

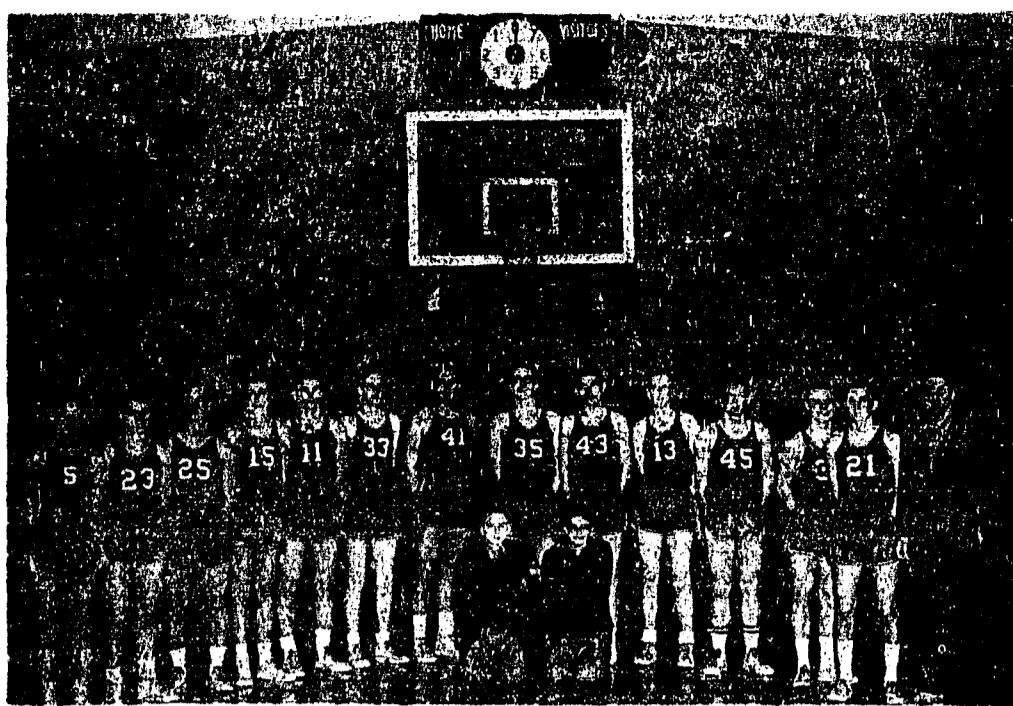

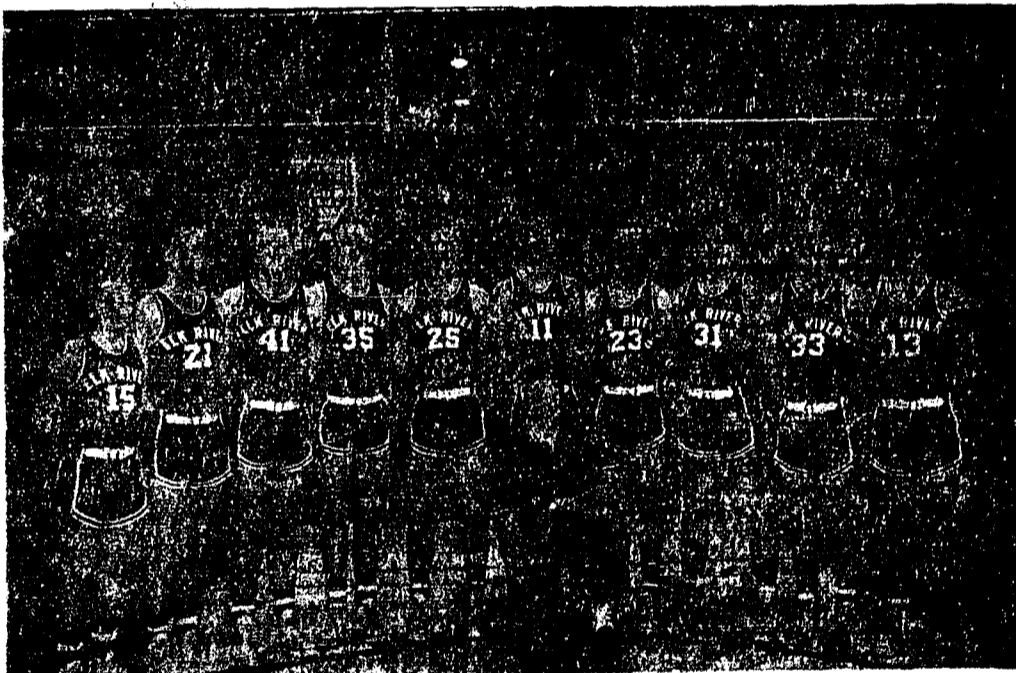

FOREST RESERVE PROVIDES GRAZING

Missoula — A total of 144,491 cattle and 154,060 sheep harvested tons of rich forage last year on the 16 National Forests of the Northern Region, Neal M. Rahm, regional forester, reports.

