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

Almost simultaneously, available supplies of the new varieties were allocated to selected bean industry representatives for seed increase. A complete distribution of all supplies was made. No more seed is available. Seed increase will be under contract to the Crop Improvement association and all seed remains the property of that association. This seed will be released to certified growers in 1965.

In trials in the Twin Falls sections UI 36 has made yields of 3,007 pounds and UI 37 2,474 pounds per acre.
