TODD NELSON TELLS OF P. C. TRAINING

From the Peace Corps Training Center at the University of New Mexico comes the following letter from Todd Nelson, which we believe will be of interest to all:

Dec. 8 — Dear Friends: Greetings to everyone from the Peace Corps Training Center at Albuquerque, New Mexico. Although it seems to have been only a short time, my group has been in training for seven weeks now, and has only one week to go until our first selection board. It is at Selection Board that Peace Corps officials and members of the local training staff go over each trainee's record to determine his qualifications as a Peace Corps Volunteer. Trainees not qualified for their particular programs receive an honorable discharge from the program; some transfer to other Peace Corps programs.

We, Columbia XV, are an all-male group of 50 being trained for Rural Community Development; 18 are architects who will work in government ministries designing and approving rural school houses that the other Volunteers wish to build.

Our training program is quite rugged, but we like it and most Trainees do pass. Last week we had 26 hours of Spanish, besides all of our other classes. We have only 14 classroom hours of Spanish for this next week.

Friday we are looking forward to a three-day hike in the nearby mountains for survival training. Then on Dec. 22, we all get to go home for Christmas vacation. Those of us passing selection will return here January 5, and go to Taos, New Mexico, for four weeks training in Rural Community Development. Those of us successfully completing the training program will then leave here directly for Columbia the first week in February, 1964.

During the past weeks it has been of particular enjoyment to me to read the Gazette each week, to learn what everyone at home is doing. I am looking forward to seeing everyone again at Christmas time. — Todd Nelson.

