HOUSE PLANTS

U. of I., Moscow — You can water African violets from the top, according to George Woodbury, University of Idaho horticulturalist, as long as the water isn't cold. Cold water will spot the leaves.

Many people prefer to water these plants from the bottom, he pointed out, and this system is equally good. The main thing is not to keep the plant in water all the time. If they are constantly saturated, roots won't absorb the plant food elements prop-

Proper light is another important factor in growing African violets, Woodbury stated. During the wincompanied Mr. and Mrs. Eugene ter months place the plants in a south or east window. In summer luck dinner and Grange County move them to a west window, he

Woodbury also recommended dividing the plants frequently, otherwise the roots will become crowded in the pot. Knock the plant out of the pot, divide them into as many pieces as there are growing points,

and re-pot each new piece. If the plants are divided and repotted frequently, you won't need to add fertilizer. The new soil used in the re-potting will take care of the plants needs. However, if the plant hasn't been re-potted, or you notice the leaves have lost their bright green appearance, you may want to put on fertilizer, available through your garden or flower store, Woodbury pointed out.


