## TWO CRASHES AT KENDRICK OVER LONG WEEK-END

Friday morning about 1:30 o'clock a new truck being delivered from Lewiston to Ray Brumfield, St. Maries logging contractor, inflicted considerable damage to itself and other items before coming to a stop in the small field belonging to Mr. and Mrs. Lester Wallace in the west part of town.

State Police Lt. Kenneth DeYoung said the brand new 1963 Autocar diesel truck sustained about \$1800 damages and caused about \$400 damage to a parked pickup truck belonging to Don Brown.

He said the truck was being delivered by George F. Biersdorf, 50, St. Maries. DeYoung said Biersdorf failed to negotiate a curve when he entered Kendrick, and the truck traveled some 500 feet while out of control. It narrowly missed the huge trees at the front of the Wallace home and off the pavement to the left, swung back onto the pavement to the right, striking the parked 1952 Ford pickup belonging to Mr. Brown.

It then crossed the highway again, went between a big utility pole and a large locust tree, knocking an electric meter off the pole, and struck some diesel oil tanks at the Union Oil Co. service station (containing an estimated 1,000 gallons of fuel), went across the W. L. Rogers trailer court and plunged into the Wallace field, taking a fence with it.

DeYoung said the pickup truck was parked 12 feet off the highway. The diesel tanks themselves were not damaged, but the contents lost, as they mostly landed up-side-down. Mr. Biersdorf was charged with reckless driving.

Those at the crash scene immediately after it happened said the fire "literally flew" from the downed meter box and light equipment. Had the tanks contained gasoline there would undoubtedly have been a real blaze. Mrs. Wallace said the truck made the 17th vehicle to either hit trees at their home or enter their property!

### Collision Sunday Afternoon

Two drivers were severely shaken up, but believed only slightly injured here Sunday afternoon at about 1:25 when their cars met head-on at the east-end of Main Street almost in front of the Kendrick High School.

State Police Officer Joe Mach, who investigated, said a 1954 Buick operated by James O. Storey, 19, Clarkston, was headed west on State Highway 42, which runs through Kendrick, and a 1952 Chrysler driven by John A. Longteig, 60, Southwick, was headed east.

Mach said the two vehicles collided when Longteig's car crossed over the center line. He said Storey skidded in an attempt to avoid the accident. Longteig was charged with reckless driving.

Storey was taken by ambulance to Tri-State Memorial Hospital in Clarkston, where he was treated for a fractured nose and released.

Longteig was treated by Dr. D. A. Christensen for chest injuries and released. Raymond C. Vowell, 21, Larson Air Force Base, and who was riding with Storey, was not hurt.

Mr. Longteig was later taken to the Tri-State Memorial Hospital at Clarkston for treatment. Dr. Christensen said his injuries were minor, but due to a chronic lung condition complications set in the evening of the accident.

Mach said damage to the Longteig car was about \$1,000. The Storey vehicle was damaged beyond practical repair.

