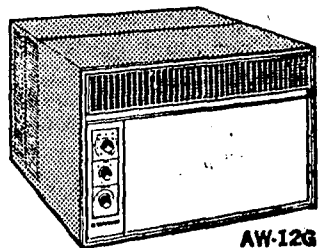

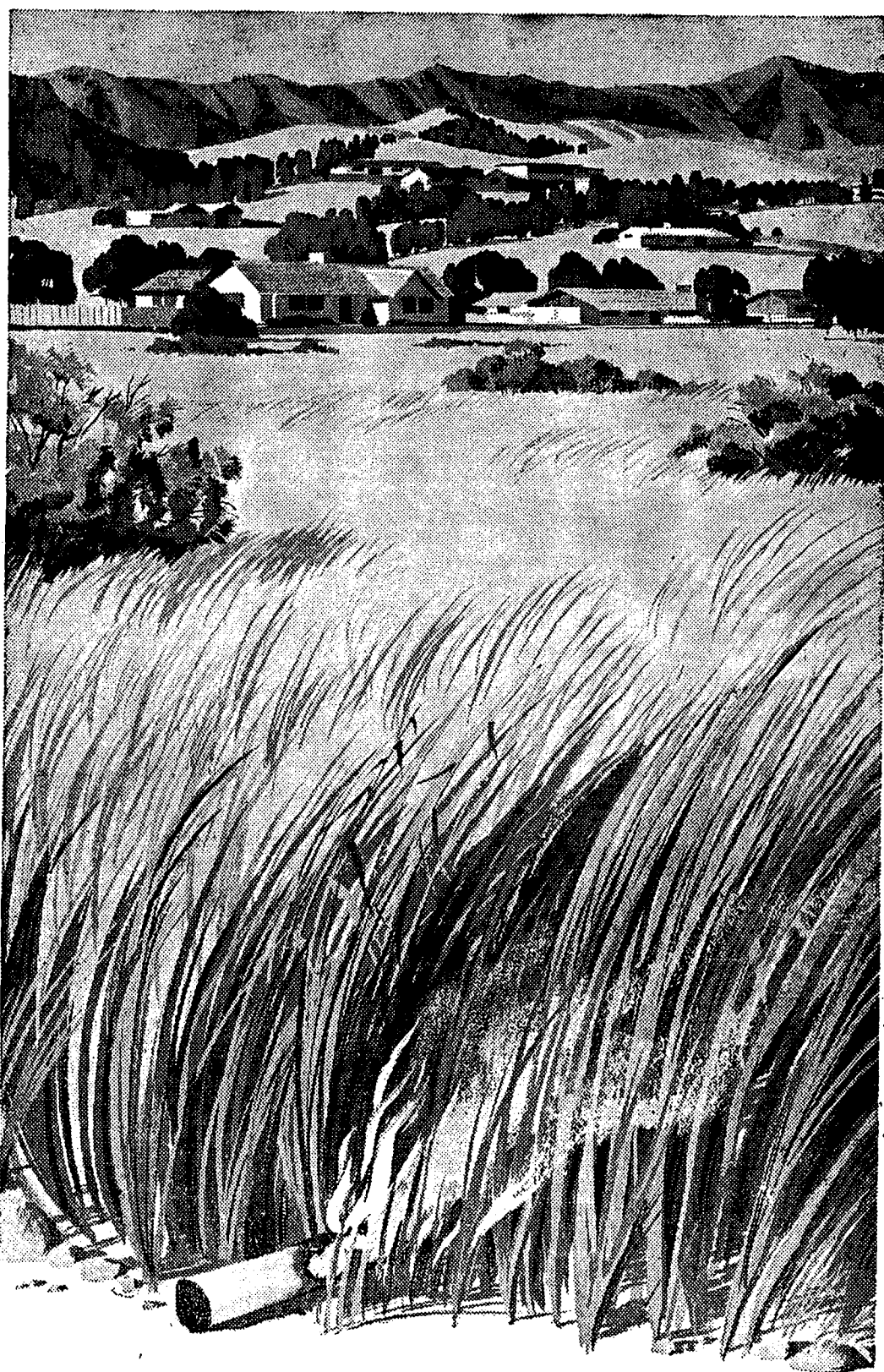

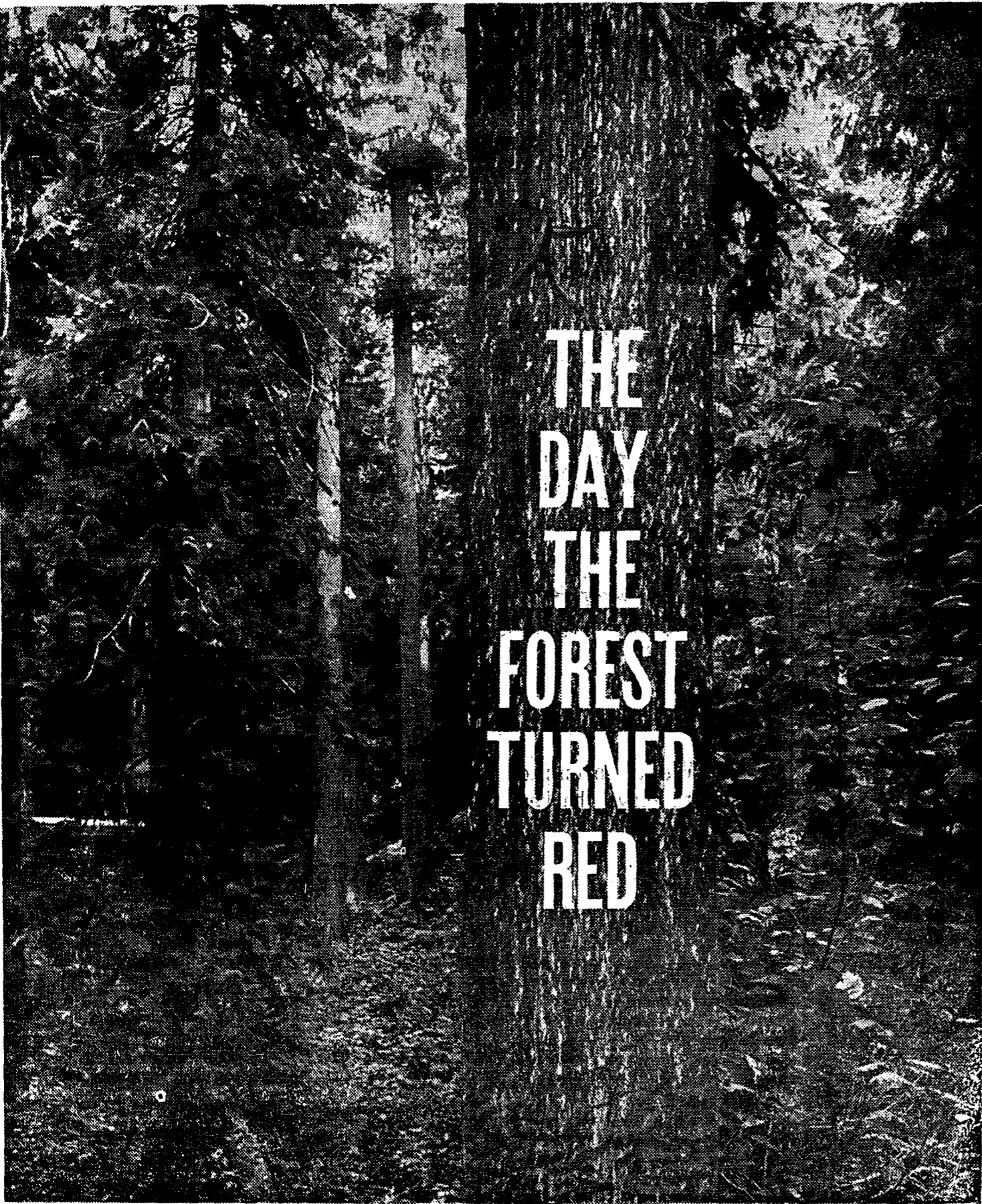

FORMER 4-H'ERS TO BE CITED FOR AID TO YOUTH

Special — Virtually every county in the state has among its residents scores of men and women who spent part of their youth working on 4-H Club projects. Some live on farms, others in small towns or cities. Yet all have a common bond: They grew up in the 4-H tradition of service to others and "learning by doing" skills that they find useful today. There are more than 23 million 4-H alumni in the 50 states, reports the Cooperative Extension Service. Many have continued to work with youth or have helped to advance 4-H in various ways. Their earnest support does not go unnoticed. The county has an opportunity to honor two former 4-H'ers for giving a helping hand to the local club programs or for working in the best interest of the community, state and nation. This year some 1,500 men and women representing nearly every state are expected to receive such recognition. Nominated by