A Bit of History

Mrs. Annie Wilson Longeteig was born in Humbolt County, Calif., May 28, 1878, a daughter of Andrew and Elizabeth Wilson. She was one of eight daughters and one son.

In 1881 her parents "homesteaded" the ranch that now belongs to Mr. and Mrs. Leo Lohman. During those years it was not uncommon for an Indian to stop for a meal. Many a night the mother slept near the children, holding a loaded gun, because of the activities of Chief Mox-Mox. Later the family moved to Oregon and then back to Lewiston.

Annie Wilson married Nels Longeteig in 1897 at Southwick, at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Chris Longeteig. His father operated a store at the site that is now known as the "Mabry Place." The house is still standing.

The Longeteigs moved to Russell Ridge where a son, Johnnie, and a teig Bales were born. They moved to Cavendish in 1909, and a year later to Southwick, where they operated the hotel and livery stable, located on the site of the present Clay King residence. Southwick at that time was a thriving community.
