Lesse Groseclose Dies - 73 Yrs.

Lesse Brady Groseclose, 73, a resi-dent of Juliaetta for almost 60 years, died at the St. Joseph's Hospital at Lewiston at 5:10 p. m. Saturday, Jan: 4. The cause of death was a heart attack. He had been ill about 10 days. 10 days.

He was born Sept. 18, 1890, in Virginia, and moved with his family to Juliaetta at the age of 12. Except for two years in the army dur-ing World War I, he had spent the rest of his life at Juliaetta. He had farmed all his life, retiring in 1955.

He married Anna Steensma at Lewiston in October of 1922. She passed away in April of 1955. On Nov. 26, 1960, at Coeur d'Alene

he was united in marriage to Beryl Hemmert, who survives at the family home.

Other survivors are a brother, Lude C., Juliaetta, and a sister, Mrs. Etta Mae Sullivan, Long Beach, Calif.

Funeral services were held at 11 a. m., Wednesday, at the Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel in Lewiston, with the Rev. Bruce B. Groseclose, pastor of the First Methodist Church in Lewiston as officiant. Interment was in the Kendrick Cemetery.
