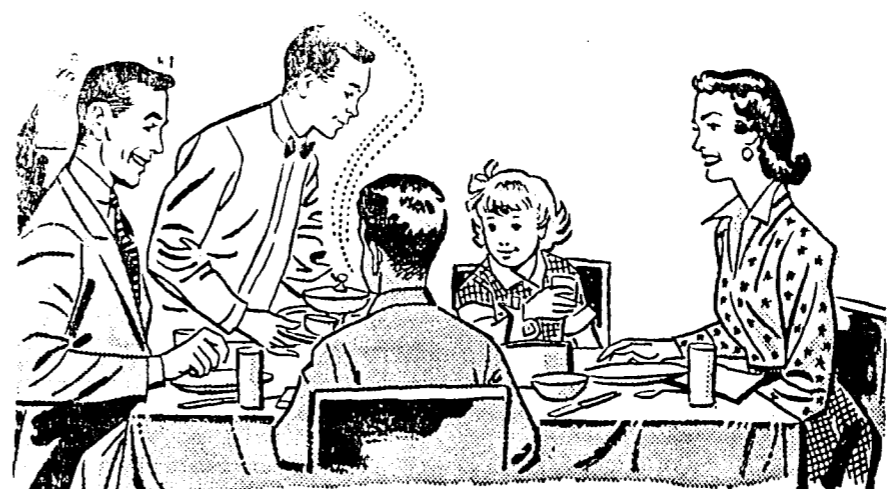

## DALLAS GROSECLOSE INJURED IN CRASH IS IN HOSPITAL

Dallas Groseclose, Juliaetta, was injured at 11:50 Friday morning when two trucks, one of them loaded with 15 head of cattle, collided two miles east of Arrow Junction on State Highway 42 (near the Raleigh Albright ranch).

Mr. Groseclose, 55, was described as being in "fair condition" at the St. Joseph's Hospital in Lewiston Friday night.

State Police Officer Joe Mach said Groseclose was coming out of a side road onto the main highway in a 1950 Dodge truck and collided with a 1963 International headed west, and being driven by Eugene A. Prince, 33, Thornton, Wash. The Prince truck was carrying 15 head of cattle.

Mach said the cattle truck skidded 175 feet before striking the Groseclose vehicle broadside. The Groseclose truck was knocked 56 feet.

None of the cattle escaped from the truck, although the side stakes holding the racks were almost torn off, Mach said. Traffic was blocked two hours while the vehicles were being removed. The Groseclose truck was damaged beyond practical repair. Mach estimated damage to the other vehicle at \$2,500.00. He was assisted in the investigation by Ray Thornton, Lewiston Port of Entry officer.

## NARROW ESCAPE IN ACCIDENT

Richard Abrams, driving the family car, and accompanied by Dean Brocke, narrowly escaped serious injury Saturday morning, as they were going into Lewiston for merchandise for the hardware store.

The Abrams car skidded as it hit the sharp highway curve near the old Arrow depot. The vehicle was apparently turned too sharply in an attempt to straighten it out, it spun in the road, hit the guard posts on the opposite side of the highway and these held it from going over onto the railroad tracks below. The car was damaged considerably.

Richard was cited by the State Police for speeding.

