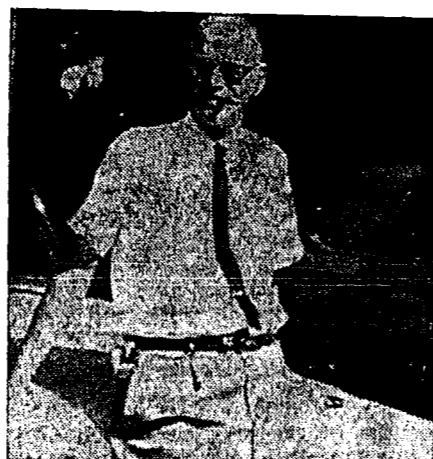

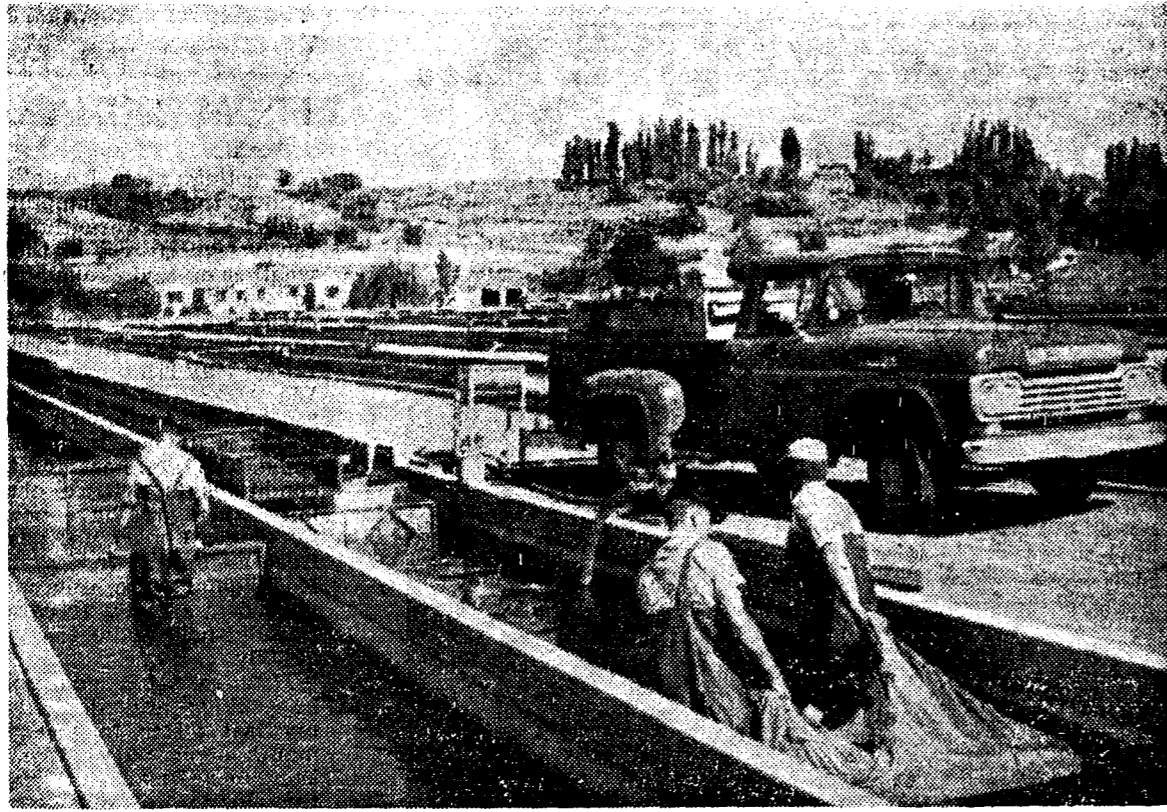

GRADING AND SORTING FISH

Men grading and sorting fish at Hagerman dip fish with nets and deposit them in large hopper connected to an eight-inch aluminum pipe, containing water, which will transfer the fish to an unoccupied raceway more than 200 feet away. This eliminates the need for handling the fish, which might be injurious to them, and reduces labor output. The fish are graded into three size groups to give more equal opportunity in competition for food.

