It should be placed on the same line, but following the city and state. In answering mail, ZIP Codes taken from the return addresses on incoming mail should also be used.

ALFALFA WEEVIL STRIKES IN COUNTY

Moscow — Local alfalfa hay crops are faced with a new insect problem, reports Homer Futter, Latah county agent. Postive identifi-Moscow, was made Wednesday, June

extensive damage from this insect can result.

The alfalfa weevil adult is a small insect with a black snout that puntures the alfalfa stem early in the spring and lays a multitude of eggs inside the stem. These eggs hatch into very small worms, light green in color, that crawl up the alfalfa

Plants inspected by Portman and Futter were infested with dozens of these larvae and alfalfa plants had lost a high percentage of their leaves.

Of course, the leaves of the alfalfa are the most valuable part of the plant for feed, which makes the



Homes Abound with Potential Poisons, AMA Official Warns

Children, supposedly "safe at home," are poisoning themselves at the rate of nearly 1,500 a day.

"When you consider that more than a quarter million home-used products on the market contain toxins, it is not difficult to understand why more than 500 children die each year from self-administered poisons," said F. J. L. Blasingame, M.D., executive vicepresident of the American Medical Association.

Children are naturally curious, especially the very young ones. They are prone to stick into their mouths anything they can get in their hands. It doesn't even have to taste good or look

Most accidental poisonings occur in children under five. Two-year-olds are the most poison prone, with one-year-olds close behind. At this stage in life their curiosity is at it height and their sense of feat not yet developed, Dr. Blasingame explained.

Medicine, especially aspirin, heads the list of items children seem to like to sample, accounting for nearly half of all accidental poisonings. In fact, too drink whatever he finds in it. much of virtually any medicine can produce serious consequences.

Among the supposed nonedibles that frequently find their way into children's stomachs are cleaning and polishing agents, detergents, shoe polish, cosmetics, waxes, insecticides, paint, turpentine, chalk, perfume and decorations.


