger and a speed limit of 30 miles per hour for all trucks or buses with a gross weight of 10,000 pounds or more.

IDAHO NAMES NEW BASKETBALL COACH

U. of I., Moscow, James Goddard, 33, who has been turning out championship basketball teams for Lewis and Clark college at Portland, will become the new head basketball coach at the University of Idaho, succeeding Joe Cipriano, who resigned recently to become head basketball coach at the University of Nebraska.

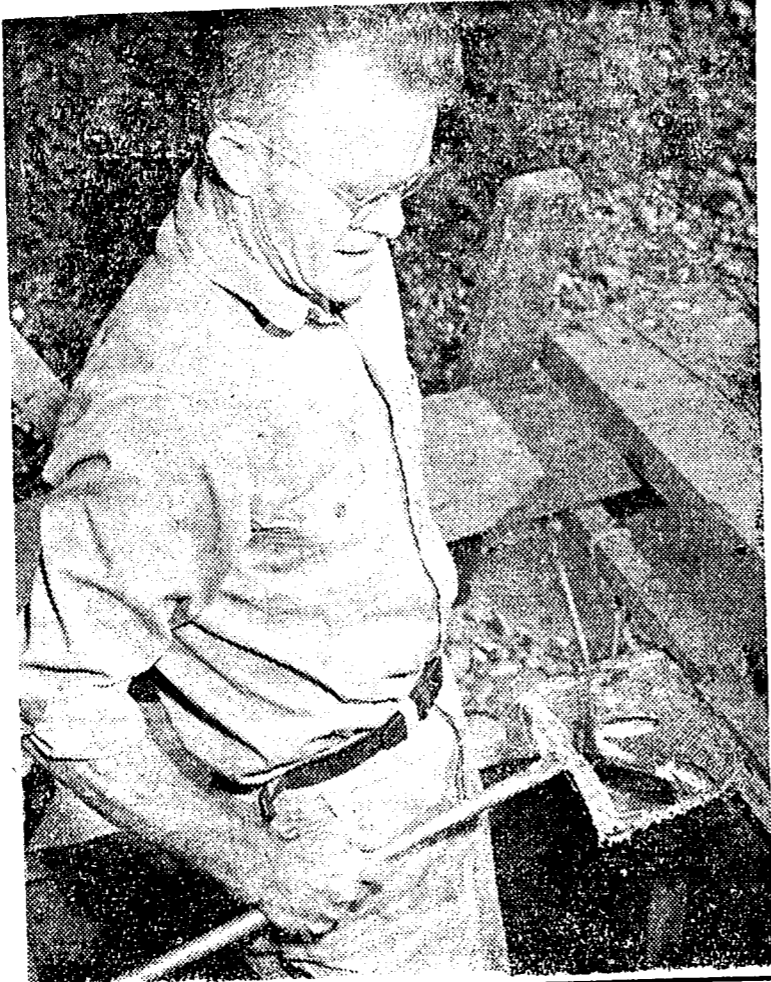
President D. R. Theophilus of the University of Idaho made the announcement in Boise after receiving approval from the Board of Regents meeting there.

Goddard has been head basketball coach at Lewis and Clark the last four years, and twice has taken his team to the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics championships for small colleges. Last year, Lewis and Clark reached the quarter-finals in the national contest. Goddard coached James Boutin, the first small college all-American Lewis and Clark has had in a decade.

As a student himself at Lewis and Clark, Goddard won three letters in basketball and two in baseball. He played on two Northwest conference championship teams. Graduated from the University of Lewis and Clark in 1952, he later received a master's degree from the University of Oregon.

A native of Salem, Oregon, Goddard was graduated from Benson high school in Portland, and did his first coaching in that city at Lincoln high school, serving as basketball coach there from 1952 to 1955. During the academic year of 1955,56, he taught physical education and coached swimming at Oregon State university. The next two years, Goddard served as assistant basketball and assistant football coach and golf coach at Lewis and Clark before being moved up to head basketball coach.

Married, Goddard is the father of three children.



FISH SCREENS SAVE TINY SALMON

Salmon fingerlings like these are prevented from entering irrigation ditches and certain death by the installation of fish screens at the heads of the waterways. Altogether, the Fish and Game department plans about 250 screens for irrigation on the Salmon, Lemhi and Pahsimeroi river drainages in the next few years.

The work began in 1958, and 166 screens have been installed so far. Holding the fingerlings is Wes Lowe, fish screen maintenance operator.

