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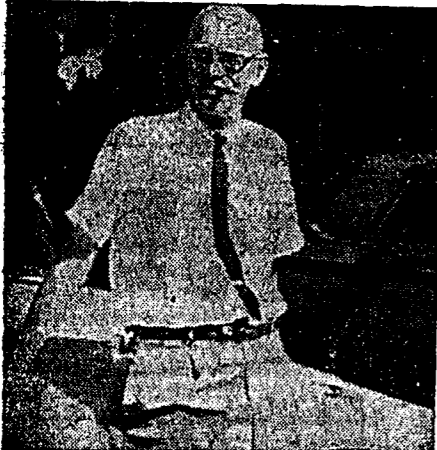
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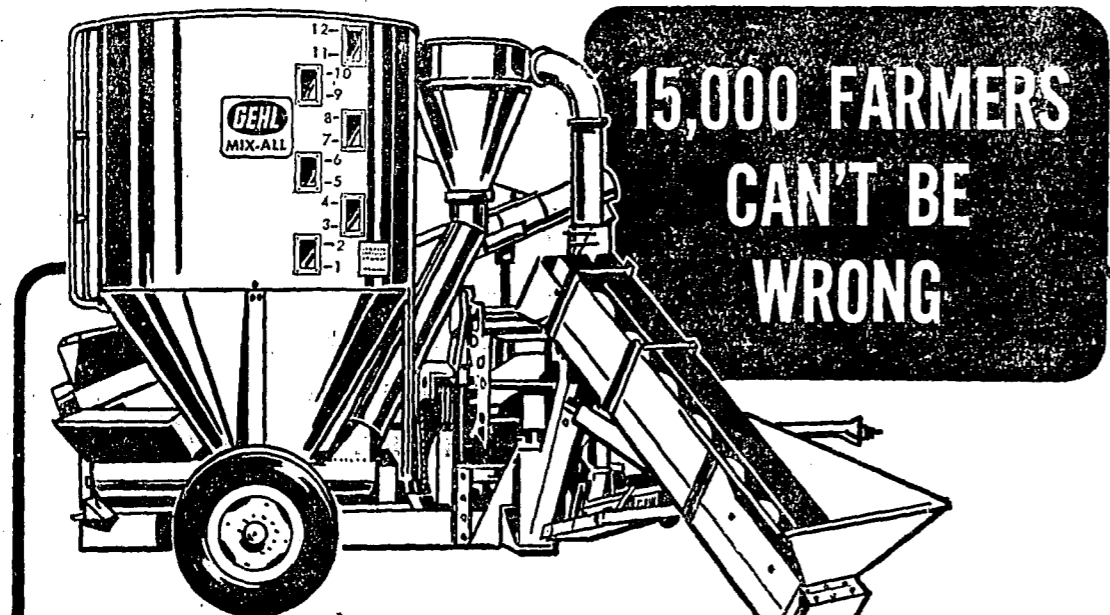
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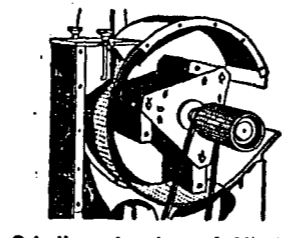
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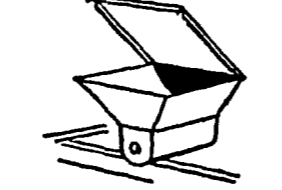
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**BARLEY SIGNUP
END IS NEAR**

Moscow — Feed grain producers are reminded that March 27, 1964, is the final date to sign up in the feed grain program. This voluntary program is intended to help maintain income while reducing feed grain

production. Even though an appeal is pending an application must be signed by March 27, Clarence Jensen, chairman of the ASC county committee said today. "Time has a way of slipping away from us even though we think we have plenty," he said, "and actually there is only two days left in which to sign up for this year's program"

The program provisions are much

the same as last year's, although at this date less than half of last year's 216 sign-ups are participating. In 1963, 5,200 acres were diverted from feed grain into some conservation land use, for which an earned payment of \$68,800.00 was paid.

The slow signup is due in part to pending wheat legislation now before congress. Also the heavy snow cover in some parts of the county de-

lays firm plans for spring seeding.

**FAR AWAY SNOWS
TO BE RECORDED**

U. of I., Moscow — Systems design of telemetry equipment to tell what is happening in the snow pack in remote mountain locations took a

step forward at a meeting attended by University of Idaho engineering assistant research professor G. A. McKean.

The University of Idaho, under contract to the Corps of Engineers, has been pioneering in the design of radioisotope snow gauges which can immediately provide data to predict run-off and flood possibilities.

Prof. McKean met in Chicago with representatives of Motorola, Inc., to discuss problems which led to a tentative design of radio equipment suitable for use both in radioisotope snow gauge system and a stream gauging system being tested in the Sacramento Valley. A single design of radio equipment that would satisfy both needs was the aim of the session.

The special radio equipment is not available commercially but may soon be as a result of the conference.

"It is anticipated that this equipment will be an integral part of the successful completion of the university's work in this area," Prof. McKean said.

