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ATTENDANCE WAS DISAPPOINTING AT SEWER MEETING

Attendance at the public meeting called by the Village Trustees on the big problem facing Kendrick - Sewage Disposal last Tuesday evening was disappointingly small, there being only about 45 present.

The meeting was presided over by L. A. Wallace, Kendrick mayor. Geo. F. Brocke, Jr., a village trustee, and Robt. Magnuson, village clerk, put the cost figures on a huge black-board and explained the various proposals open to the village that would meet the requirements of the Idaho State Board of Health.

They were as follows: Using the lagoon-type disposal facility the estimated cost will be \$121,000. Using the mechanical type disposal facility, \$92,000.00.

Of the \$121,000 cost of the former there would be available a federal grant of \$34,500, leaving the village's share at \$86,500.00.

On the mechanical facility the portion paid by the federal government would be \$27,500, leaving the village share at \$44,500.00.

Included in the cost of either of the two is:

Reconstruction on Main Street for the handling of surface run-off in the amount of \$21,000; or - construction of new storm pickup sewers in the alleys to handle the Main Street run-off, \$21,000.

Also included in either project is an addition to the domestic sewage collection system at a cost of \$8,000. This latter includes a new sewer to the Kendrick High school, and to the homes in that area not served by the present sewer (none are) - and this is a "must" says the State Board of Health.

"What will it cost me?" was, of course, one of the main questions asked those in charge. This question cannot be completely and satisfactorily answered until an "absolute" cost on the project can be arrived at. However, this is a near as can be answered at this time, and is thought to be "not far off."

A single dwelling, \$3.20 per month. Average business firm \$1.90 per month.

Hotels, cafes, etc., \$8.35 per month. Kendrick High school \$54.00 per month.

It was emphasized, however, that this figure could vary slightly in either direction, and might go as high as \$4.00 per month for the average home.

A great deal of discussion and many questions later an "arm vote" on the various proposals indicated those present favored the mechanical system, due to its lower first cost; the fact that a pumping plant would have to be installed and maintained for the lagoon type, and therefore there was little difference in the estimated maintenance.

In sharp contrast to the last public meeting on this matter, presided over by a member of the State Board of Health, and engineers - this session broke up on a friendly, cooperative note - all leaving feeling they had learned a great deal, and that this "must project" should go through.

Mr. Wallace said that another such meeting would be held soon in the hopes that those not present for this session would attend the next.

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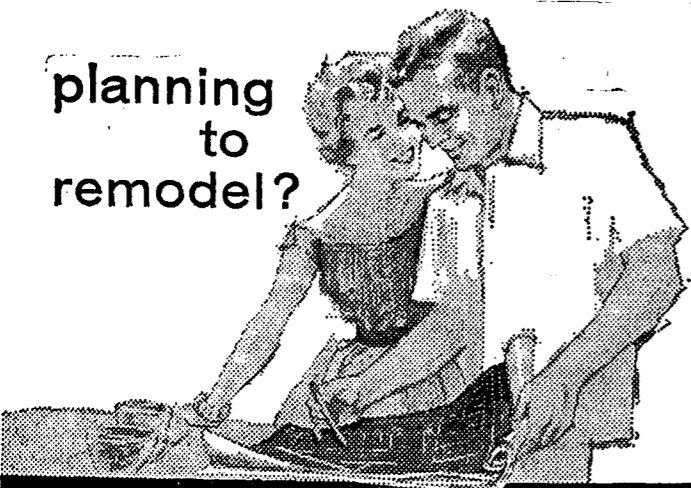

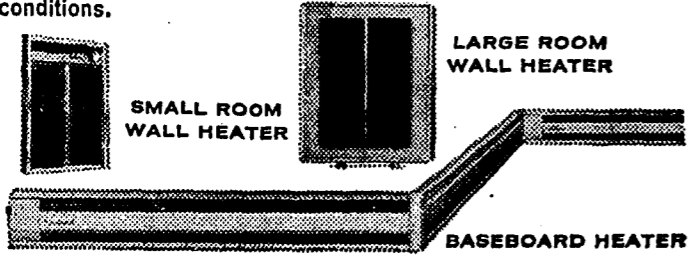
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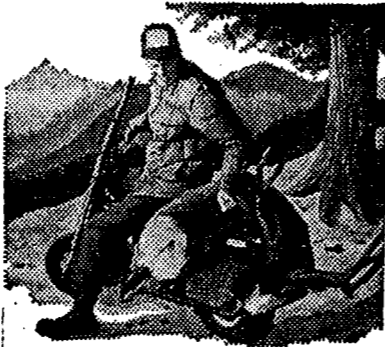

Helicopter in background was used to hover over the animals while a biologist shoots a dart containing a hypodermic needle with a muscle relaxant drug into the animal. This temporarily immobilizes the beast long enough for the biologist to descend and mark the moose.

