STORM DOWNS BIG TREE ON HOME

Late Sunday afternoon and evening, following a rather humid period, with the thermometer reading in the 90's, a freak wind and rain storm struck this area. At the edge of the Kendrick park it blew down one of the big Lombardy Poplars that line the east side, and had it not been for guy and power lines the home of Mrs. Lettie Israel would probably have suffered heavy damage.

The lines, which supply power to the swimming pool pumps and lights in the park, plus a guy wire, held the main body of the big tree from the house, the limbs and leaves laying on the roof.

Within minutes after the wind blew the tree down, Dean Hollenbeck, W. W. P. Co. representative was on the job, and "logged" the tree from her home. A few shingles were ruffled up a bit, and considerable litter left in the yard — but the damage was actually very slight.

On the hillside above the Walter and Orville Sparber home the wind took the top out of a big pine tree, sending it against the power lines, and disrupting service at the Sparber and Lawrence Heimgartner homes for a time.

Dead limbs, leaves and rubbish were blown about Kendrick's streets by the storm, but so far as is known no damage of any consequence resulted.

Rain also fell for a time — but more would have been most welcome at Kendrick. However, on top the Big Bear ridge and Texas ridge a real storm developed. There was wind, rain and hail. We understand that in some areas damage was considerable.

FORESTRY TOUR SCHEDULED FOR AREA STUDENTS

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INFORMATION ON IDAHO EGG GRADING LAW AVAILABLE

Because of the numerous inquiries received daily in the State Department of Agriculture about the new egg grading and standards law, Commissioner of Agriculture, Stanley I. Trenhaile has enacted the emergency clause in the law for the entire state of Idaho. This emergency clause will be in effect for six months, beginning July 1, 1963 and ending December 31, 1963. Its purpose is to give small producers time to comply with the law and avoid any hardship due to marketing procedures which might result from the enactment of this particular piece of legislation.

Commissioner Trenhaile said there seems to be much confusion in interpreting the egg law and has set forth the following explanation of the emergency clause:
1. The enactment of the emergency clause relates only to all small Idaho producers having a flock of 300 or less hens.
2. Those Idaho producers having 300 or less hens who so desire can come under this emergency clause. Those who do not desire to do so may grade and sell their eggs and sell them as such or sell to an egg buyer who will grade and grade the eggs before offering them to the retail market.

3. All Idaho producers coming under the emergency clause must mark their cartons "Ungraded" and brand the carton with their name and address when their eggs are offered to the retail market at a place other than the place of production.
4. It is not necessary for ungraded eggs to have an official state seal attached to the carton.

For those not coming under the emergency clause and after the emergency proclamation has expired, Commissioner Trenhaile had this to say:
1. All eggs sold on the retail

market must be candled and graded.
2. All cartons must be designated as being one of the following, "Idaho Consumer Grade AA, Idaho Consumer Grade A, Idaho Consumer Grade B."
3. All cartons must bear an official seal, a legible statement of the grade and size of eggs and a legible statement of the name and address of the distributor.

4. Official egg seals, candling licenses and distributor licenses are obtained through the Idaho State Department of Agriculture, 206 Statehouse, Boise.
5. Information relating to candling, grading, equipment and expenses may be obtained from the University of Idaho Extension Service.

IN CASE OF FIRE, WHO DO I CALL?

With the approach of the fire season there again arises the question: "In case of fire, who do I call?" The following answers the question fully and may be classed as vital information. In case of doubt, it can be found in the front of your telephone directory, as follows:

In Juliaetta: Dial 2700 — and stay on the line until you are sure the Fireman receiving your call knows the location of the blaze.

In Kendrick — Dial 4700 — and stay on the line until the Fireman answering your call knows the location of the blaze.

In the case of grass, brush or forest blazes beyond the limits of either of the two villages — Call Kendrick 289-4021 — the call will be received at the State Forestry office in Kendrick. Do not call either the Juliaetta or Kendrick Village Fire Departments, as the call must be relayed from them and slows down the answering time.

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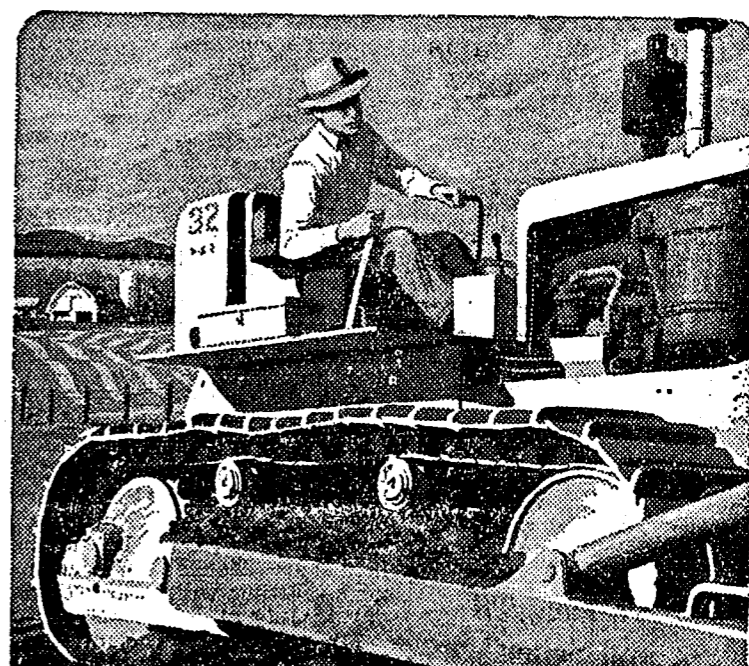
