NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that pursuant to Ordinance No. 507 of the Village of Kendrick, Latah County, Idaho, a special election will be held in said Village on Tuesday, the 2nd day of July, 1963, between the hours of 12:00 o'clock, A. M. and 8:00 o'clock, P. M., Pacific Daylight Saving Time, for the purpose of voting upon the question and proposition of issuing bonds and the incurring of a general municipal indebtedness of the Village of Kendrick, Idaho, in the principal amount of \$30,000.00, for the purpose of acquiring funds to pay a part of the cost of the construction of additions and betterments to the sewer system of said Village, pursuant to the provisions of said Ordinance No. 507 of said Village, passed and approved by the Board of Trustees at a Special meeting of said Board held on May 28, 1963, which Ordinance is hereby referred to for further particulars and which by reference is made a part of this Notice.

Said bonds shall bear a rate, or rates, of interest of not in excess of Five per cent (5%) per annum, payable semi-annually, shall be of the denomination of \$1,000.00 each, and shall run for a period of twenty (20) years from date of issue, which shall be the ultimate maturity of said bonds, the first annual amortized principal payment shall mature and be payable at the expiration of two years from and after date of said bonds, and the annual principal bond maturities thereof, and the principal amounts which will be payable annually, shall be amortized in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Bond Law of the State of Idaho, as provided in said Ordinance No. 507. The principal and interest of said bonds shall be paid out of a general tax upon all the taxable property within the limits of said City, which tax has been provided for by a Sinking Fund for the payment of said bonds at their maturity and within twenty (20) years from the date of issue thereof.

The question to be submitted to the electors shall be by ballot reading substantially as follows:

"IN FAVOR OF issuing bonds to the amount of \$30,000.00 for the purpose stated in Ordinance No. 507
"AGAINST issuing bonds to the amount of \$30,000.00 for the purpose stated in Ordinance No. 507

(and if desired other information and explanatory matter may be placed upon said ballots)
The voting place for said election shall be at the FIRE HALL in Kendrick, Idaho.

Said electors are required to have and possess the qualifications of electors of the State of Idaho as required by the Constitution and Laws thereof, and to have resided within the limits of said Village for three months preceding said election and to be registered as required by law. Those electors who have registered for the last preceding general election held in said Village are not required to register again for the election herein noticed so long as he or she shall continue to reside at the address in which he or she is living and from which he or she shall have registered, but those who failed to register for said general election, or thereafter, or have failed or neglected heretofore to vote for two successive biennial village elections, are required to register in order to vote for the election herein noticed. If an elector has registered and has removed by the Village and has remained away for a period of one year, his name shall be stricken from the register, and if he shall again reside in the Village for at least thirty days, he shall again register. 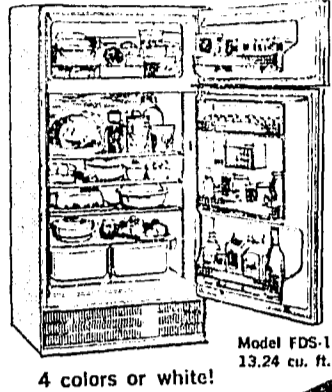

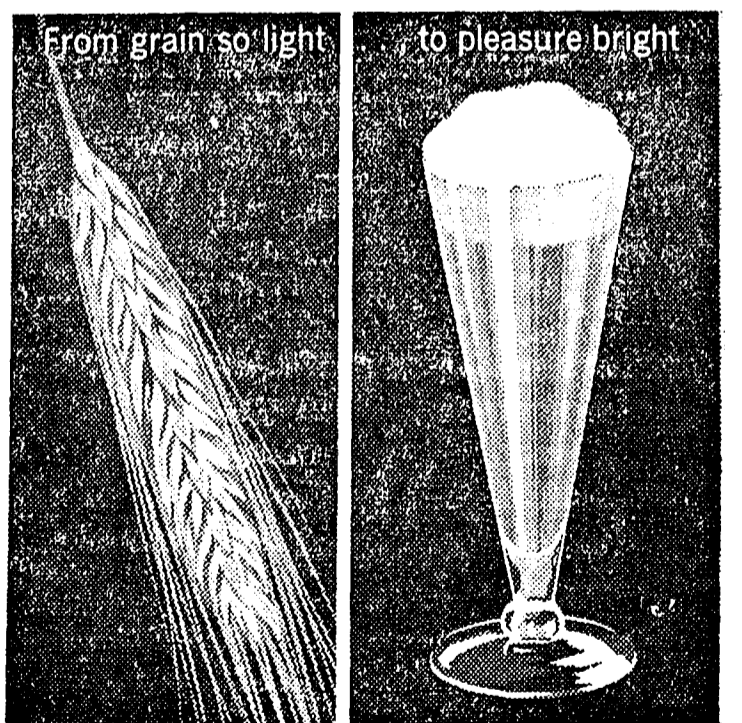

DRIVE CAREFULLY, IT REALLY PAYS OFF

Boise — It's too early to hand out bouquets because Idaho's traffic death toll stood 21 percent below that of 1962 the latter part of May.

Every one of the 56 crashes that killed 60 people were needless. Many of the 80 drivers involved piled up an unprecedented number of indicated violations or out-and-out infractions of the law. Although some of the drivers were found by investigating officers to be blameless, there were several two-car crackups in which both drivers defied the law.

