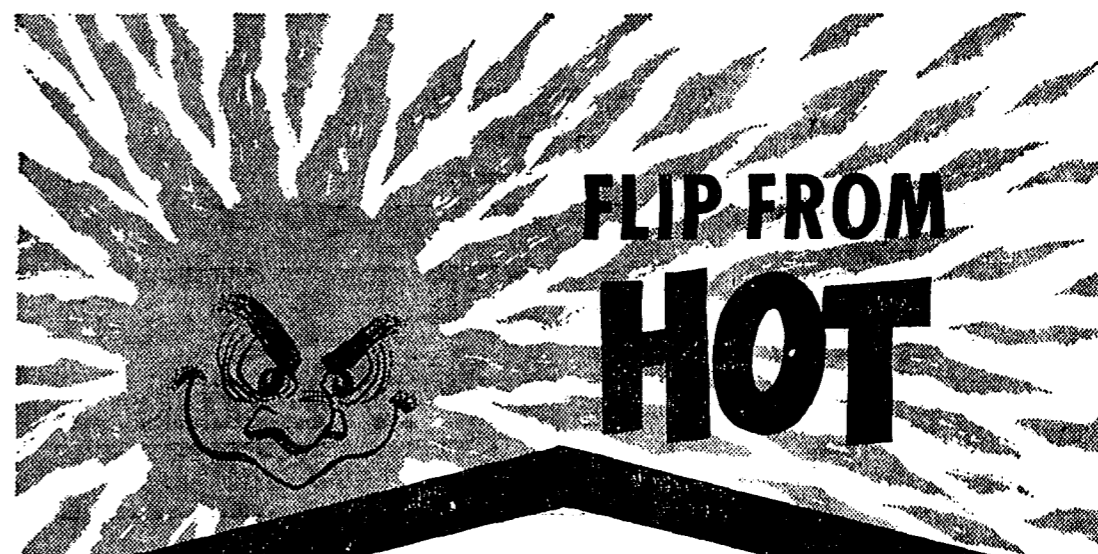
ODD CHARACTER

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Homes Abound with Potential Poisons, AMA Official Warns

Children, supposedly "safe at home," are poisoning themselves at the rate of nearly 1,500 a day.

"When you consider that more than a quarter million home-used products on the market contain toxins, it is not difficult to understand why more than 500 children die each year from self-administered poisons," said F. J. L. Blasingame, M.D., executive vice-president of the American Medical Association.



Medicines account for nearly half of all accidental poisoning in United States each year. Discard unused medicine and keep rest out of children's reach.

Children are naturally curious, especially the very young ones. They are prone to stick into their mouths anything they can get in their hands. It doesn't even have to taste good or look pretty.

Most accidental poisonings occur in children under five. Two-year-olds are the most poisonous, with one-year-olds close behind. At this stage in life their curiosity is at its height and their sense of fear not yet developed, Dr. Blasingame explained.

A primary cause of such accidents, says Dr. Blasingame, is storing poisonous substances in food containers or soft drink bottles. A toddler just naturally assumes that a soft drink bottle contains a treat. He'll drink whatever he finds in it.

"The facts are clear," he warned. "Between 65 and 70 per cent of all poisonings take place because an item was accessible to a child.

"If we're going to live in modern homes with modern conveniences and modern medicines, we have to develop some up-to-date standards that will make home safe for our children."

Among suggestions for lessening the poisoning hazards in the home, Dr. Blasingame suggested:

- Keep potential poisons out of reach and tightly sealed.
- Never transfer toxic materials into household utensils.
- Don't leave your child alone in a room in which you're working with poisons.
- Give medicines only in a lighted room.

If your child might have taken a poisonous substance, call your doctor for instructions at once. Don't wait to see what happens.

COMMENCEMENT HELD AT U. OF I. ON JUNE 8TH

U. of I., Moscow, The University of Idaho's 68th commencement exercises held June 8 in the centennial

year made some history of their own. Among the historical "firsts" occurring were:

More than 1000 graduates received academic degrees -- a total of 1,004 (special degrees and commissions brought the grand total to almost 1,200); doctor of philosophy degrees were awarded -- five of them in doctor of education degree, the first doctorate was awarded last year; a commission was granted in the university in the Women's Army Corps to Patricia Ann Hendricks, Sencel, Oregon; the entire program was televised, and the governor of our state Robert E. Smylie gave the commencement address.