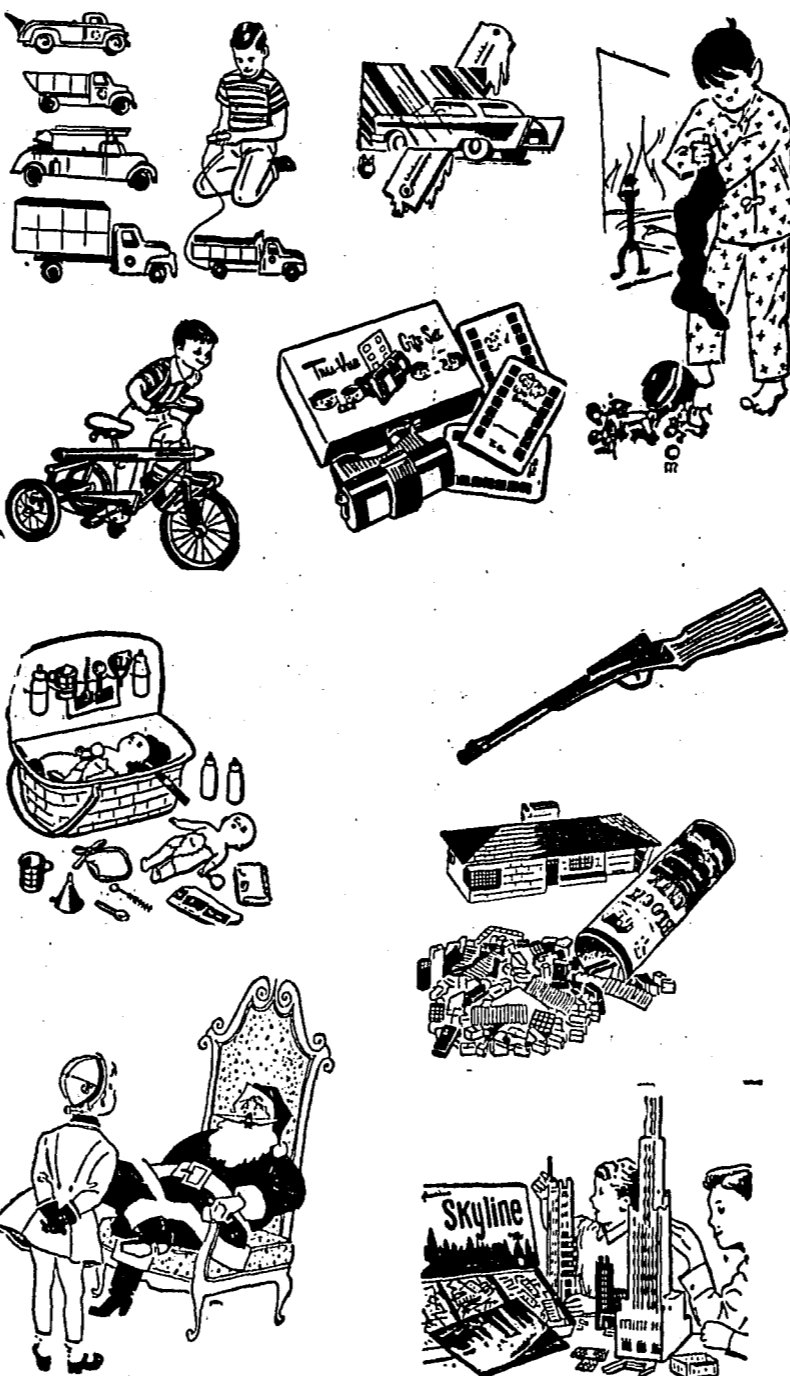

Hints on what you can prepare in the kitchen and instructions on how to do it are given in a bulletin of the University of Idaho extension

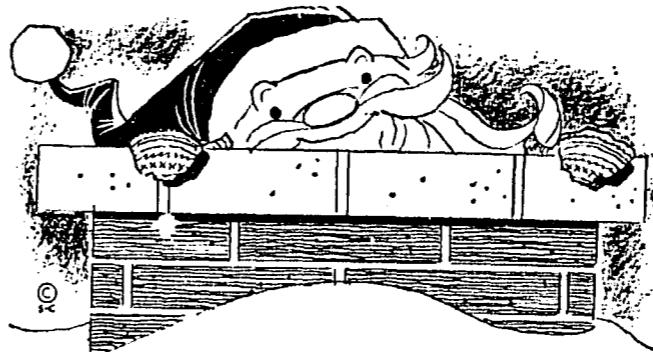
service. It is called "Gifts From Your Kitchen." Mrs. Ruth J. Shane, county home agent, has copies at her office.

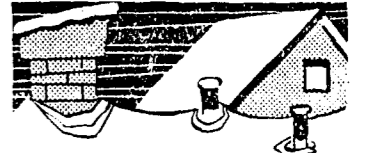

SCOUTS, CUBS, CUT XMAS TREES SAT.

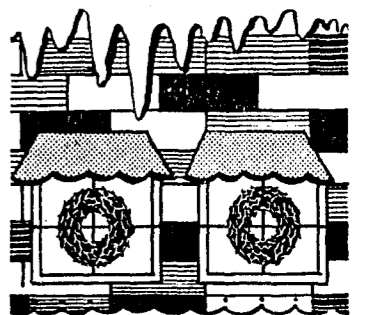

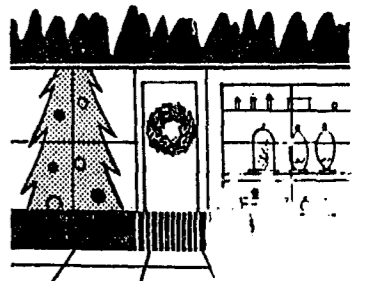

DWORSHAK DAM EXPECTED TO GIVE MUCH EMPLOYMENT

Orofino — Late winter and early spring construction work on Dworshak reservoir will provide a major outlay of Public Works funds to aid employment in 1964, the Corps of Engineers indicated.

Two projects are being scheduled, a million dollar clearing and salvage operation on 2,763 acres on which title has passed to the government; and later an even larger tunnel and detour road project extending up river four miles toward Freeman Creek.

Bids are now listed to be called on January 7 for the timber clearing and salvage work to be completed in 300 calendar days. If the job is awarded by mid-January, completion would be next November.

The road job will go from the tunnel back down to the present road, keeping above the waters caused by the diversion dam. Deep cuts through a slide and seepage area may be necessary to avoid trouble after the 100-foot high coffer dam is completed.

Under the contract bidders will salvage the merchantable timber disposing of logs as they see fit. The contractor is required to post a bond of 20 percent of the amount bid. Drawings and specifications are available at the Walla Walla office. The clearing will also include the quarry area adjacent to the dam.

