
A Service of Thor Research Center For Better Farm Living

Q. Do you have plans available for a sandbox with a sunshade? A. The plans we prepared for this reader will provide a rewarding do-it-yourself project for anyone who has small children. The sandbox can be cut, assembled, painted and prepared for use over

the weekend. It is 3 feet 10 inches wide, 4 feet long, has a bench on which youngsters may sit or place their "sand cakes" and digging paraphernalia, and an attractive sunshade.

No. 1 white pine is used in constructing all parts of the sandbox, except the roof and bottom, which are sections of 1/8-inch tempered pressed wood.

The only phase of construction which may puzzle an inexperienced home handyman concerns

the angle cuts of the tapered sunshade and mortises suggested for special strength. These aspects are detailed in the free plans, though, and all cutting specified can be accomplished in seconds with portable electric saws designed for the home craftsman. Accuracy, then, is your chief concern.

The 1x4 posts joining the sandbox and sunshade are fastened with 2-inch carriage bolts so the two sections easily can be disassembled for storage if desired.

All material used should be coated with a sealer before coloring with exterior paint, and screws and nails should be countersunk so no metal is protruding to catch and tear clothing.

When the work is completed, just add sand, relax and watch those youngsters beam!