In the total of 68 violations so far recorded (several of the investigations have not been completed) speed topped the list at 26. Liquor was more prevalent in these fatal accidents than in most groups of reports for a like period, although there was only one case definitely stated to be drunken driving. In one accident, which involved several "goofs" on the part of two drivers to result in the death of a passenger, both drivers had been drinking. However, their blood alcohol levels were lower than the percentages set to establish drunkenness beyond a doubt. In any event, a human being is dead.

Driving left of center was a fault noted on the part of 12 different fa-

tal accident drivers. Most of them were driving on highways with clearly marked center lines. Five motorists ran Stop signs and smashed into other vehicles, causing their own deaths or the deaths of others. Four of them made improper left turns into the paths of other cars, four failed to yield the right of way, two were eager beavers and were listed as improperly over-taking, while only one was noted to have been passing another vehicle improperly.

All the reports are not in. Most of the speeders committed some of the other death-dealing errors, although some of them just couldn't beat nature's laws when they rounded sharp curves.

It might be assumed that these driver violations are actually not any more frequent than they have been in the past. It is highly probable that investigating officers are taking a closer look at each fatal crash and determining at least part of the causes after the 1962 record high of 272 dead!

From the closer scrutiny of what has happened could come the prevention for what might happen.

KENDRICK AREA TO HOST COUNTY AG. TOUR

The Kendrick area will be host to the annual Latah County Agricultural Tour on Wednesday, June 19. The tour will assemble at Deary at 9:00 a. m., and make the first stop at the Brownie Barger farm, to see clover for silage and see his Angus cattle.

At the Chas. Bower farm the attention will be on grass seed production, new stock pond and contour strip cropping.

Further down Big Bear ridge there will be interesting things, such as Climax Timothy seeding on the Gerald Ingie farm, and wheat fields treated with selective weed spray on the Clemm Bros' farm.

Over a two-year period Alex Larson has been carrying out a systematic chemical control program on the cattails in his pond. These were well established plants 10 feet high when he started, and the visitors will see for themselves what the results have been.

Many nice looking crops of grain will be seen along the route, and excellent green manure clover-alfalfa is also to be seen.

Noon lunch will be in the Kendrick city park, and provided by the ladies of the Kendrick Grange. The group will hear from Geo. Brocke, Sr., as he discusses prospects for growers of clover, grasses and other specialty crops.

In the afternoon the tour will proceed to American ridge and see several fields of grass devoted to seed production, and hear about its handling and management from the grower, Dick Benscoter. The tour will end at the Ernest Andrews farm after seeing Rape Seed production.

This tour is sponsored annually by the Extension Service in Latah County, the county weed supervisor, and the Latah Soil Conservation District.

All farmers and business men are invited to attend the tour and get better acquainted with the farming scene in the Kendrick area.

HISTORIC ITEMS TO BE DISPLAYED

U. of I., Moscow — Photographs and documents of special significance in the history of Idaho are on display in the University of Idaho library.

The exhibit, assembled by Charles Webbert, social science librarian, will remain for student and public inspection throughout the summer.

In the display windows are copies of the original journals of the Lewis and Clark expedition and a map of its 1805 trip; pictures of Elias D. Pierce and the results of his discovery of gold in 1860; the first and last pages of the elaborately decorated bill signed by President Lincoln making Idaho a territory; a picture of the first territorial governor, William H. Wallace.

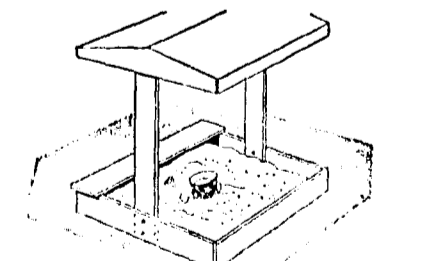

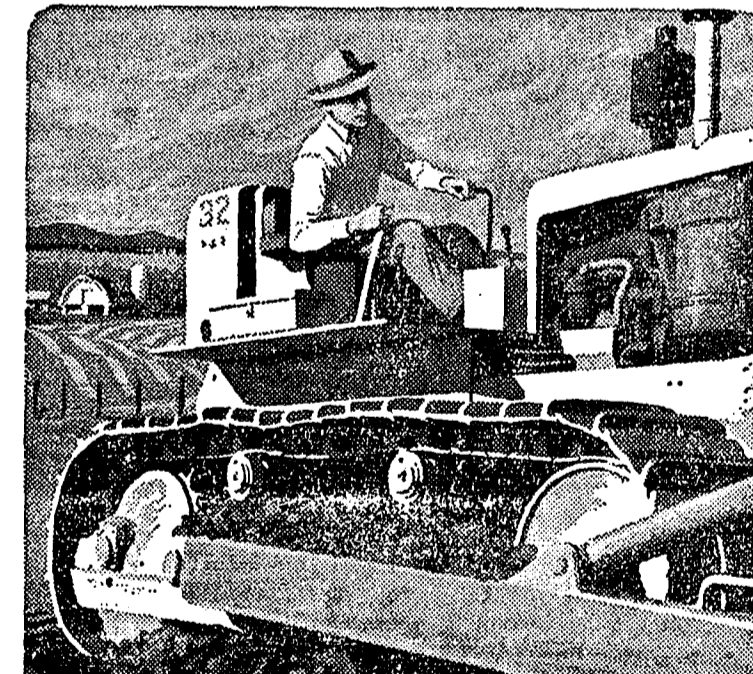