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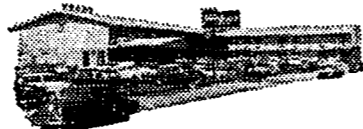

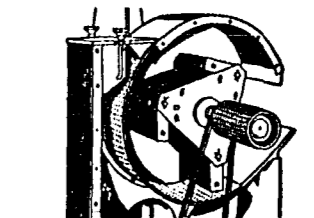

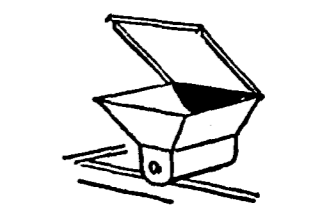

Lewiston Tribune of March 9, 1964: Fights Library

To the Tribune: As the Tribune printed Tuesday that a meeting was held at the Bank of Idaho, March 2, petitions were circulated to bring the Nez Perce County Free Library up on the November ballot to abolish said library.

We have collected our true figures on the maintenance and running of the library and find it is far from free and very little goes in education. We feel the only way to curb the runaway spending is to abolish the library and if the Orchards wish, they can establish their own library district and have their own library.

I feel the Orchards are being pushed to the wall with their sewer charges - water rates, sidewalks in certain areas. I hope they will look at the tax figures here and ask themselves if they can afford a 5-mill tax for the library or say a 10-mill tax and also look at the outlying area. See what the 2-mills are costing the farmers and the small towns; what would a 10-mill tax do to us?

There are things coming up now, some are more pressing to the Orchards which we, in the outlying area, can help them curb. We hope the Orchards will help the outlying area curb more taxes and the first is to support and work on the abolishing of the Nez Perce County Free Library. - MRS. DELLA WYATT, Lapwai, Idaho.

Wants To "Withdraw" To the Tribune: The residents of the outlying areas of Nez Perce County who want to withdraw from the Nez Perce County Free Library District have several reasons for wanting to do so.

First, the outlying areas are paying too much into the library for what the residents get out of it. Second, the library is spending too much money, more than their income, causing them to take money out of either the reserve or book funds to balance the budget.

The following figures indicate the reason many of us wish to leave the library to those in the Lewiston Or-

chards tract who are interested in it. 1. Nez Perce County Free Library began its operation in 1959 at a 1/2-mill levy to operate because of a Federal grant. That year the income was \$19,525.97; the year's expenses were \$17,749.88. 2. 1-mill tax in 1960, no federal grant available. 3. 1 1/2-mills in 1961 to purchase books and replace those on loan by the state library. 4. 2-mills in 1962 to purchase a bookmobile when the state library recalled its bookmobile. 5. In November of 1962, the library started its service to Lewis County. This brings in \$8,796.00. Lewis county levies a 1-mill tax for this service. Nez Perce County Free Library expenses this year were \$37,797.30. 6. Income in 1963 was \$49,589.56; expenses were \$51,615.51. Income for 1964 is \$49,497.00; the budget set up is \$51,296.54. Budget set up for books in 1964 is \$12,000. 7. Salaries in 1963 were \$23,295.41; set up for 1964 is \$28,070. - MRS. HOWARD WYATT, Lapwai.

RESEARCH DONE ON POULTRY HOUSING

Research by two University of Idaho professors into the effect of windowless type poultry housing on physical and egg production factors has been published in "Transaction," an American Society of Agricultural Engineers Journal. The study conducted by J. E. Dixon assistant professor of agricultural engineering, and C. E. Lampman, professor of poultry husbandry, had been presented at a meeting of the ASAE in Washington, D. C. It was printed in the journal for greater distribution. "There is no difference in egg production or environmental factors when chickens are housed in an insulated and fan ventilated windowed or windowless pen," said Professor Dixon. He added: "This is true for such factors as egg production, feed consumption, average maximum and minimum temperatures and relative humidity, litter, temperature, and moisture content, and ventilation. Power failure in windowless poultry pens can, however, cause excess stress on the birds."

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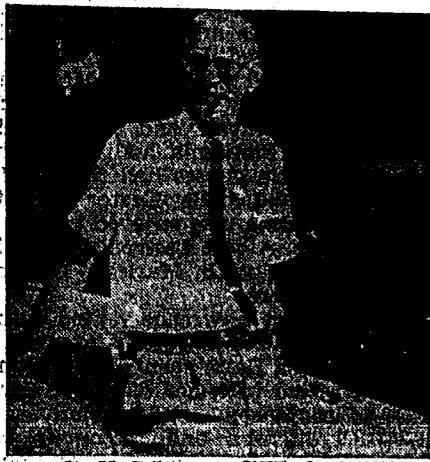