In the first clearing job are five homes to be razed, the Lloyd, Louis and Alma Stalaker homes, and those of Howard Bailey and Mrs. Lahti.

In the second job to be advertised in March is the highway tunnel which will cost approximately a million dollars, and about four miles of road up to the headwaters of the coffer dam below Freeman creek. The 20-foot tunnel has been reduced in size from the original plans when it was to serve for use on the main road west of the reservoir. It will now give access to the present road and also for a tug landing ramp near the dam.

Two five-man crews are still em-

played on the road survey, working between Three Bear Creek and Elk River, and are now stationed at Boreas, says Survey Chief Clayton Hollaway. They are headed by Floyd Montgomery and George Rosenbalm. Work is being concentrated in the Park and Three Bear Creek areas south of Elk River and north of Cavendish where present road studies indicate the new road may be built.

If this design is completed, Orofino will have access to the east side of the pool but the west areas could only be reached by going up to Cavendish and Teakean and then coming back down by Freeman Creek or Dix Creek. The area north of Elk Creek will be extremely isolated from Orofino.

Mayor A. B. Curtis explains he has hopes that the Army Corps of Engineers will try to develop a road from the tunnel area up to sufficient elevation to avoid slide formations so as to provide this county with a direct link to Elk River.

Tentative surveys have indicated the use of the old highway to a point north of Cavendish, however, is the cheaper route although it is further, and would make much of the upper pool tributary to Kendrick rather than to Orofino.

Curtis said the Corps of Engineers has indicated it will study the best possible route up from Anshakta to seek to avoid unnecessary disruption and damage to the resources of Clearwater county.

For the long-term, it is vital that the Orofino-Elk River road be replaced near the reservoir, Curtis believes.

Removal of the reservoir property from the county tax rolls will begin to be felt in 1964, the county treasurer reports. Taxes are being paid by the government to the county on the lands acquired this year.

Survey crews will resume work on marking the reservoir contour lines next summer when weather permits such brush travel. In general areas from the 1440 to 1600-foot elevations are the center of attention.

As Chief Fire Warden Curtis said, permits will be given to do summer burning since the 300-day limit is a critical problem for the Corps and the contractors.

