## KENDRICK BUSINESS FIRMS BACK TRADE PROMOTION DAY PROGRAM

Final details were ironed out and financial backing of a retail trades promotion was assured when a group of Kendrick merchants and businessmen met in the Fire Hall Monday evening, and voted to advance funds for the promotion of an "Appreciation Days" campaign.

## SOLAR ECLIPSE TO BE VISIBLE JULY 20

The fascinating sight of a solar eclipse can be expected in the Inland Empire on July 20. The eclipse, in this area, will start at approximately 4:45 p. m. and will last for about 75 minutes. About 75 percent of the sun's surface will be covered.

Herbert Yates, safety supervisor for the Washington Water Power Co. said that the National Society for the Prevention of Blindness has pointed out the danger of looking directly at the eclipse.

"They point out," Yates said, "that there is no safe method of looking directly into the eclipse without risking incurable burns of the retina from infra-red rays of the sun."

A solar eclipse results when the moon, passing between the earth and our sun, hides all or part of the sun from our view. The July 20 eclipse will bring total darkness along a path through Alaska, Canada and Maine, and a partial eclipse in the continental United States, the Caribbean area, and most of Mexico.

"The sun is normally much too bright for a person to view comfortably," Yates said, "but during an eclipse enough light is blocked out to permit easy observation. This is when the rays do their damage — unnoticed, because the retina is not sensitive to pain."

**HOG RAISING PAYS OFF FOR 4-H'ERS**

Brown, like hundreds of other older 4 - H members, is a junior leader. He says, he finds it very rewarding to inspire and help younger boys.

While Brown enjoys being a winner himself, he is a good loser. He told of the time he sold one of his pigs to a neighbor boy at a very cheap price to get the lad started in a much needed money-making project. The boy showed the pig in competition with one of Brown's own Chester Whites at the county fair. The neighbor's pig walked off with the champion brown ribbon.

Said Brown: "I felt good about losing to this young fellow."

And so it is with scores of other young 4-H farmers "learning-by-doing" to raise and sell the best meat-type hogs.

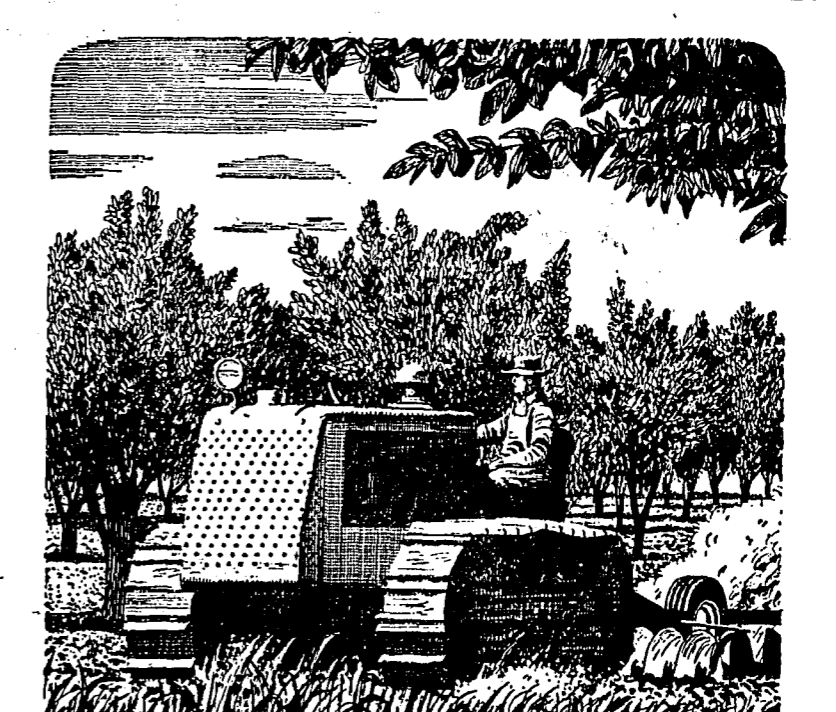
