AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 1 OF ORDINANCE NO. 509 TO PROVIDE FOR A LEVY OF THIRTY (30) MILLS FOR GEN-ERAL REVENUE PURPOSES AND TWO (2) MILLS FOR THE FIRE DEPARTMENT, AND AMEN-DING ORDINANCE NO. 510 TO PROVIDE FOR THE LEVY FOR THE GENERAL FUND AND THE LEVY OF TWO (2) MILLS FOR THE FIRE DEPARTMENT, AND PROVIDING FOR THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS ORDINANCE. BE IT ORDAINED, by the Chairman and Board of Trustees of the

Village of Kendrick, Idaho: Section 1. That Section 1 of Ordinance No. 509, be and the same is hereby, amended to read as follows:

Section 1. There is hereby levied upon the taxable property within the corporate limits of the Village of Kendrick, Latah County, Idaho, taxable according to the laws of the State of Idaho, for the fiscal year for the year 1963, the sum of Thirty (30) mills for general revenue purposes and the sum of two (2) mills for the fire department.