BRIDGE BIDS IN

Lewiston — On a call for bids for the construction of a 193-foot concrete bridge over the Palouse River and grading the approaches, in the vicinity of Potlatch, known as Idaho Federal Aid Project No. S-4818(1) in Latah county, the apparent low bidder was the Dunham Construction Co. of Spokane, in the amount of \$64,860.00.

4-H CONGRESS

Moscow — The annual 4-H Congress, sponsored by the extension service, will be conducted on the University of Idaho campus at Moscow, June 21-26.

AGRICULTURAL FACTS

Sandy loam soil is good for gardens, say University of Idaho specialists, because they drain well and are easy to work.

Sudden changes in dairy feed can cause loss of production, according to George Cleveland, dairy specialist of the University of Idaho extension service. He advises gradual adjustment to pasture and continuation of roughage as the basic food. Australia supplied about 46 percent of total U. S. beef and veal imports in 1963, according to University of Idaho extension economists. New Zealand supplied 22 percent.

DRY MILK FOOD

Production of non-fat dry milk for human food in 1963 amounted to about two billion pounds, according to the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture. This was four percent below the record of 1962, but above the recent yearly averages.

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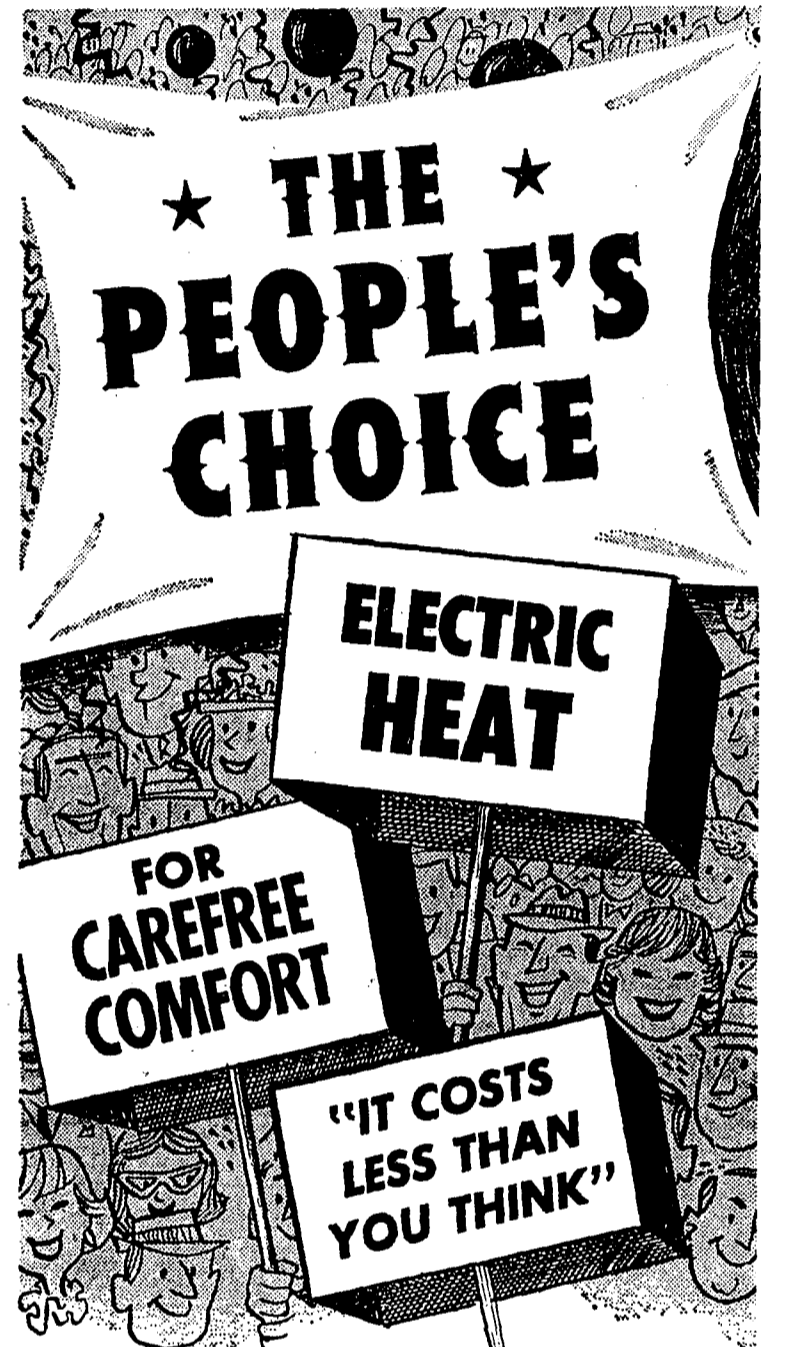
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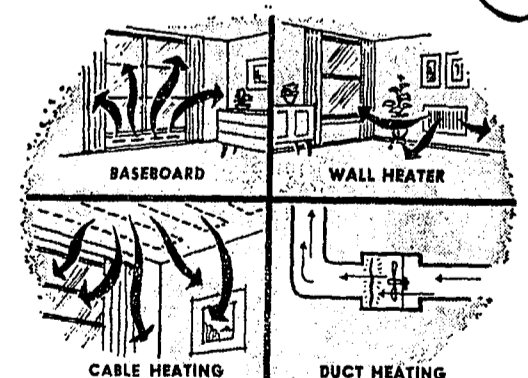
