VILLAGE TRUSTEES SELECT DISPOSAL SYSTEM FOR VOTE

At the last meeting of the Kendrick Village Board, after due consideration, it was decided to follow the "vote" recommendation of those attending the last public sewage disposal meeting, and offer the following to the registered and eligible voters of Kendrick:

Use the mechanical type disposal facility, which is the cheaper to install by \$30,000 — or an engineers' estimated cost of \$92,000.00.

Again following the recommendation of the public meeting it was decided on: Construction of new storm sewer pickup in the alley south of Main Street, with ½-block "pickup" sewers running from the new sewer to inlets on Main Street. This will include installation of inlets at alley crossings and greatly improve the present poor drainage in those areas.

Cost of this operation is \$31,000.00. Additions to the Domestic Sewage Collection System — Here, again, the recommendation of the public meeting was followed. This addition to the present sewer system will serve the new Jr. High and High School, and residents in that area, which are not now on the sewer system. This item is a "must." Cost of it, by engineers estimate, is \$8,000.00.

Thus it can be seen that the cost (engineers' estimate) of the entire project is \$121,000.00. Of this total amount a federal grant is available in the amount of \$27,500.00 — leaving the cost to the Village of Kendrick at \$93,500.00.

Explanation and Comment: The cost of the entire project is far below that of the first estimate — which voters turned down more than two to one.

In the so-called construction of new pickup sewers in the alley, this move was made to avoid the terrific cost of tearing up and replacing the old pavement of Main Street (the alley is not paved). It is not in any way an addition to the present system, but is merely a "change-over" to continue present drainage by changing the "cross-over" tiles — and is in no way an extension of the present system.

Voters may rest assured that the Village Trustees will do everything in their power to keep the cost of this "must" project at the lowest possible level. However, the requirements of the State Board of Health must be met in the main plant and its connections.

A date for submission of the plan to the voters has been tentatively set for Tuesday, May 26th, 1964 — and another public meeting is planned before that time — to permit those who failed to attend the last meeting to familiarize themselves with every detail.

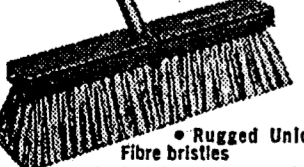