Added to the 1,004 degrees were 92 "Ph.T." degrees granted by the Associated Students for "Putting Husband Through." There were also

three honorary doctorate degrees, and 60 commissions in the Armed Forces -- Army, Navy, Marine Corps and Air Force.

In his commencement address at the university's Memorial gymnasium to a crowd of more than 5,000 Governor Smylie stressed the importance of higher education to state, nation and world. He said:

"The American university, especially the state university, never has been an ivory tower, a cloistered community of scholars. It was conceived and has been fostered as an instrument of material progress; but at the same time it has been increasingly looked to as a strong sustaining force in cultural life in its community."

"Our universities and colleges are the real seedbeds for future growth and sound development of Idaho and the nation. The University of Idaho

has grown with the needs of the state it serves. Considering its resources, Idaho has done well by the university -- and conversely, the university has done well by Idaho.

"In Idaho we are now offering the highest calibre of higher education in the state's history. We have available capacity for nearly three times as many college students in 1963 as we did in 1946.

New "Zip Code" Number
"Our five-digit ZIP Code is 83550", Postmaster Mrs. Edith R. Wells announced this week.

"Everyone in Southwick will use this ZIP code on all correspondence to speed mail deliveries and reduce the chances of mis-sent mail," she added.

ZIP Code, the post office departments revolutionary new system of improved mail dispatch and delivery, goes into effect nationally on July 1.

Mrs. Wells stressed the importance of all citizens of Southwick learning this area ZIP code and using it in their return address on all correspondence. In answering mail, she said, the code number taken from return addresses on incoming mail should be used.

"The Code number is literally the last word in mail addressing," Mrs. Wells said. "It shall follow the city and state in addresses. Here is an example:

Mrs. Edith R. Wells
Post Office
Southwick, Idaho 83550

The new code for the first time will permit the post office department to short-cut repeated address readings. The address on mail must often be read as high as eight to ten times by postal employees to get it to the proper destination. Each handling slows the process of mail dispatch and adds to the opportunity for human error.

Mrs. Wells added: "With ZIP code a clerk needs only to glance at the code to know immediately to what national area, state and post office the letter is destined, and to speed it on its way, cutting up to 24 hours off the time between deposit and delivery."

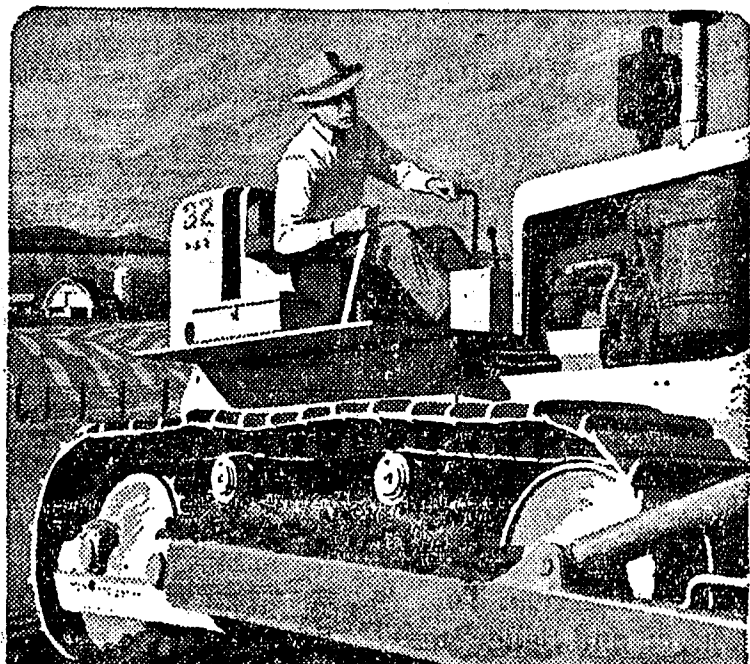