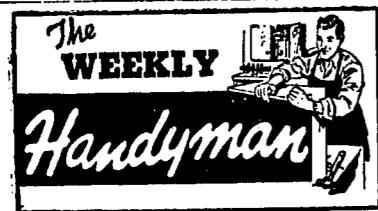

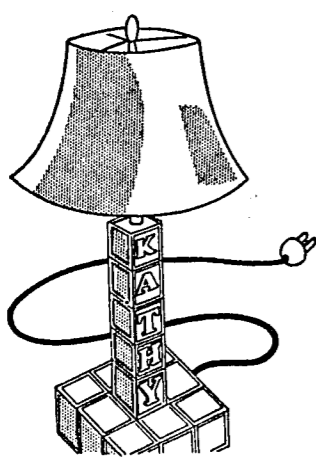

Not all of our readers have problems. Many have discovered uses for outmoded furniture or equipment and toys and pass them along to us.

Since some of these ideas will be of general interest, we will pass them along from time to time. Here's one:

Although a child often grows tired of toys, this does not mean the toys have lost their value. Alphabet blocks, for instance, can be used to make a name lamp for the child's room.



Make a name lamp for a child's room.

This is done by arranging the blocks in such a manner that the post will spell out the youngster's name or nickname. Blocks not figuring in the spelling can be painted a solid color or the letters can be removed with the aid of a portable electric sander.

The base of the lamp can be formed by gluing the blocks together in whatever order best suits the builder's imagination. Bore a hole through the post with your portable electric drill for the wire and socket, another through the bottom for the drop cord.

Another reader found a unique use for an old rotating piano stool: Convert it into a lazy Susan. He covered the stool top with a round piece of hardboard formed with this portable electric jig saw, and repainted the whole thing in bright colors.

Such an idea can be enlarged by adding dividers on outer edge on the round hardboard tray. Some do-it-yourselfers may want to cover the hardboard with ceramics to still further enhance the stool's position as a conversation-piece. Others may want to shorten the legs of the piano stool to coffee table height.

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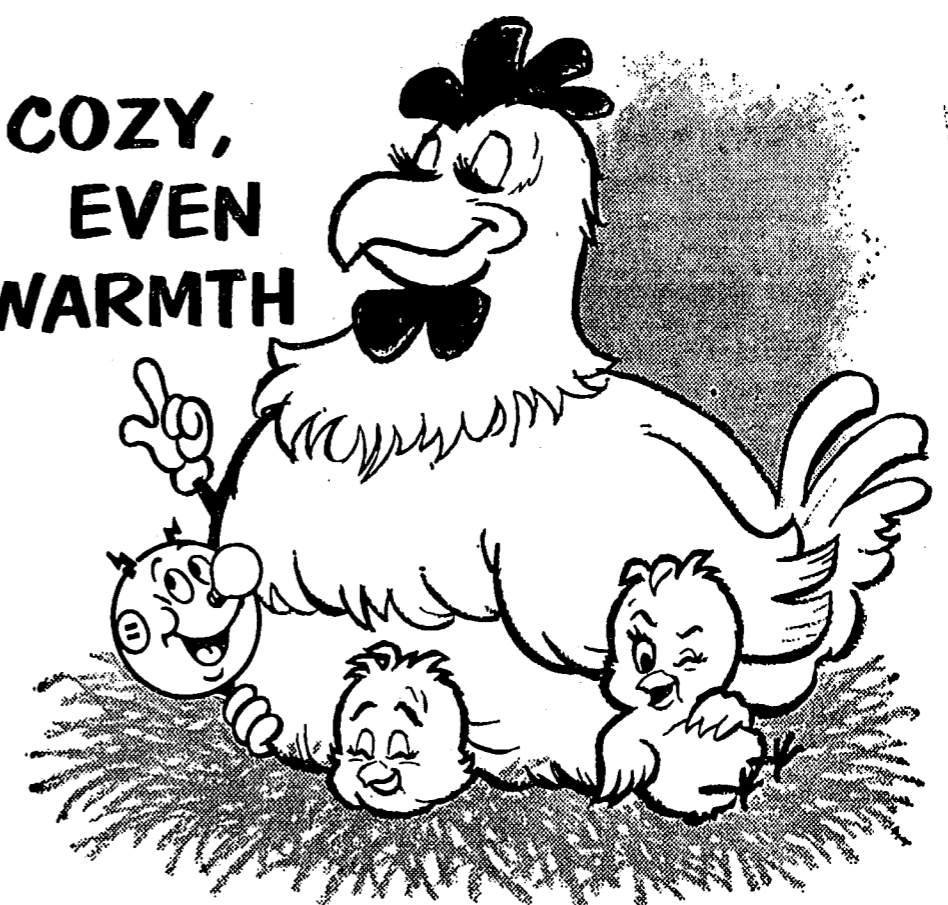