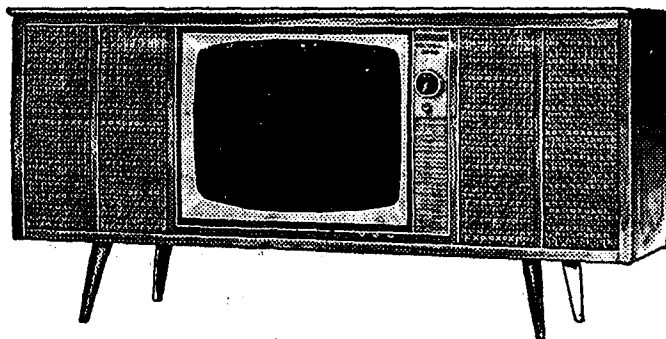

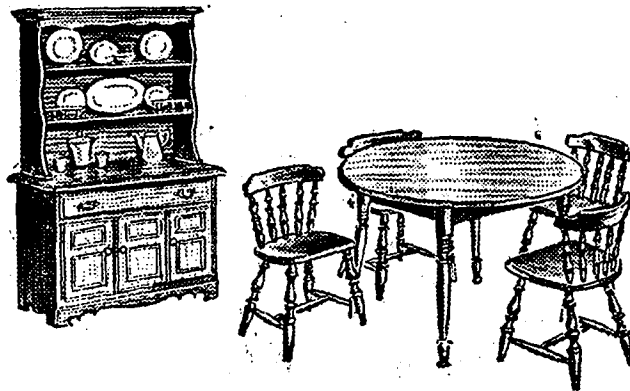

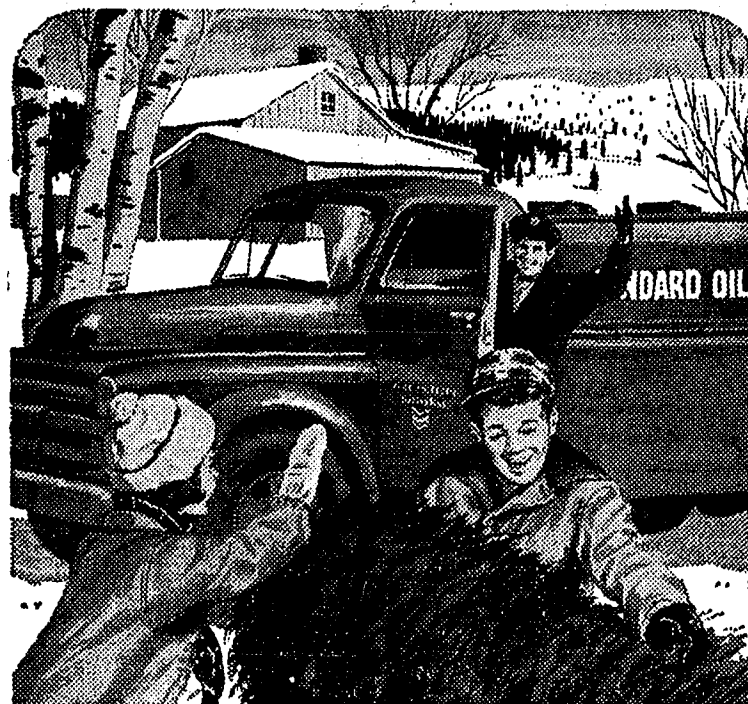

TRANSPLANTING BIGHORN SHEEP

Crated Bighorn Sheep from British Columbia for transplanting in southwestern Idaho's Owyhee mountains is handled by Cliff Walker, conservation officer stationed at 100-Mile House, British Columbia; Jim McLucas, Montana big game trapping supervisor, and Ralph Mitchell, biologist from William Lake, British Columbia.

This was one of 19 Bighorns that were brought to Idaho as part of Five-Point program for introducing exotic species of game animals, birds and fish into the state where they will not compete with existing wildlife, and the habitat is suitable.

PENALTIES STIFF FOR CONTINUED LAW VIOLATIONS

W. A. Campbell, local Justice of the Peace points out that laws for continued violations of load, height and similar laws are very severe — and from the Idaho Vehicle Laws of 1961, page 140, Section 49-909 quotes: "Penalties for violations — It shall

be unlawful and constitute a misdemeanor for any person to violate any of the provisions of this chapter, and any person convicted of such violation shall be subject to punishment by a fine not to exceed \$100.00 or by imprisonment in the county jail for not more than 30 days and to the cancellation of registration of each motor vehicle operated in violation of any order for the regulation or suspension of traffic issued under the authority of this chapter, and the cancellation of the license of the operator.

Further, Mr. Campbell says that he believes most drivers are not aware of the new violation point count for traffic violations, and he quotes as follows:

Backing without reasonable safety, 1; driving on wrong side of road, 3; Flashing red light (failure to stop) 3; Following too closely, 3; failure to obey police traffic order, 2 one-way island (failure to obey the markings) 2; passing on wrong side, 3 passing without sufficient clearance, 3; passing on hill crest, 3; passing at intersection or grade crossing, 3; passing with view obstructed, 3; passing violation of white line, 4; failure to yield right of way at an intersection, 3; failure to yield right of way on left turn, 3; failure to yield right of way from private road, 2; failure to yield right of way to an emergency vehicle, 3; failure to yield right of way to pedestrian, 3; right of way failure to use due caution for pedestrian, 3; failure to stop at railroad crossing by school bus, bus or gas truck, 2, and failure to stop for a school bus, 4.

In the line of "variable point violations are: Failure to signal, 3 to 4; speeding, 3 to 4; failure to reduce speed for curve or hillcrest, 3 to 4; violation of posted bridge speed, 3 to 4; failure to obey local posted speed zone, 3 to 4; failure to stop at stop sign, 3 to 4; failure to stop when coming from alley, 3; pulling out from curb without being safe, 2; failure to obey traffic light, 3; turning right from wrong lane, 3; turning left from wrong lane, 3; turning without 500 feet visibility, 3; failure to yield when being passed, 3; failure to yield when entering through highway, 3.