Rahm said the cattle and sheep grazed on an estimated 6 million acres of National Forest range land under 2,335 paid grazing permits.

Paid grazing permits in the U. S. Forest Service's northern region returned approximately \$395,700.00 to the U. S. treasurer in the fiscal year 1963. Twenty-five percent of this amount is returned to the counties where earned, for use in building and maintaining schools and roads.

An additional 10,596 animals grazed on these national forests without charge. Most of these were horses and mules used by recreation visitors in remote areas of the national forests.

"Livestock grazing on national forests is important to the local economy," Rahm pointed out. "The grazing permits for these public land aid in stabilizing the rural economy."

Range improvements on these national forests in 1963 included 132 new water developments; 177 miles of new range fences; 29 miles of stock driveway and construction of 58 other range improvements. Prior to 1964 there were 3,650 water developments; 3,070 miles of range fence and 535 miles of stock trails and feedways on northern region ranges. Range fences maintained on National Forests of the northern region would more than reach from Seattle to New York (2,900 miles).

Forage production in recent years has been increased by aerial spraying to control big sagebrush. Last year 11,500 acres were sprayed by helicopters to control sagebrush, and 1,400 acres were re-seeded to desirable forage grasses.

WINTER WEATHER LIKE MARCH

For a solid week this area enjoyed some of the finest spring weather that anyone could wish. The days were bright sunshine, the nights rather cool (readings of about 24 to 28 above) being commonplace.

However, Saturday night rain began to fall here in the valley, and snow on the ridges, and in some areas it reached a depth of four inches. Sunday, about noon, the skies began to clear and it turned into a beautiful day. Here in the valley folks took advantage of it to rake lawns, burn trash, and otherwise get outdoors.

Monday morning a few flakes of snow fell — but then, the last snow of the season always falls during the basketball tournament.

We might add that here in the valley daffodils are up from two to five inches, tulips are poking their heads above the ground, lilac buds are really swelling, and crocus are in bloom.

The Potlatch river is carrying a goodly volume, but it is clear, and holding very steady.

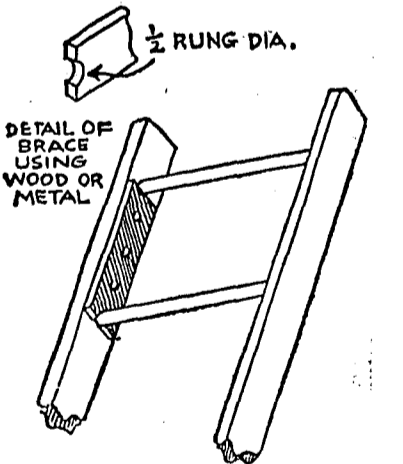

Ladder rungs can be reinforced with wood or metal.