PENALTIES STIFF FOR CONTINUED LAW VIOLATIONS

W. A. Campbell, local Justice of the Peace points out that laws for continued violations of load, height and similar laws are very severe — and from the Idaho Vehicle Laws of 1961, page 140, Section 49-909 quotes: "Penalties for violations — It shall be unlawful and constitute a misdemeanor for any person to violate any of the provisions of this chapter, and any person convicted of such violation shall be subject to punishment by a fine not to exceed \$100.00 or by imprisonment in the county jail for not more than 30 days and to the cancellation of registration of each motor vehicle operated in violation or suspension of traffic issued under the authority of this chapter, and the cancellation of the license of the operator."

Further, Mr. Campbell says that he believes most drivers are not aware of the new violation point count for traffic violations, and he quotes as follows: Backing without reasonable safety, 1; driving on wrong side of road, 3; flashing red light (failure to stop) 3; following too closely, 3; failure to obey police traffic order, 2 one-way island (failure to obey the markings) 2; passing on wrong side, 3 passing without sufficient clearance, 3; passing on hill crest, 3; passing at intersection or grade crossing, 3; passing with view obstructed, 3; passing violation of white line, 4; failure to yield right of way at an intersection, 3; failure to yield right of way on left turn, 3; failure to

yield right of way from private road, 2; failure to yield right of way to an emergency vehicle, 3; failure to yield right of way to pedestrian, 3; right of way failure to use due caution for pedestrian, 3; failure to stop at railroad crossing by school bus, bus or gas truck, 2, and failure to stop for a school bus, 4.

In the line of "variable point violations are: Failure to signal, 3 to 4; speeding, 3 to 4; failure to reduce speed for curve or hillcrest, 3 to 4; violation of posted bridge speed, 3 to 4; failure to obey local posted speed zone, 3 to 4; failure to stop at stop sign, 3 to 4; failure to stop when coming from alley, 3; pulling out from curb without being safe, 2; failure to obey traffic light, 3; turning right from wrong lane, 3; turning left from wrong lane, 3; turning without 500 feet visibility, 3; failure to yield when being passed, 3; failure to yield when entering through highway, 3.

He added that the law says: Departmental action indicated by accumulated violation points — Total of 6, first letter addressed to licensee; total of eight, personal interview or examination; total of 12 or more, license suspension. He recommends that all study the law and obey it.

U. OF I. GETS BIG BEQUEST

U. of I., Moscow, Another major bequest in a will to the University of Idaho — the second in a month — was revealed today by Financial Vice President Kenneth A. Dick.

The latest bequest came from Mrs. Gladys Phlana Wiley Staufenheil, former Spokane resident who died April 28, 1960, at Olympia, Washington. A University of Idaho graduate of 1916 who remembered her "profitable and pleasant years" at the institution, Mrs. Staufenheil left more than \$20,000 to her alma mater to establish a loan fund for deserving students needing financial assistance.

The gift of Mrs. Staufenheil followed closely that of another former coed, Mrs. Mary Hall Nicolls, Bellair, Florida, who left the university between \$400,000 and \$500,000 for scholarships to home economic students. Mrs. Staufenheil designated that \$60,750 should be shared by the University of Idaho, University of Alberta and the University of Washing-

ton medical school. The funds were deposited with the Spokane and Eastern Branch of the Seattle-First National bank as trustee.

A native of Costana, Iowa, Mrs. Staufenheil came with her parents Mr. and Mrs. Myron A. Wiley, to Spokane in 1905. At the University of Idaho, she majored in literature and philosophy, receiving a B. A. degree. She taught school, served as a librarian, and was the author of short stories and poems.

