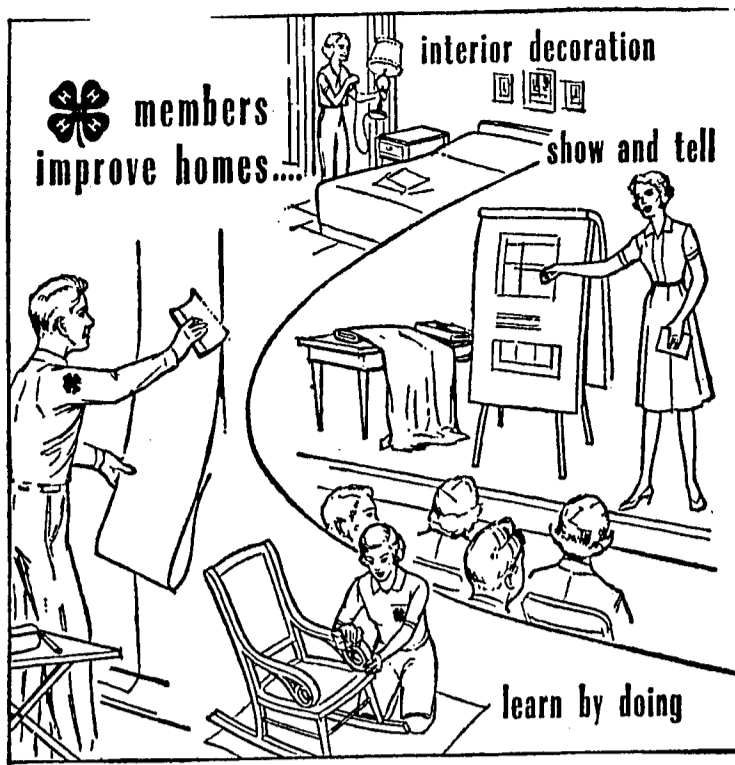

Coast to coast some 200,000 girls and boys are midway in 4-H home improvement projects, reports the National 4-H Service Committee. Their hearts are set on winding up near the top in the annual competition for state, county and national awards.

### Family Enterprise

The home improvement project usually involves the entire family because whatever the 4-H'ers plan to do must have the sanction of their parents. An

outlay of cash is often required. Re-shuffling of space, change in color and room arrangement and an extra hand or two requires the whole-hearted cooperation of Mother and Dad.

One example of a family enterprise in California was that of the Ervin Williams who purchased a home in Visalia. It needed a thorough refurbishing job.

Daughter Patricia, 19, through her 4-H home improvement training and learn-by-doing experiences made a major contribution.

**WATCH FOR THOSE CATTLE GRUBS**

U. of I., Moscow - Now is the time to control cattle grubs, according to Roland Portman, University of Idaho extension entomologist. Two species of cattle grubs infest cattle in Idaho, and the northern United

States: The northern heel fly or bomb fly and the common heel fly. However, Portman reported, both species are killed with the same materials, whether it is co-ral or ruelene for beef cattle, or rotenone for dairy animals. Both co-ral and ruelene are systemics, and beef animals can be dipped or sprayed, or the material can be used as a pour-on applied to the top line of the

animals back. Rotenone is a powdered insecticide and can be used as a dust or a wash. Portman emphasizes that regardless of method, the material must be worked into the grub's breathing hole in the animal's hide. Rotenone must come into contact with the grub to be effective. A stiff brush does a good job of working the material down through the hair. Three treatments are necessary, spaced a month apart.

Both the northern heel fly and the common heel fly damage the meat and hide in the same manner. However, their methods of laying eggs are considerably different.

The northern heel fly is noisy, and the animal soon learns the loud buzz means a fly will dart in and sharply tug on a hair as it lays a single egg. This tug is irritating enough to cause animals to stampe, often running through fences and even over bluffs. This same irritation also causes animals to stand in water in an effort to avoid the fly, Portman says.

On the other hand, the common heel fly is lazy, moving in to lay from 8 to 12 eggs on a single hair while the animal is at rest. The common heel fly makes no noise, and the animal does not realize the eggs have been laid.

THOR RESEARCH CENTER FOR BETTER FARM LIVING

A reader who wants to enclose an area around his home for recreation and gardening asks for plans for a distinctive fence, which also serves as a windbreak. Our plans suggested four fence designs that are both handsome and practical.

A "woven" fence was one of those suggested. Twelve-foot lengths of 1/2-inch exterior tempered hardboard are bowed among strategically placed 4x4 posts to effect the woven appearance. Height is determined by the number of hardboard panels used, but the most desirable suggested is 5 feet 6 inches.



Free plans are available for four handsome, yet practical fences.

This size is achieved by horizontally weaving five 12-inch panels among the posts, placing bottom panels two inches above the ground and adding others at 1/2-inch intervals. The 4x4 posts protrude 2 inches above the top.

Planting these 4x4s 2 feet into the earth presents the only labor problem, because trimming required by hardboard and posts can be accomplished quickly with a portable electric saw. The hardboard is fastened to the 4x4s with 5-penny galvanized siding or galvanized box nails.

Another of the fence plans—which appeals to "green-thumbed" persons—is called the "hanging garden fence." Exterior perforated tempered hardboard are used in the construction.

Hardware available for perforated material allows arranging live floral displays right in the fence—or on shelves fastened to the fence—and its over-all appearance makes the fence a conversation piece too!

The two other fences included in the plans feature a contrast achieved by alternating exterior hardboard panels on opposite sides of 4x4 studding.

