## RAIN FALLS FRIDAY, TEMPERATURE DROPS

Following many days of temperatures up into the mid-'90's, clouds appeared and rain began to fall on Friday evening, bringing with it a considerable drop in temperatures.  
On some of the ridges, particularly Big Bear, the downpour almost was in the "cloudburst" proportions. It did no damage, however, and was truly welcomed by the farmers, not only for the moisture for fall field work, but also the elimination of fire danger, which was extremely high.  
Saturday and Sunday rain showers continued, and the temperature dropped to the mid-'60's, which necessitated the turning on of stoves and furnaces, for the first time in many weeks.  
Showers were with us again on Monday, but the temperature was on the rise, and the additional rain was welcomed.  
Tuesday there was sunshine, and the thermometer climbed steadily. Bovill, with a reading of 29 above Monday morning, set the nation's pace for lows.  
**Loggers Stopped**  
The rain over the week-end was enough to put a stop to most logging operations in this area, for it made forest roads so slick the trucks could not travel — although the penetration was not too deep, and a few days of sunshine will again put them "back into business."

Ross Magnuson ran 80 yards with an intercepted pass in the first quarter to open the scoring. The try for point failed.  
Dean Brocke ran 60 yards for the first of two second quarter touchdowns. Magnuson ran for the games lone conversion following this. Then freshman Ken Heimgartner sprinted 80 yards to set the half-way point score at 19 to 0.

The Tigers, who now have a 2-0 record, closed out the scoring with two third-quarter touchdowns. Rick Rogers scored one on an eight-yard run, and Magnuson crossed the goal line from five yards out for the other.

Pierce got near the Kendrick 30-yard line in the first quarter, for its deepest penetration of the game.  
Ross Magnuson, senior quarterback did an outstanding job on defense, making about 20 tackles. Fred Silflow is credited with an equally good job on offense.

## A. S. C. ELECTION TO BE BY MAIL

Moscow — Election of community A. S. C. committeemen will be by mail this year.

Ballots will be mailed to each eligible voter prior to Oct. 25, and must be postmarked or received in the Latah County ASCS office by Nov. 5th. The committee will count the ballots in an open meeting on November 9, 1963.

Community committeemen have an important responsibility in the administration of farm programs and should be selected with this in mind. They should represent all sections and types of agriculture. The present community committeemen will complete a state of nominees.

Petitions signed by six or more eligible voters nominating persons for membership on the community committee, will be received at the county office at any time up to and including Oct. 14th. The names of persons nominated by proper petition will be included on the ballot if found to be eligible and willing to serve. A person nominated by petition who is ineligible to serve will be notified prior to the completion of the state of nominees and he may appeal to the county committee prior to Oct. 18th.

The community committee and the county committee may make additional nominations as are considered required or desirable.

U. of I., Moscow — What better way is there to study the political and economic structure of a foreign country than to go there?

According to Dr. E. Malcolm Hause, associate professor of history and political science at the University of Idaho, there is no better way. He will conduct seven summer school students through an equal number of common market countries this month.

The European study tour, promoted by the university annually for 12 years, provides an opportunity for students to earn credit while traveling. Historical, political and economic characteristics of western European countries will be studied.

"It is more valuable for a student to take a course in European politics on the scene," said Dr. Hause. "Travel erases intolerance and promotes better understanding between peoples of different parts of the world. Our students get to know European customs much better by first hand observation."

Students taking the tour for university credit, equivalent to a full schedule of classes on campus, have been assigned research topics.

Under Hause's direction, the students will travel through France, Spain, Italy, Austria, West Germany and Holland. Students, ranging in age from 20 to 56, come from Oregon to New York City. The tour is handled for the university by Academic Travel Abroad, a non-profit agency.

**4-H CLUBBERS HEAR PATRIOTIC SALK**

U. of I., Moscow — Idaho Attorney General Allen Shepard urged 770 4-H Club members meeting at the University of Idaho last week to "maintain the independence of spirit and courage of mind that is our Idaho heritage."

He added that, "Too often people are driven like sheep because they exercise the intelligence of a band of sheep."