## WASP AND TRUCK

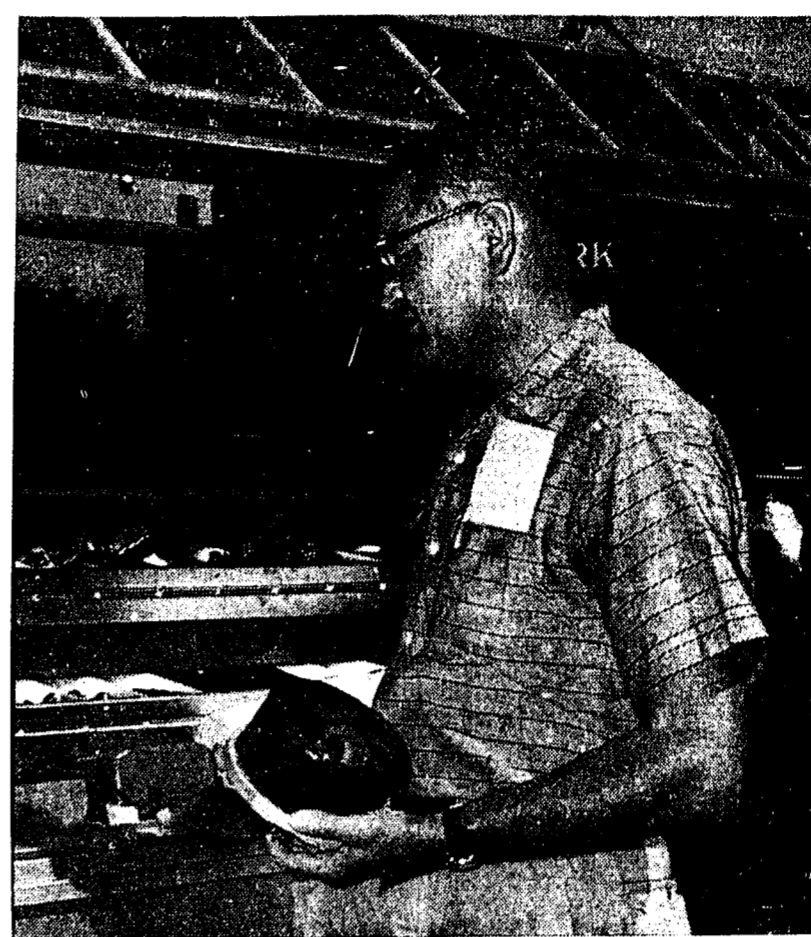

## ROAD WORK IS PROGRESSING

Last week-end seal-coating work was completed on the new link of the Southwick-Kendrick road, and a crew is working at completing the task of installing guard rails from top to bottom of the grade itself. This fine, new highway is indeed an addition to the road system of this area. Although the grade itself is changed but little as regards steepness, it is wider, curves are easier — and the oiled surface is a pleasure to travel.

On Sperry Grade the Nezperce County road crew has completed the grading operations as far as the entrance to the Kendrick Cemetery. The grade has been greatly widened, curves made easier, and in general improved it in every way. At the top of the grade the old sharp curve at the entrance to the Jesse Heffel ranch has been entirely eliminated, a fill being made across the gully nearby. The crusher is operating steadily and gravel being stockpiled for future use.

While receivers have been improved, going from 20,000 volts in the picture tube to a high of 26,000 volts in most of the 1964 Models, also new improvements in the tuners, and the elimination of several of the small tubes, and the setting of the magnets in such a way that they stay in place — even if the set is moved — the greatest improvement of the industry is in the broadcasting of color.

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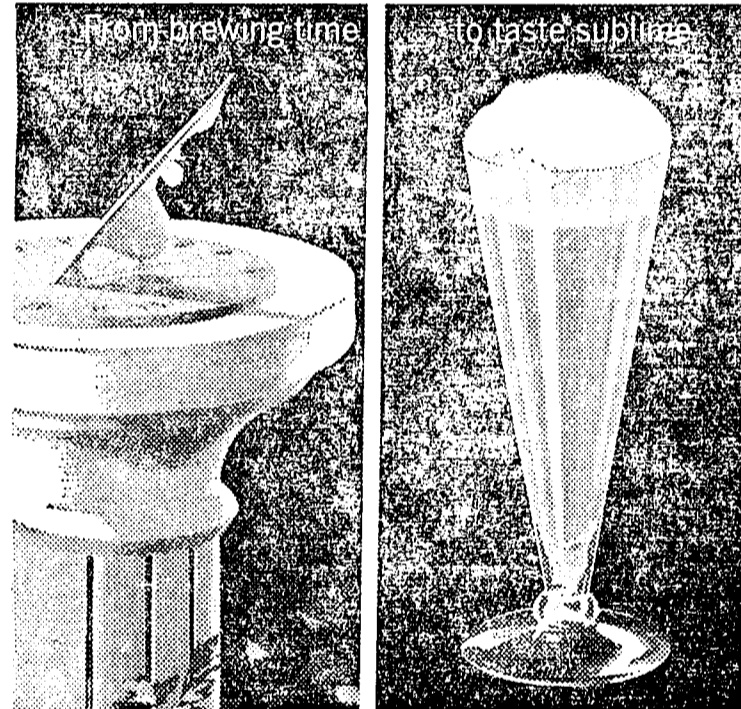