He added that the law says: Departmental action indicated by accumulated violation points — Total of 6, first letter addressed to licensee; total of eight, personal interview or examination; total of 12 or more, license suspension. He recommends that all study the law and obey it.

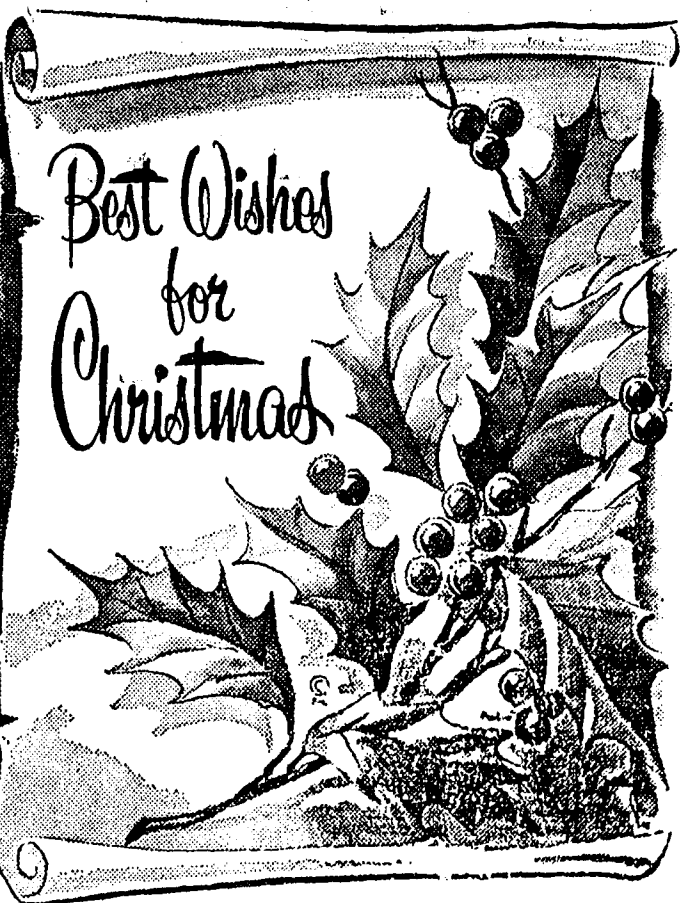

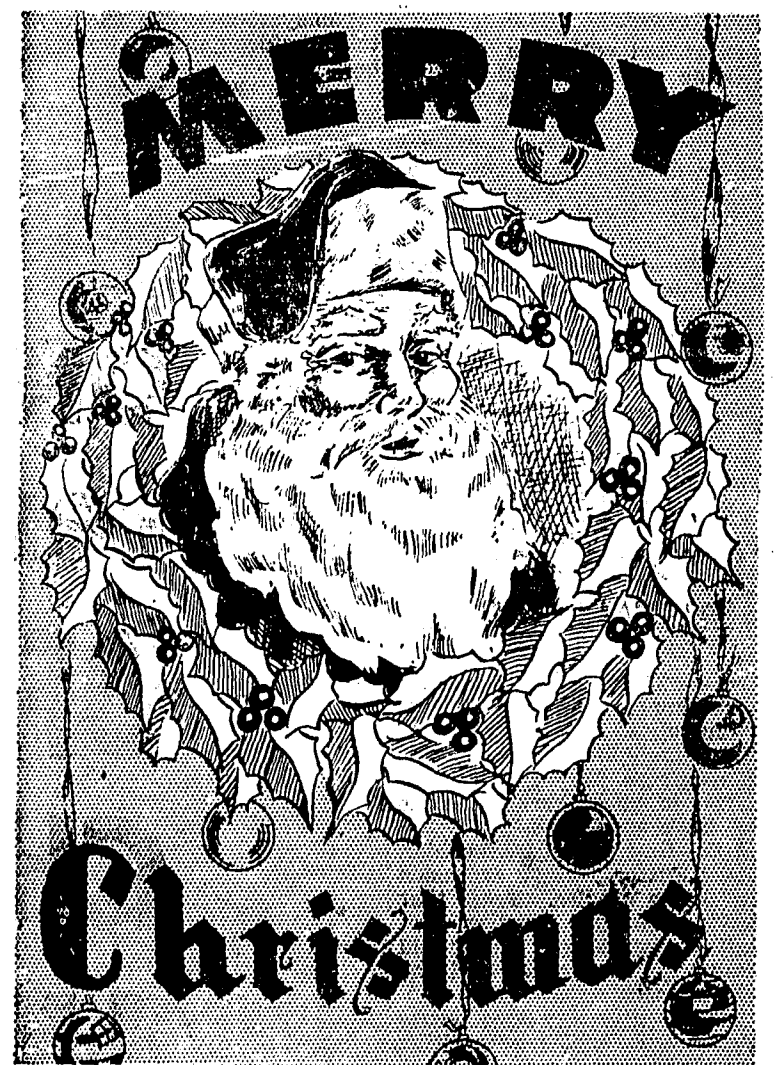

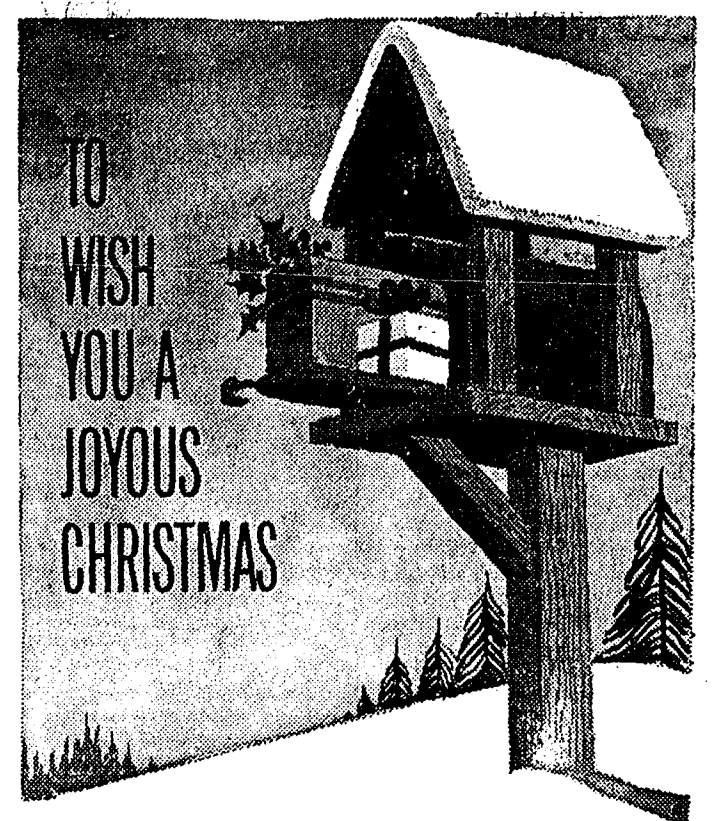

WINTER WOES by Pinson

The Safe Winter Driving League presents this safety tip from the National Safety Council for driving on snow or ice: "Know the condition of the road surface. Get the 'feel' of the road by trying your brakes gently when away from other traffic. This tells you how slick the road surface is. Then adjust your speed and driving habits accordingly."

HOLIDAY FIRES CAN BE DANGEROUS

Moscow — Danger of fire in clothing and decorations can be reduced, Mrs. Ruth J. Shane, home agent, reminded Latah county women this week. Fires in household fabrics are most likely to occur, she said, during the holiday season.

Flame-retarding solutions are a practical answer to the problem and they are easy to apply. One of the best, in the opinion of Esther Nystrom, clothing specialist of the University of Idaho extension service, is a mixture that can be made readily in most homes. It consists of seven ounces of borax, three ounces of boric acid and two quarts of warm water. To make it, dissolve the boric acid by making a paste with a little water. Add this and the borax to the hot water. Stir until the solution is clear.

Fabrics treated with this material do not flame when exposed to fire. They will glow about half a minute, but will not burst into flame.

You can make curtains, draperies and similar articles flame resistant by dipping them in the solution, then wringing. Dry by any convenient means. Spray the solution on carpets, loose cotton and upholstery padding. Use a garden sprayer, a paint sprayer, or the spraying attachment on a vacuum cleaner. Also sprinkle the solution on clothing and other items that require ironing. Be sure to thoroughly dampen the fabric with the solution.