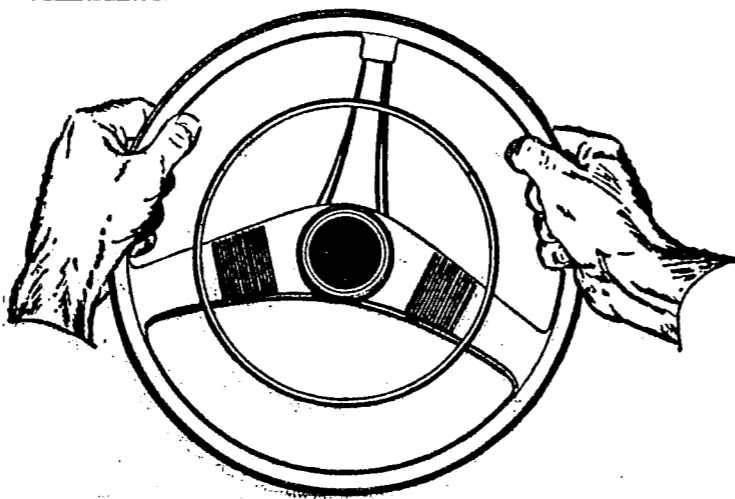
"The importance of you," Shepard told the 4-Hers, "is not only your heritage, but your potential and what you do with yourself from this day forward."

He told the group that participation in the process of government is most important.

**W. W. P. PURCHASES BIG TRANSFORMER**

Spokane — A mobile transformer capable of supplying the electrical needs of a town the size of Colfax, or all of the load of a town like Pullman during the summer months, has been ordered by the Washington Water Power Co. from General Electric in Pittsfield, Mass.

C. E. Cannon, vice president in charge of engineering for WWP, says the unit will provide reserve capacity to be used in case of a transformer outage at any one of a number of sub-stations on either their 60,000 or 110,000-volt systems.

Being mobile, the unit can readily be moved over the highways from station to station whenever the need for emergency power arises. "This mobile unit could temporarily replace any substation on our system," Cannon said.

The unit is rated at 15,000 kilovolt-amperes, a rating powerful

enough to supply the normal needs of 10,000 residences. Including the pulling tractor, it will weigh 83,730 pounds, or slightly over 41 tons. The delivery of the new unit is scheduled for about Oct. 1 of this year.

**CREDIT USE IS INCREASING**

U. of I., Moscow — "More than half the furniture and appliance sales today are on a credit basis, and some retailers state they could afford to give up their retailing business before they could afford to give up their financing business."

These findings are revealed in an extensive report scheduled to be off the press July 15 by the University

of Idaho's Bureau of Business and Economic Research. The report, which is based on studies conducted in Boise and Spokane, is entitled "Credit Practices of Retailers and Financiers in Two Northwest Cities. Authors of the report are Norman Nybrotten, Ralph H. Farmer, Russell L. Chrysler and Paul O. Groke. Their research was supported by a grant from the Small Business Administration to the Idaho Department of Commerce and Development.

Dr. Nybrotten, project supervisor, commented.

"The typical furniture and appliance dealer in Spokane and Boise is both a merchant and a financier. Several retailers in these two cities had almost a million dollars of credit outstanding at the time of the survey. There were consumer credit buyers from virtually any occupation or profession with monthly incomes ranging all the way from \$80 to nearly \$3,000.

"Some of the credit was old-fashioned open account — on the books but the big business is in the conditional sales contract or installment buying. Retailers who have and finance companies immediately turn their credit paper over to banks largely stayed out of the credit field after contracts are consummated."

Nybrotten said that in the great majority of instances individual negotiation of contracts evidently has overridden standard practices.

"It would be very difficult to surmise any specific treatment in either the amount of down payment or the interest rate," Nybrotten added.

"There was a great variation in interest rates in contracts quite similar in other respects. Those held by banks averaged about 14.5 per cent per year on unpaid balances compared with about 22.3 per cent in those held by finance companies. However, the finance companies make smaller loans and to people with lower incomes. There has been a trend toward larger loans with more time and lower interest rates and secured by a greater variety of merchandise."

"Interest sharing or 'kick-backs' are common. Mostly the kick-back is payment to the retailer for procuring the loan contract, but in many cases, the retailer retains other responsibilities after the loan is turned over to the lender. The kick-backs ranged from nothing to 3 1/2 per cent per year."