## K. H. S. BASKETBALL PROSPECTS GOOD

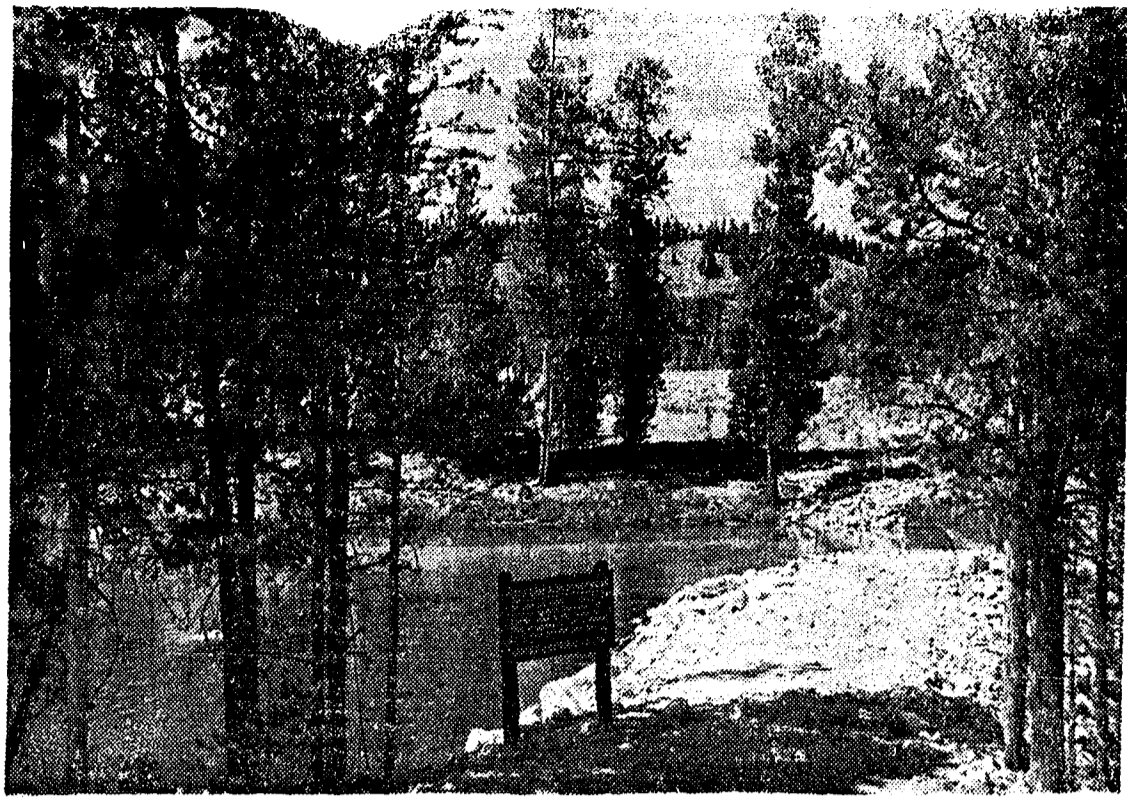
## SENIOR BALL DEC. 7

**HIGHWAY PROBLEMS DISCUSSED AT RECENT CONFERENCE**

U. of I., Moscow — Seal coats and surface treatments of highways are an engineering challenge and not an art, engineers from all parts of the Northwest were told at the recent University of Idaho Asphalt Conference.

Several speakers pointed out that many states are using many different systems in determining optimum highway construction.

Idaho State Highway Department materials engineer, H. L. Day, described the growth of flexible pavement design.

"The history of this design in the U. S. dates back to 1920," he said. "This is a remarkably short time when one considers that the science of road building dates back at least 2,000 years. It took the advent of the motor car to bring engineers to the realization that they must take a rational approach to the problem of pavement design in order to provide anything resembling a durable structure."

The problems of the future in highway design were discussed by A. R. Curtis, who said: "We can only hope that we know what traffic needs will be in 1983 — 20 years from now. The major problem in the area of planning for future traffic is one of geometrics and in urban areas of structural design. Engineers must make provision for the anticipated number of traffic lanes which will be needed to serve traffic and establish lines and grades which will permit traffic, whose average speeds

are rapidly increasing, to safely make capacity use of the system."

**HOW TO CARE FOR YOUR ROSES**

U. of I., Moscow — "Don't let the cold weather kill off your prize roses," advises George W. Woodbury. "A little care now is all that is needed."

Wait until you've had a sharp frost, then take the following steps: Take soil, preferably from another area of your garden, and mound it up around each rose bush about 6 to 8 inches. Be sure to cover the crown of the plant and the lower branches. Cover this soil with leaves or straw, if such material is available. However, this final step is not absolutely necessary.

Woodbury also recommends tying the branches together with strong cord, so they won't whip around in the wind. This whipping action will tend to loosen the roots in the ground.

"You shouldn't prune your rose bushes at this time of year. Cold weather temperatures will freeze these branches, and next spring you will need only to cut away the dead wood. Enough of the plant will be left to give it a good start."

"However, if you prune the branches back now, the winter coldness will freeze them back even further, and you won't have much of a plant next spring, after you have cut away this dead wood," Woodbury explains.

The university horticulturist also recommended removing the tender types of climbing roses from their trellises. Cover the plants with burlap or leaves, or, preferably, both. This will prevent wind whipping and winter injury, Woodbury said.

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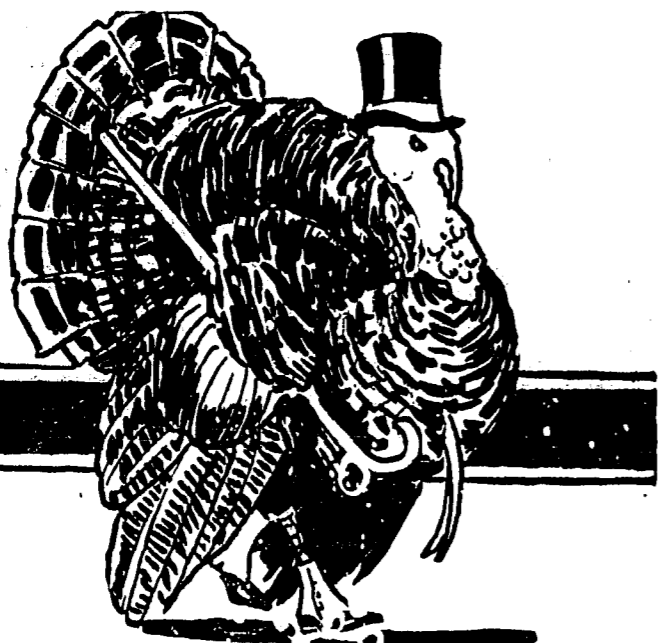