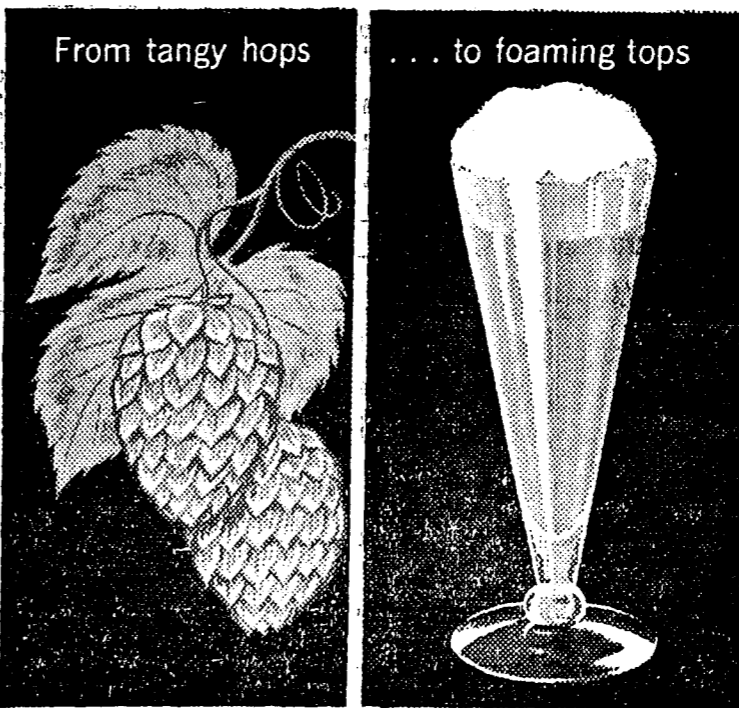

DELINQUENCY IN JUVENILES POSES REAL PROBLEM

U. of I. Moscow, juvenile delinquency, though generally recognized as a big city problem, is increasing more rapidly in smaller communities than in metropolitan areas.

Practical strategies for the prevention of this youth alienation were sought during the 19th annual school administrators' conference at the University of Idaho Thursday and Friday, June 27-28. The conference was co-sponsored by the Idaho School Administrators' association and Pi Delta Kappa, education honorary.

Dealing with the problem that national opinion surveys classify among the top three concerns of the Amer-

ican public (ranking below defense and peace) were school administrators, teachers and counseling and guidance personnel.

"Under the leadership of youth authorities from throughout the nation, conference participants will suggest information that will help identify delinquency potential. Then a preventative approach to the problem can be considered," said M. W. Farley, associate professor of education, and director of the conference. Farley said schools and the various agencies (recreation, church and home) within communities will be studied to determine shared and individual responsibilities to juveniles.

Dr. Garrett Heyns, director, department of institutions, State of Washington, Olympia, Washington, spoke Thursday morning, June 27, on "Alienated Youth: The Unchallenged of Our Society."

HERMINA MEYER WRITES TO FRIENDS FROM INDIA

Greetings from Kodiakanal. As we read of the high temperatures on the plains we are very thankful for the few weeks of rest in the lovely cool weather of Kodiakanal. The beautiful foliage at this high elevation can easily make you forget the heat of the plains. Dorothy arrived in Madras on May 8th in the sweltering heat. We traveled direct to Kodiakanal by second class women's compartment which is a good initiation to life in India. The dirt, heat and the crowded conditions is quite a change especially when you have been traveling by plane. I need not say that both Dorothy and I were glad to get to Kodiakanal. Dorothy and I had a good deal of news to catch up on so this did help make the trip go more quickly.