The research findings, said Nybrotten, indicate "that the furniture and appliance retailer should study his cash position and determine whether to hold all, none, or part of his credit paper. This should probably vary from time to time. The consumer credit buyer should recognize that all conditions are not fixed by standards and he can probably gain by bargaining. Interest sharing appears to be a reasonable way of bringing about specialization in this type of financing."

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### SEARCH ON FOR IDAHO BIG TREES

Idaho's Centennial Big Tree contest, sponsored jointly by the Idaho State Forestry department and the Idaho Federation of Women's Clubs, has uncovered several giant trees and an oddity as well.

State Forester Roger Guernsey of Boise reported this week that the most competition to date has developed over finding the state's largest ponderosa pine or yellow pine. First, Sumner Holbrook of Ola, Idaho, reported a yellow pine measuring 78 inches in diameter breast high, a tree he first noticed in 1920. Meanwhile, George Lont of Boise found one 79 inches. Since then Frank Edwards of Donnelly is

claiming the current record with a giant measuring 90 inches d. b. h.

A white pine tree without a sponsor has been reported by state foresters at Orofino which measures 81.6 inches d. b. h. A blue spruce measuring 30 inches d. b. h. has been reported from Lewiston. Sumner Holbrook claims the record white fir at 87.9 inches d. b. h.

An unexpected bonus from the big tree search was reported by Perry McNeese, Nordham, Idaho, of a freak tree on Two Mouth creek, which flows into Priest Lake. The tree has a trunk with lodgepole bark, and the needles of a western red cedar. A trail was built to the tree by the Idaho Youth Camp boys so the general public might see and enjoy this oddity of nature.

Mr. Guernsey urged all people interested in trees, and knowing of big ones, to report them. He said there are several trees which are very common for which no champions have been reported. These are Douglas fir or red fir, lodgepole pine, Englemann spruce, western hemlock, and western larch or tamarack.

### PENALTIES STIFF FOR CONTINUED LAW VIOLATIONS

W. A. Campbell, local Justice of the Peace points out that laws for continued violations of load, height and similar laws are very severe — and from the Idaho Vehicle Laws of 1961, page 140, Section 49-909 quotes: "Penalties for violations — It shall be unlawful, and constitute a misdemeanor for any person to violate any of the provisions of this chapter, and any person convicted of such violation shall be subject to punishment by a fine not to exceed \$100.00 or by imprisonment in the county jail for not more than 30 days and to the cancellation of registration of each motor vehicle operated in violation of any order for the regulation or suspension of traffic issued under the authority of this chapter, and the cancellation of the license of the operator."

Further, Mr. Campbell says that he believes most drivers are not aware of the new violation point count for traffic violations, and he quotes as follows:

Backing without reasonable safety, 1; driving on wrong side of road, 3; flashing red light (failure to stop) 3; following too closely, 3; failure to obey police traffic order, 2 one-way island (failure to obey the markings) 2; passing on wrong side, 3 passing without sufficient clearance, 3; passing on hill crest, 3; passing at intersection or grade crossing, 3; passing with view obstructed, 3; passing violation of white line, 4; failure to yield right of way at an intersection, 3; failure to yield right of way on left turn, 3; failure to yield right of way from private road, 2; failure to yield right of way to an emergency vehicle, 3; failure to yield right of way to pedestrian, 3; right of way failure to use due caution for pedestrian, 3; failure to stop at railroad crossing by school bus, bus or gas truck, 2, and failure to stop for a school bus, 4.

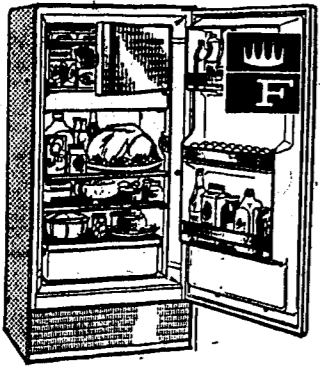
In the line of "variable point violations" are: Failure to signal, 3 to 4; speeding, 3 to 4; failure to reduce speed for curve or hillcrest, 3 to 4; violation of posted bridge speed, 3 to 4; failure to obey local posted speed zone, 3 to 4; failure to stop at stop sign, 3 to 4; failure to stop when coming from alley, 3; pulling out from curb without being safe, 2; failure to obey traffic light, 3; turning right from wrong lane, 3; turning left from wrong lane, 3; turning without 500 feet visibility, 3; failure to yield when being passed, 3; failure to yield when entering through highway, 3.