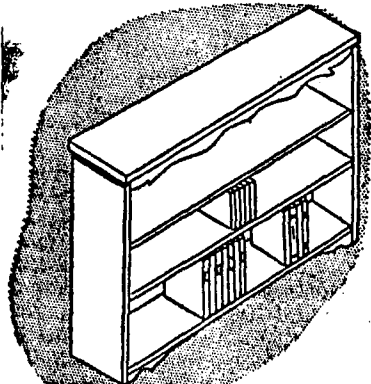

Readers have written to ask if we have any plans for a handsome yet easy-to-make bookcase. The plan we sent is simple and can be adapted to space available.

Material can be chosen to match your present furniture if you wish to stain the bookcase.



An adaptable and easily constructed bookcase.

Size of the bookcase not only depends on where it will be placed, but on the size and number of books to be stored. It can be 2 feet high or the entire wall height. It can be 3 feet wide or the length of a wall.

Regardless of size, a few basic portable electric power tools—circular saw, jig saw, sander, and drill—will let you do the work easily and quickly.

Stock for this bookcase should be 1x10 for storing average books. If larger books are to be placed on shelves, increase stock size.

For those who want a three shelf case, shelves can be cut to exact dimensions by clamping wood together, aligning, and cutting boards at one time. Ends can be cut the same way to assure identical lengths for end pieces. The top should be approximately 2 1/2 inches longer than the shelves to achieve overhang of about 1/2 inch.

A provision for shelf adjustment can be added by drilling two rows of 3/4 inch holes 3/4 inch deep in the end pieces, approximately 1 1/2 inches inside each edge. Space between shelves should be approximately 9 inches to accommodate average books but these adjustable holes will allow for larger volumes. Small wood pegs can be inserted in holes to support shelves, or hardware can be used for supporting them.

Sand all surfaces smooth with your electric sander before assembling and after assembly round off all corners with the sander so there are no sharp edges or splinters.

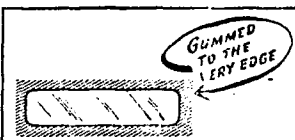
The final organizational meeting was held at the offices of the Idaho

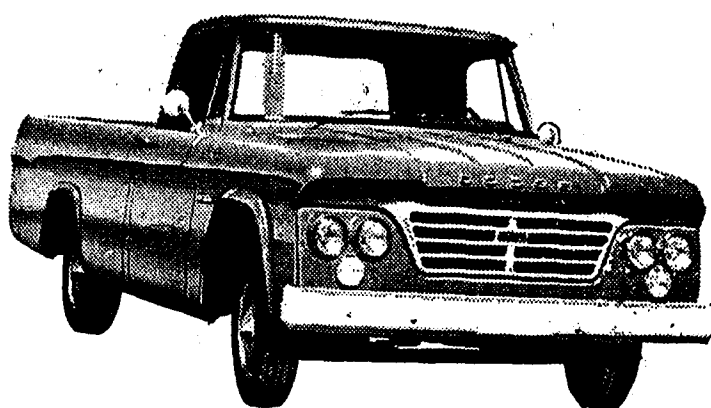

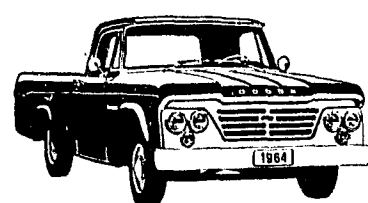

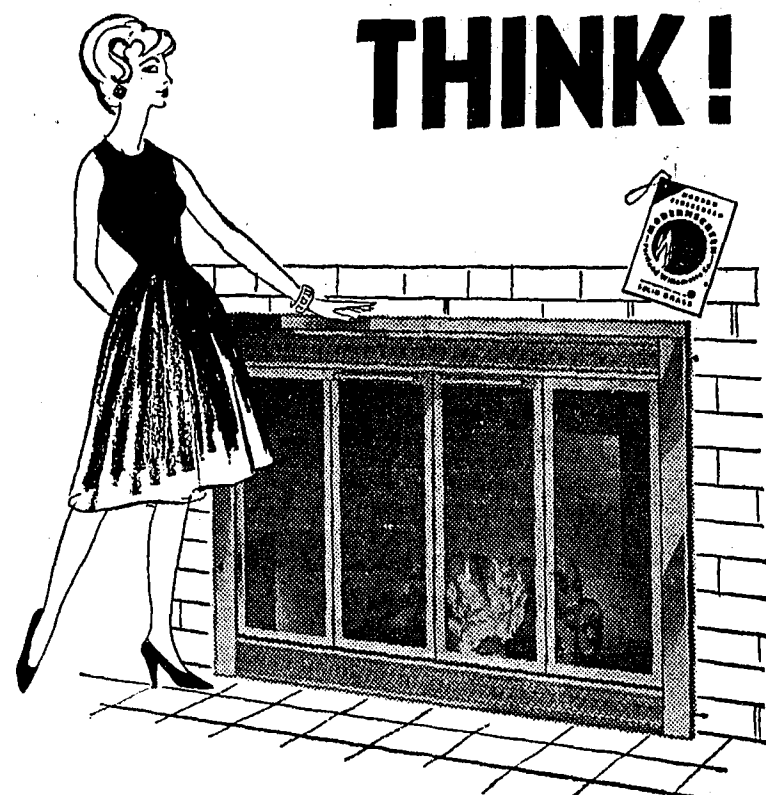

Educational AV is now being used to supplement reading in out-of-class work, explains Dr. William S. Greaver, chairman of history. The selected films are required viewing for students in two upper division classes. The Westward Movement, and Social and Cultural History of the United States.

Films to be shown over the university's television system for the first course are: "Wabash Foot-hold," "Indian Valhalla," "British Keystone," "Early Toll Roads," "Pioneer Bank," "Steamboat Landing," and "Portopolis."