friends and neighbors, the finalists are selected by the Extension Service. In addition up to four men and women in the state will be named for the 1963 state plaque award. Nationally, eight persons will be cited for the 4-H Alumni Key Award, which carries with it a trip to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago. All awards are provided through the National 4-H Alumni Recognition program, sponsored, since its inception 11 years ago, by the Olin Mathieson Chemical Corporation. The eight 4-H Key recipients will be guests of that corporation during their Chicago stay, and will be featured at the annual alumni banquet. Among former National Key winners are an astronaut, four governors and five university presidents. Others are U. S. congressmen, clergymen, farmers, bankers, housewives, teachers, editors, and a well-known actor.

INSURANCE RATES TO INCREASE

San Francisco — Accident claim costs in Idaho, which have permitted three decreases in automobile insurance rates since 1958, have now turned upward, and will require corresponding rate adjustments. The National Automobile Underwriters Association and the National Bureau of Casualty Underwriters this week announced state-wide private passenger car rate changes 15 percent higher for liability coverage and 9.7 percent higher for physical damage coverage (pays for damage to the policy holders own car). The two agencies, which develop rates for many, but not all insurance companies doing business in Idaho, said the rate changes have been approved by the Idaho Insurance Department, and as of now, will apply to each policy holder's individual policy as it comes up for renewal. As examples of the effect of the rate change, the annual premium on a frequently purchased type of insurance policy will increase \$13 in Boise and \$9 in the rest of the state. These examples are based on a one-year-old, popular priced family car, not driven to work, with no male drivers under 25, insured for basic limits liability coverage, along with full comprehensive and \$100 deductible collision coverage. 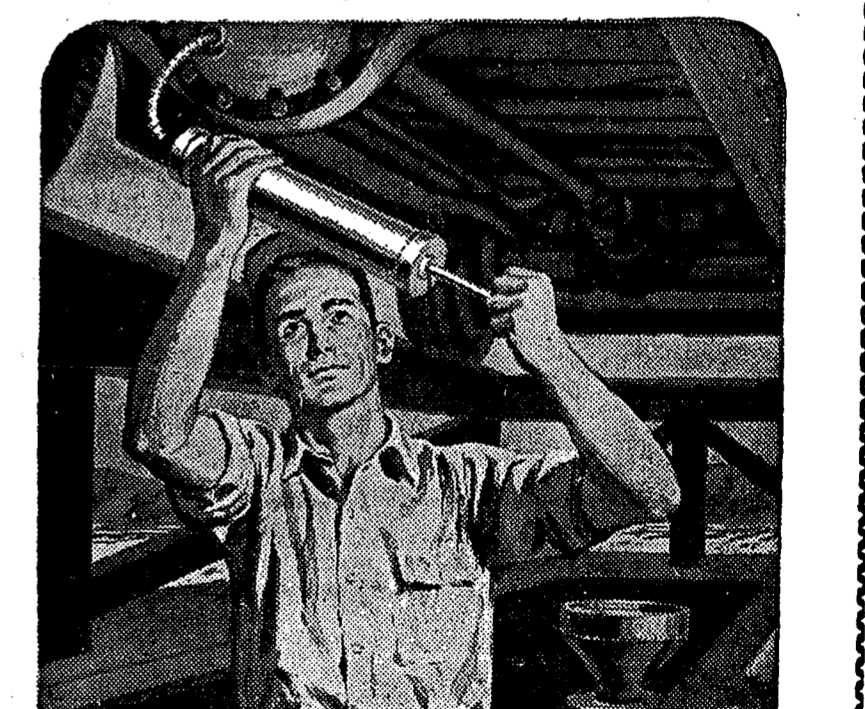