He added that the law says: Departmental action indicated by accumulated violation points — Total of 6, first letter addressed to licensee; total of eight, personal interview or examination; total of 12 or more, license suspension.

He recommends that all study the law and obey it.

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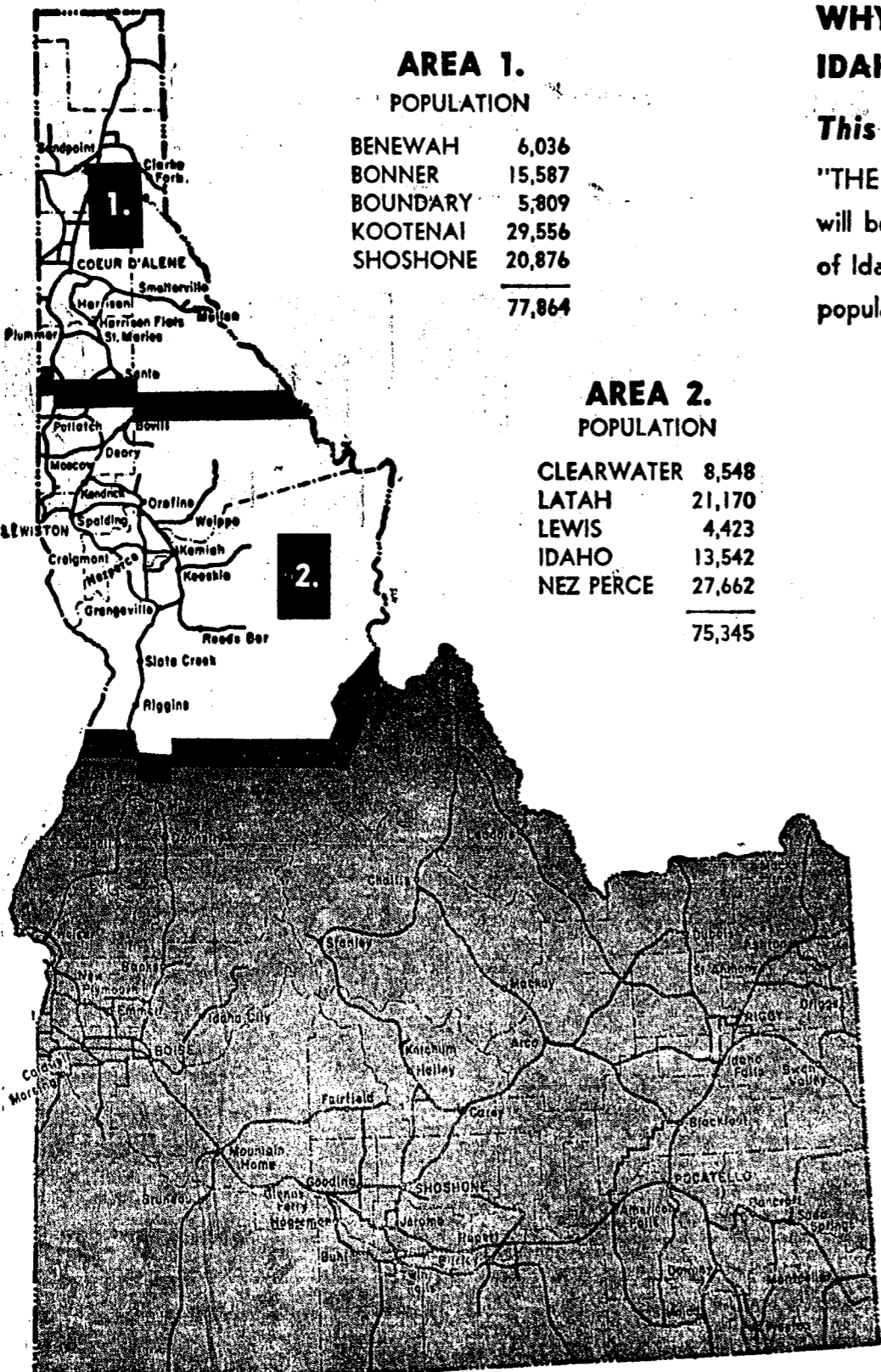
