WATCH FOR FAKE SOLICITORS

U. of I. Moscow — Idaho State 4-H Club leaders last week learned that an unauthorized person or persons solicited donations for the International Farm Youth Exchange (IFYE) program in the Moses Lake, Wash., area. Residents in that area reported the party said he was collecting the funds for Idaho.

Dan E. Warren, State 4-H Club leader, cautioned Idaho residents that such solicitations should be ignored. He emphasized that the IFYE and 4-H organizations do not make door-to-door calls to obtain donations.

If the request for donations to one of these two programs is made by a door-to-door solicitor, the local County Extension office should be notified, he said. Another way to combat the fraudulent solicitor, is to withhold the donation until it can be made known to a local representative of the organization.

Sponsorship of IFYE, like 4-H Club work, in which the County Extension Service cooperates, is handled by local committees or volunteer groups, Warren added.
