PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN of the intention of Joint School District No. 283, Nez Perce, Latah and Clearwater Counties, State of Idaho, (designated before July 1, 1963 as Joint Class B School District No. 283, Nez Perce, Latah and Clearwater Counties, State of Idaho), to sell \$285,000.00 of the general obligation refunding bonds of the District.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS FURTHER GIVEN that the District will, on Wednesday, the 24th day of July, 1963, at the hour of 8:00 o'clock P. M., at High School, in Kendrick, Idaho, within the District, receive sealed bids and publicly open the same for the purchase of Joint School District No. 283, Nez Perce, Latah and Clearwater Counties, Idaho, General Obligation Refunding Bonds, Series August 1, 1963 (hereinafter sometimes designated as the "refunding bonds"), or merely as the "bonds", in the aggregate principal amount of \$285,000.00.

The bonds of said series, payable to bearer, will bear date as of August 1, 1963, will consist of 285 bonds in the denomination of \$1,000.00 each, numbered from 1 to 285, both inclusive, bearing interest at a rate or rates not exceeding four per centum (4%) per annum, interest being evidenced until maturity by only one set of coupons, payable semiannually on the first days of February and August in each year, commencing February 1, 1964, both principal and interest being payable in lawful money of the United States of America at the office of the Treasurer of the School District in Kendrick, Idaho, and maturing serially on an amortization plan as provided by the laws of the State of Idaho, the first amortized principal payment maturing and being payable at the expiration of one year from and after the date of issue, and the various annual maturities thereafter being as nearly as practicable in such principal amounts as will, together with accruing interest on all outstanding bonds of such issue, be met and paid by an equal annual tax levy for the principal of said bonds and the interest thereon during the fourteen-year term for which such bonds shall be issued. The bonds will not be subject to prior redemption and will not be subject to registration for payment as to either principal or interest, or both.

The bonds will be direct general obligations of the District and will be payable from general (ad valorem) taxes which may be levied without limitation of rate or amount. Any bidder is required to submit an unconditional bid specifying the lowest rate or rates of interest and premium, if any, at or above par, at which the bidder will purchase such bonds. Each proposal must be in writing for all the bonds herein offered, enclosed in a sealed envelope marked "Proposal for School Bonds", and addressed to A. O. Kankikberg, Clerk, Joint School District No. 283, Nez Perce, Latah and Clearwater Counties, Kendrick, Idaho, and shall be accompanied (except the bid of the State of Idaho or its Department of Public Investments, if one is received) by a cashier's check or certified check made payable to Joint School District No. 283, Nez Perce, Latah and Clearwater Counties, Idaho, in the amount of \$5,000.00, which cashier's or certified check shall be promptly returned to any bidder if the bid is not acceptable.

It is permissible to bid different or split interest rates for said bonds, but only one interest rate shall be specified for any maturity. None of said bonds shall be sold at less than par value and accrued interest to the date of delivery, nor shall any discount or commission be allowed or paid on the sale of said bonds. The Board reserves the privilege of waiving any irregularity, or informality in any bid, or rejecting any or all bids, and of readvertising the bonds for sale or selling them at private sale. The bonds, subject to such reservations, shall be sold to the highest and best bidder for the bonds.

The successful bidder or bidders will be required to accept delivery of and to make payment for said bonds in Kendrick, Idaho, or at the successful bidder's request and expense, at some other bank or trust company in the U. S. A.