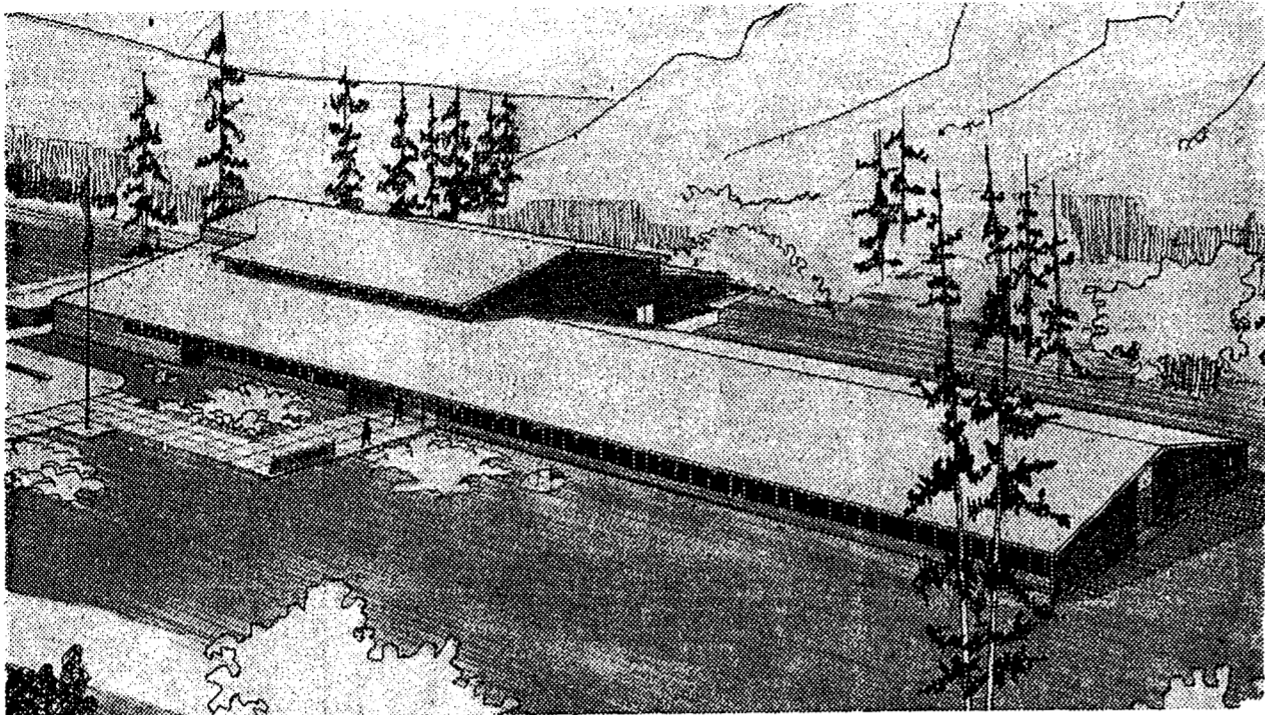
day, wouldn't go near. You should make a periodic check of your ladder steps or rungs and the supporting frames to catch any dangerous deterioration before it is too late.

As added precaution with steps and rungs, before they have had time to become loose or weak, it frequently is advisable to reinforce the ladder with wood or metal. This can be done with wood by nailing a support board to the inside of the ladder frame, after wedging the board between two rungs or steps. Or you can use flat stock steel, in the case of a rung ladder, nailing the steel to the side frame and bending the ends of the metal so they fit the contour of the rungs.

For a protective finish, we do not recommend paint, but a clear lacquer instead. This will leave the wood visible so defects can be easily detected.

IDAHO 4-H'ERS HIT HIGH MEMBERSHIP

U. of I., Moscow — Record membership of 18,422 boys and girls in 4-H Club work during 1963 was reported this week by the University of Idaho extension service. Figures compiled by Maurice Johnson, assistant state club leader, showed an increase from 18,197 in 1962. He said an even larger enrollment is expected in 1964. Clubs are organizing for the season throughout the state. The report said the boys and girls worked on a total of 32,881 projects — nearly two each. Most popular in the livestock category was beef production, which drew 1,468 members. Dairy cattle were next with 1,327. Horses claimed attention of 1,282. Interest of 4-H members in raising horses and ponies is increasing rapidly, Johnson said. Nearly three times as many boys and girls are in the project as there were in

1960. Foods and clothing are tops for girls, following the standard of many years. Health projects for both boys and girls boomed up to a record of 3,378, an increase of 500 over the previous year. Nearly 50 categories of agricultural and home economics training are represented in the 4-H projects.

REGISTRATION FOR U. IS UNDERWAY

U. of I., Moscow — Start of the fall semester is seven months away, but already the University of Idaho has received more than 2,000 requests from new students to register. Frank Young, director of admissions says. "Because of space limitations, we have been urging prospective new students to apply early, and they are doing just that." "We are so swamped with requests that currently we are running 10 days behind on replies," Young said. Young added that some high school seniors are forgetting or were not aware that this year they must take national admission tests prior to coming to the university, instead of the placement tests formerly given at the university after arrival. "Students who have not taken the tests at this time still have an opportunity to take them in March, May and July," Young advised. "The local school personnel have the details on times and places in various state areas for taking the tests." Charles H. Bond, chief student counselor at the university, said he anticipated an unusually heavy program of counseling during the com-

ing spring and summer. "It has been necessary this year to limit counseling to those high school seniors actually planning to enter the university," Bond added.

SNOW SURVEY REPORT FOR FEB.

