L. S. THURBER, 80, DIES AT LEWISTON FRIDAY, NOV. 29

Lewis S. Thurber, 80, retired operator of Thurber's Dry Goods Store, died Friday night, Nov. 29, at 7:50 at the St. Joseph's Hospital in Lewiston of carcinoma.

He had been retired since 1959, when he sold his store to Mr. and Mrs. Louis Maio of Priest River, Idaho. Following a fire, the Maio's closed out the store, and Mr. Thurber re-stocked it and it is now operated by Mrs. Harold Olderness, a step-daughter. It is now known as Thurber & Olderness.

Lewis S. Thurber was born May 20, 1883, at Coneaut, Ohio, and came as a child with his family to Halfmoon, a community at Mount Spokane in northeastern Washington. He also lived at Colville from 1908 until 1935.

In 1937, he with Mrs. Thurber, came to Kendrick, purchasing the Raby Dry Goods Store in the Hotel Building. They operated this store until 1938, when they moved the store to Grangeville, Idaho. They returned with the store to Kendrick in 1939, re-opening for business in the room adjoining Kay's Beauty Shop. Shortly thereafter he purchased the building next to the Kendrick Theater, remodeled it, and moved the store there, where it is now operating.

He was married to Hattie Knox at Newport, Washington in October of 1935. He was a member of the Knights of Pythias Lodge, and during his long residence in Kendrick had been a member of the Kendrick Community Lions Club, and had also served as a Village Trustee.

Surviving besides his wife and stepdaughter are two daughters: Mrs. Owen Phillips and Mrs. George Winn, both of Spokane; two sons, John of Spokane and Cecil of Seattle; a stepson, Eldon Knox of Hayward, Calif.; a sister, Mrs. Ray Johnson, Cheleweelah, Wash.; a brother, Frank Thurber, Polson, Mont.; eight grandchildren, four great-grandchildren; three step-grandchildren and 16 step-great-grandchildren.

Funeral services were held Monday, Dec. 2, at 11:00 a. m. in the Kendrick Community Church, with the Rev. David Braun, pastor, officiating. Mrs. Burton Souders, Jr., and Mrs. Jack Lohman sang "Beyond The Sunset," "Rock of Ages" and "The Lord's Prayer," accompanied at the organ by Mrs. Oscar Slind, who also played background music.

Pallbearers were David Clayton, George Brocke, Sr., Richard L. Blewett, Frank Abrams, Marvin Long and Fred Gladen, all friends of years standing. Interment was in the Kendrick Cemetery.

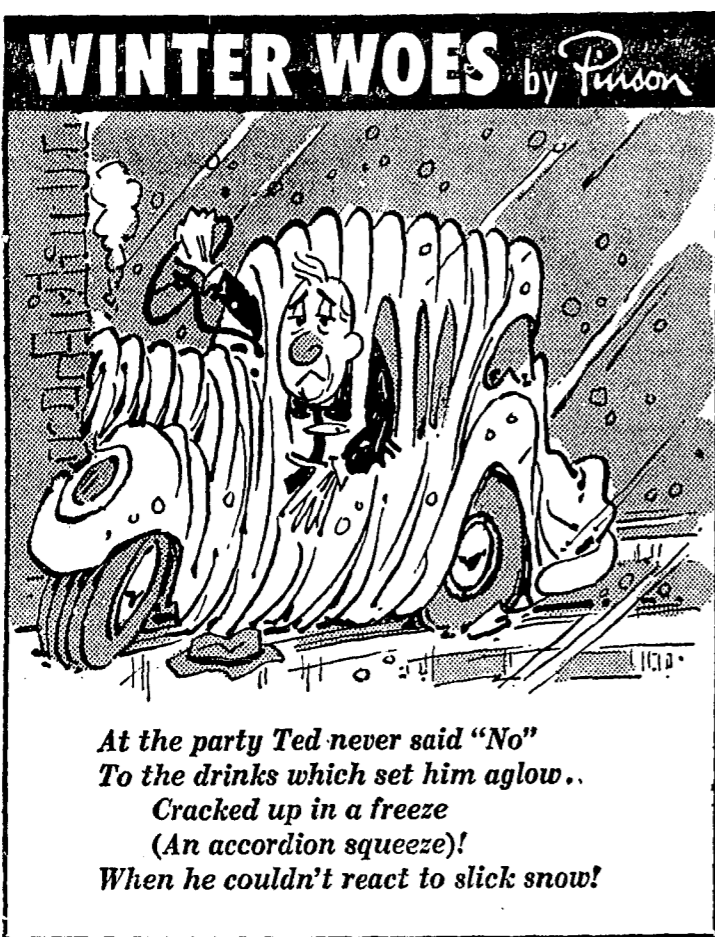

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OLDER 4-H YOUTH ARE FINE LEADERS

