On Sportsmanship
As the District 2 4-A basketball tournament begins here next week, Supt. James V. Muscat releases the following message:

"These are high school athletes who are performing in these tournaments. They are friendly rivals as members of opposing teams. They are not enemies.

"This basically is the theme of interscholastic athletics — the idea of friendly competition. The visiting teams are the guests of the home team. They are expected to be so regarded and so treated.

"The officials are men who, by agreement between the competing teams, are assigned to administer the rules of the game. Their experience and their integrity qualify them for their part in these games. This attitude of sportsmanship should be reflected by all spectators, too, no matter what their personal feelings of loyalty may be to one or the other of the teams in these contests.

"Interscholastic athletics are for Sportsmen — both on the court and in the stands!"

About Kindergarten

The students should be the ones starting school this coming September. All students that plan to start school must be 6 years old on or before Oct. 15, 1964. If they are not 6 by that time they will not be allowed to attend school.

The time will be 8:30 to 11:30 at Kendrick High School. Kindergarten students may ride the bus in the mornings, but transportation home must be arranged by parents.

Cost will be \$12.00, instruction per pupil; \$1.20 for workbooks. One workbook will be "Preparing for Reading"; one will be "Kindergarten New Math."

If parents wish their children to have milk, arrangements may be made with Mrs. Werner Brammer at the time of registration. Registration must be completed by March 5. This is so all materials and arrangements may be completed by March 9. Kindergarten will run from March 9 to April 21, with Spring Vacation on April 9 and 10.

Students should bring: A shoe box, blunt scissors, box of 8 crayons, mat or rug (for resting), and should have some shoes that will not mar floors.

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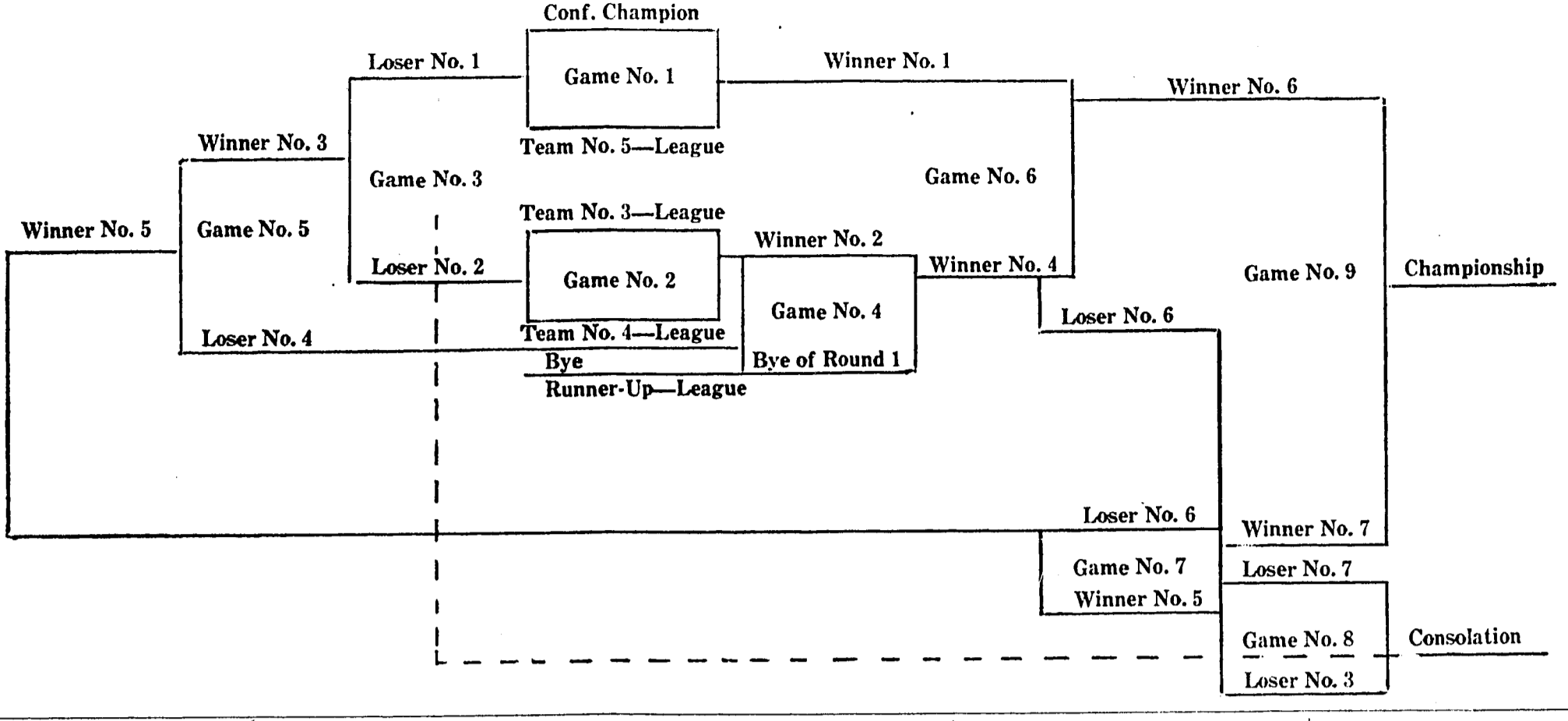