Moscow — The snow depth on the Moscow Mountain snow course is 44.1 inches more than last year. There are 57.7 inches of snow this year compared with 13.6 inches last year. The records show this month's snow depth is 17.7 inches above the previous 6-year average of 40 inches. The water content on the Moscow Mountain course shows a substantial increase over last month and also over last year: 16.7 inches more water than last year, and 2.8 inches more water than last month. Although there is 4.3 inches less snow than last month on the course, which had a 61 inch record depth. The other snow courses on Moscow Mountain are: East Twin, West Twin, Crumarine Creek and Howard Creek. The snow depth on these courses varies from 49.2 inches of snow on East Twin to 31.2 inches at Howard Creek. There was no snow reported for these four courses last year. Water content on these four courses varies from 19.5 inches at East Twin to 10.2 inches at Howard Creek.

The assailant was identified and readily admitted the crime. Behind him lay a long, sordid record of perverted sexual behavior.

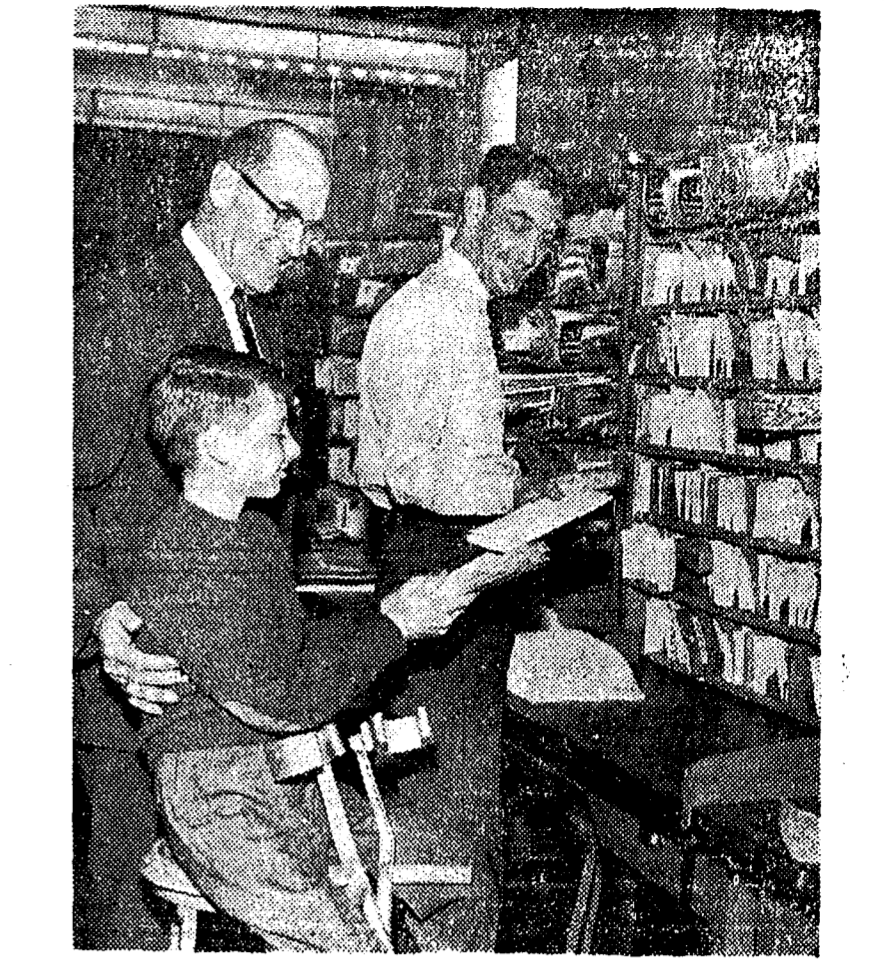

The first page was given over to the address of President John Adams to the Senate and House, and the replies by the Speakers of each house; quotes from the London Gazette on conditions in England and reports of war in Europe.

The middle two pages were heavily outlined in black with one-fourth inch black rules dividing each column as a note of mourning for Gen. George Washington, who had recently died. There was an obituary of the late president; a detailed report of the funeral rites and burial.

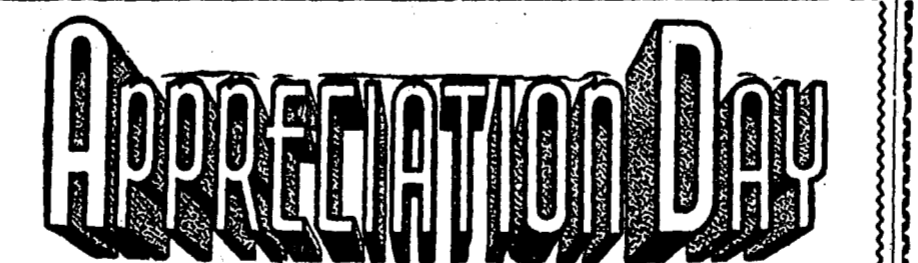