Chicago — When boys and girls stay in 4-H Club work through their mid-teens, they usually make notable progress in one or more phases of 4-H activities, according to the 4-H National Service committee.

One of these categories is leadership training. In this program, the members are actually helped by the adult leaders to learn the meaning of responsibility, take on extra work and carry out special projects involving the entire club membership.

The 4-H junior leader works under the guidance of the adult leader, explains Miss Emmie Nelson of the 4-H Service Committee. "These two, with the help of the club, jointly determine jobs for the junior leader.

"They begin with familiar tasks and advance to the more difficult ones. These jobs must be challenging, but within the youngster's

grasp," she adds.

Appreciation for cultural pastimes and traditional lore, as well as acquiring skills in arts and crafts are prominent in the 4-H Recreational awards program.

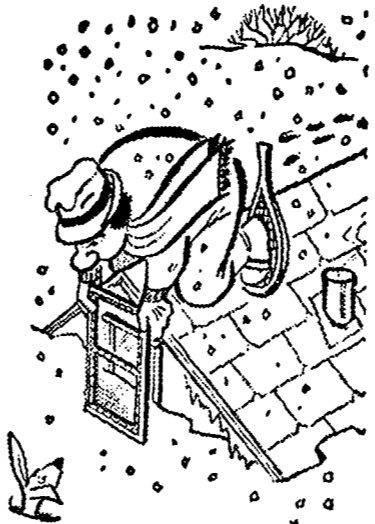

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J. EDGAR HOOVER WRITES ON CAR THEFT ASPECTS

To hardened criminals a stolen

automobile is a tool of his trade. Daily, underworld gangs and hoodlums resort to and rely on stolen motor vehicles for deception and escape in the perpetuation of major crimes. Auto theft rings, many with border to border operations, are a recurring menace, netting huge

profits for commercial car thieves. The extent of the auto theft problem is exemplified in the estimated 356,000 cars stolen during 1962 with a property value of some \$308 million. This was a nine percent increase over 1961, and statistics for the first six months of 1963 reflect

another nine percent rise. Assuredly, law enforcement needs every weapon at its command to cope with the car thieves. Yet, in some quarters, there are a few who advocate the repeal of the existing federal statute specifically designed to help fight auto theft — the Dyer Act. Such a proposal could not be based on an objective appraisal of the over-all problems.

Let us take a closer look as some crucial aspects of car theft. Currently, the FBI is investigating a number of auto theft rings, some involving as many as 100 motor vehicles each. Recently, one group of thieves, operating in five states, bought late model salvage cars for which legitimate title papers were obtained. The title papers and public serial plates of the wrecked cars were then used in the sale of stolen vehicles of similar make and model. In one case, a car was stolen in Canada, given a fictitious registration in a state not having a title law and sold in Florida. Only a few years ago, the FBI located 15 automobiles in Arabia, which had been stolen in this country. The operational scope of highly professionalized car theft rings is almost unlimited.

Investigations of such violations are complex and far-flung. Usually, they require prompt, simultaneous action at different locations. On a national basis, 20 percent of all auto-

mobiles stolen are recovered in jurisdictions other than that in which the theft occurred. In some areas, the recovery by jurisdictions is as much as 50 percent. Local authorities can hardly be expected to have the facilities necessary to successfully follow through on cases involving multiple jurisdictions in various states. Common logic dictates that the responsibility fall on an investigative agency having jurisdiction wherever investigation is needed.

Some reasons advanced for the repeal of the Dyer Act include: (1) Delays in obtaining judgment in federal courts because of matters being handled which have no legitimate federal interest; and (2) The large number of federal prison inmates, mostly juveniles, serving sentences for interstate transportation of stolen motor vehicles. The facts fall far short of supporting these contentions.