Now to catch you on a few happenings around Renigunta since my last letter to you. During the month of January there were many things on the agenda, the first being the clearing of my heavy luggage. After one has come by plane and has waited for your things for a couple months you are most eager to get things unpacked. However the length of time and trouble it takes to clear customs almost makes one wish that you had no extra things. When I had to unpack everything on the floor of the customs house I was sure wishing for some help. I did not mind the unpacking but my great worry was how in the world I would get everything back in the trunks. I was fortunate that one box had some paper packing which I could discard and pack some things from the other boxes. I can only be thankful that we have to go through this only once and fortunately one soon can forget and chalk it up to experience.

The second week of January it was my privilege to attend the Christian Medical Association of India Conference in Bangalore. Since Bangalore is only 150 miles away both Miss Brosius, one of our Indian doctors and myself were able to attend. This brought together from all parts of India people engaged in Christian Medical work. There were many interesting and enlightening medical papers and also an opportunity for discussion of problems which seem to be common in all Christian hospitals in India. All of the hospitals seem to have the problem of adequately trained staff. There is such a need for our Indian Christians, to give their service in our hospitals. Since salaries are always much greater in government institutions they are tempted to leave the mission hospital for more pay. May I ask you to pray that God will raise up faithful and dedicated Indians to serve God and their fellowmen.

During the past months our hospital has had the opportunity of having a surgeon and an anesthetist under the World Brotherhood Exchange program. Two of our nurses have learned to operate the anesthetic apparatus from Miss A. Naess who spent three months with us. These two boys were experienced nurses but we were thrilled that they were able to learn so quickly and they have been doing very well with the supervision of the doctors.

Now some news about our training program. The number of students is now five due to one of the students getting typhoid fever in December. He was unable to continue his studies this year but we hope that he will join the course this next year. The other five students are now busily preparing for the examinations which will be coming up July and August. Since the background in English for most of the students is very shallow I am sure they will have a most difficult time expressing themselves. In the previous two classes we have had 100 per cent passes so we do hope that it will continue this way. There is such a demand for the laboratory training. A number of applications have been received for the next year's class and a great many more will come in the next few weeks. The number of students that we can take is only six out of some 100 applications so you can imagine the problem of selections. There are few hospitals that offer this type of training. A great many of the training schools have been forced to close because of the lack of teaching personnel. Since the majority of the staff of these schools are foreign there is always a problem when it is time for furlough. We are very much looking forward to P. Albert's return to India. He will be of great assistance in our clinical laboratory program.

Farming projects news: Jacqueline, the buffalo, had her calf in February named "Fitzgerald II". Some of you will remember that Fitzgerald I died, thus the reason for Fitzgerald II. So far Fitzgerald II is doing well except for worms which is a common affliction for both man and beast in this country. The chickens now have a new bamboo pen. This was built especially to show the Indians that they can build a cheap pen for themselves and many of them die or are stolen. My cook's family enjoy taking care of the chickens and have done a very good job. We get from 16-18 eggs from 22 hens which I think is exceptionally good for India.

This past week we have been able to listen to the new radio station from Ethiopia. The 'Voice of the Gospel' is beamed to India every night between 7 and 8. The broadcasts are in English, Telegu, Tamil and Hindi on various nights. The reception has been exceptionally good.

I wish to thank all of you for the many Christmas letters and cards. I am only sorry I have not found time to answer them all individually. May you continue to uphold the work of his Kingdom here in India in your prayers.

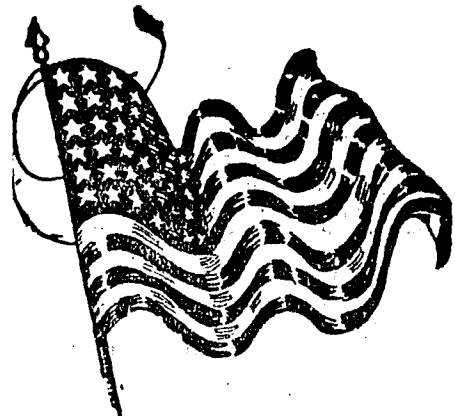