Laundering removes the chemicals, Miss Nystrom said. Articles should be treated again after washing.

HOW TO SELECT A CHRISTMAS TREE

Moscow — Thickets of Christmas trees springing up on vacant lots and parking strips are reminders of the approaching holiday season, and hints to shoppers that the time to select a tree is when there is a wide choice of fresh specimens.

One of the first points to consider, said Homer Futer, county extension agent, is pliable needles. Trees that have fresh, springy needles last longer without shedding. They hold their beauty and fragrance and are less likely to catch fire.

It is wise to give any tree plenty of water, regardless of its condition

TIPS ON WINTER DRIVING ARE TIMELY

A motorist whose car stalls on the highway is suddenly projected into one of the most potentially dangerous traffic situations there is, say State Police.

The danger arises from the fact that when this occurs on a curved roadway, or when there is poor visibility created by fog or darkness, the stalled car and its occupants become an unwitting target for approaching vehicles traveling at high rates of speed.

Police offer this advice to drivers when their vehicle stalls for any reason:

1. Before the car loses momentum, pull off as far onto the shoulder of the highway as is safe.
2. Turn the car's lights on. Get out on the side facing away from traffic and have any passengers do likewise.
3. Never walk around the car or attempt to do any work on it until you have placed flares or some other warning device at least 300 feet behind the vehicle. Remember, when a car is traveling at 60 miles an hour, the average driver requires about 350 feet to stop.
4. In setting out flares, walk as

far off the roadway as possible until you reach the point where you are going to place the flare — place it and quickly get back from the roadway.

If you do not have flares, waving a newspaper or something white is an effective way to warn oncoming traffic, especially at night.

5. While waiting for help, stand well off the roadway away from traffic. It is generally much safer to remain outside of your car, rather than to sit in it.

SCIENCE FACTS

Chicago — Doctors will really get under your skin with a new microscope developed at the Illinois Institute of Technology. A hypodermic needle attached to the unit now makes it possible to look at blood vessels and tissue without making an incision. The needle is filled with two bundles of approximately 10,000 tiny glass fibers. One bundle carries light down to illuminate the tissue, the other transfers light reflected by the tissues back up the needle. The area viewed by the needle is 1-50th of an inch wide and 7-250ths of an inch long.

Fire fighting with jet engines gains fast control of large conflagrations, according to English scientists, who

mounted a jet engine on a 6-ton van and produced 50,000 cubic feet of inert gas a minute to smother the flames. The gas stream can also be used with some detergents to produce high-expansion foam for fires in basements and lower parts of buildings.

Car Crazy Americans are sure to read an article detailing one of those "revolutionary" engines of the future that will run on anything from buttermilk to hair oil. A major oil company takes the "wet-blanket" view that buttermilk, hair oil and even distilled water cost more than gasoline's 30¢ a pound (not including tax) at the pump. To support its case, the company quotes the follow-

ing gallon prices: Milk, 79¢; cooking oil, \$1.99; vinegar, 69¢; bleach, 59¢; distilled water, 49¢.

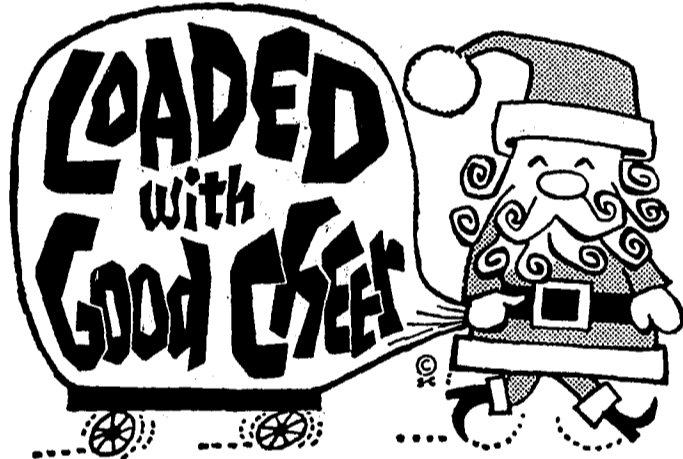