During the fiscal year 1962, of the 36,108 defendants brought before the federal courts, only 15 percent were charged under the Interstate Transportation of Stolen Motor Vehicles statute. Of these, the vast majority pleaded guilty, leaving only about 3 percent of the total federal court defendants to stand trial under the statute.

Some 1,490 auto thieves under 18 years of age were handled under the Federal Juvenile Delinquency Act

during the 1962 fiscal year. Of these, 40 percent were diverted to state courts or dismissed, 25 percent received probation and only 35 percent were committed to federal institutions. In addition, 73 percent of paroles granted to federal Juvenile Delinquency Act prisoners in the fiscal year 1962 were to inmates charged with auto theft. Accordingly it would appear that juveniles detained in federal prisons under auto theft convictions represent a rather small percentage of the total inmates. This is particularly true when compared with their disproportionate representation in the national auto theft problem where 62 percent of all arrests are persons under 18 years of age.

Today, with almost 80 million motor vehicles on the nation's highways and the auto theft total increasing annually, the nullification of any available means to fight the crime would be a crippling blow to law enforcement. — J. Edgar Hoover, Director, F. B. I.

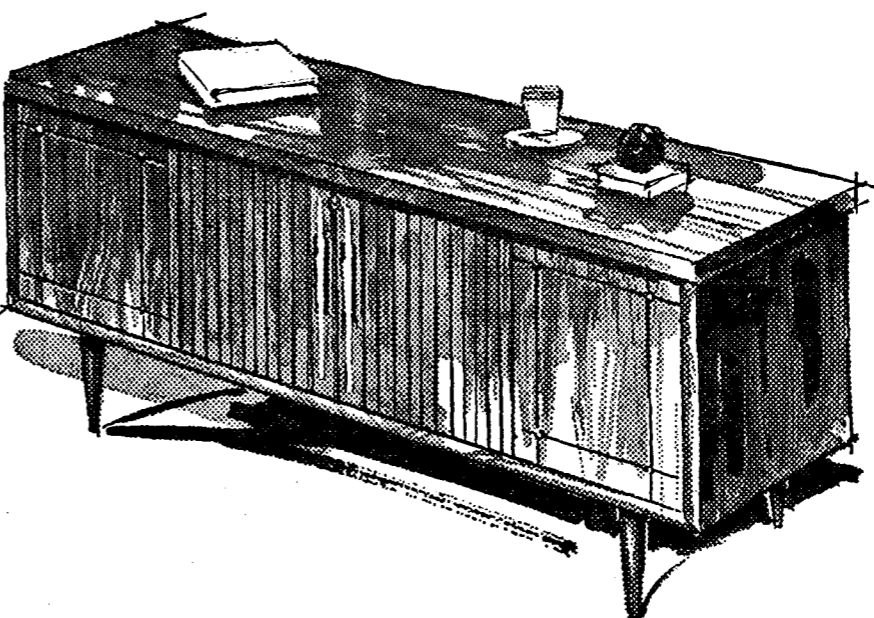

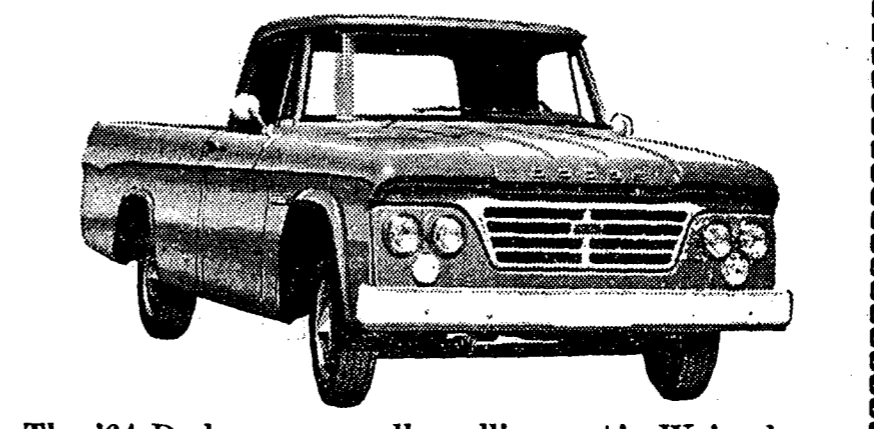


