





**REPORT ON LIBRARY PROGRESS MADE**

At the request of M. Vanderpool, Juliaetta, the following article is reprinted from the Lewiston Tribune

of April 12, 1964:  
The "outstanding progress" made during the last year by the Nez Perce Library District was described Monday by two board members of the library district board of trustees. "All of the district's administrative problems have been solved since Ed-

ward Linkhart was hired as administrative librarian," members of the Twentieth Century Club were told. Mrs. George Stedman, board president, and Mrs. C. Wallace Meckstroth reviewed the history of the district and told of its services. Mrs. Stedman said the services include over-the-counter circulation at the central library, twice-a-month bookmobile stops throughout the county, inter-library loans whereby the patrons may get books not in the library stock, and professional consultation. Linkhart was described by Mrs. Meckstroth as a professional librarian of exceptional abilities. She said his advice on library matters is being sought throughout the state. "The library district has saved thousands of dollars by hiring Linkhart," Mrs. Meckstroth said. "Prior to his coming, the board had adopted a formula providing for a professional administrative librarian and an assistant at the central library. The combined salary would have ranged to 12,860. Linkhart's administration eliminated the need for an assistant. He was able to do the work of two people for his salary of \$8,000. Circulation has increased steadily since he came and reached an all time high of more than 14,000 books a month for the last three months." History Reviewed The speakers reviewed the history of the district from the pre-election year of 1956 when the Idaho State Library board of trustees set up the

Idaho State Library Planning Committee with an advisor in each county. Mrs. Meckstroth was named advisor for Nez Perce County. She conducted a survey on library needs of the county, submitting a report to the state board. The survey showed that there was no tax-supported, public library within the area that would be eligible for a library district. The facilities of the Lapwai School library were available to the people of Lapwai during school hours. A friends of the library group was formed and through the efforts of that group, county women's clubs and parent-teacher associations, a complete coverage of the county was made on the proposal to establish a district. Brochures with complete information were provided by the Idaho State Library. Talks on the proposed district were given to clubs and organizations by the advisor and members of the Idaho State Library staff and board. There were also radio and television programs and articles in the Lewiston Morning Tribune. Mrs. Stedman and Mrs. Meckstroth deplored the fact that anyone would claim that the people were taken by surprise. They said complete coverage by all media of communication prior to the election shows that such a claim is false. Another claim that the district could not have been established in a general election, the women stated, is groundless. Mrs. Meckstroth ex-

plained the the Nez Perce County Commissioners, in response to petitions with more than twice the required 50 signatures, put the issue on the ballot in the August 12, 1958 primary election. A total of 2,060 votes was cast and the district was established by a favorable vote of 1,132 or a majority of 204 votes. "We have been challenged too on the use of the word 'free' in the name of the library district," Mrs. Meckstroth said. "It is required by law," she explained, and read a section of the Library District Enabling Act: "A petition or petitions signed by 50 or more qualified electors residing in the proposed library district which shall include the words, 'free library' . . . ."

The women praised the Idaho State Library for the support it has given the district since its establishment. Included were loans of books and the state bookmobile for which the district paid only for the operating expenses. The district had the use of the state bookmobile under those conditions until it purchased one in the fall of 1962. The district still has approximately 10,000 books on loan from the state. Levy Raised It was possible to start the district operation on a half mill levy, Mrs. Meckstroth said, because of the dollar-for-dollar matching of federal funds that were available only the first year. The millage was increased by necessity to 1 mill for the second year and by one-half mill each year for the next two because of the purchase of a bookmobile and the needs of the growing district. The district board could have levied 2 mills the first year but it proceeded cautiously, increasing the levy only as needs demanded. A 2-mill

### NEW RED BEANS BEING DEVELOPED

U. of I., Moscow. Two new early-maturing varieties of Red Mexican beans are a step closer to commercial production. The pair, UI 36 and UI 37, promise to make Red Mexican bean production possible in new areas of Idaho and reduce the risk of a short growing season in established bean producing sections.

This week in Twin Falls, Marshall LeBaron, superintendent of the Twin Falls branch of the University of Idaho Agricultural Experiment station, delivered a 50 - sack supply of precious seed beans to Carl Blackburn, outgoing director of the Idaho Crop Improvement association. Almost simultaneously, available supplies of the new varieties were allocated to selected bean industry representatives for seed increase. A complete distribution of all supplies was made. No more seed is available. Seed increase will be under contract to the Crop Improvement association and all seed remains the property of that association. This seed will be released to certified growers in 1965.

With favorable growing conditions this year there should be in excess of 1,000 bags of UI 36 and 500 bags of UI 37 available to certified growers in 1965 . . . enough for 3,000 acres. By 1966, if all goes well, there should be sufficient supplies of seed that the two new Idaho beans could make up a significant part of the commercial Red Mexican bean acreage planted.

Dr. L. L. Dean, University of Idaho plant scientist and developer of the new beans, views the 20-day earlier maturity of UI 36 as its prime advantage. In addition, the new variety has added resistance to seed borne mosaic. UI 37 matures even 10 days earlier than UI 36 but at the cost of some reduction in yield. In trials in the Twin Falls sections UI 36 has made yields of 3,007 pounds and UI 37 2,474 pounds per acre.

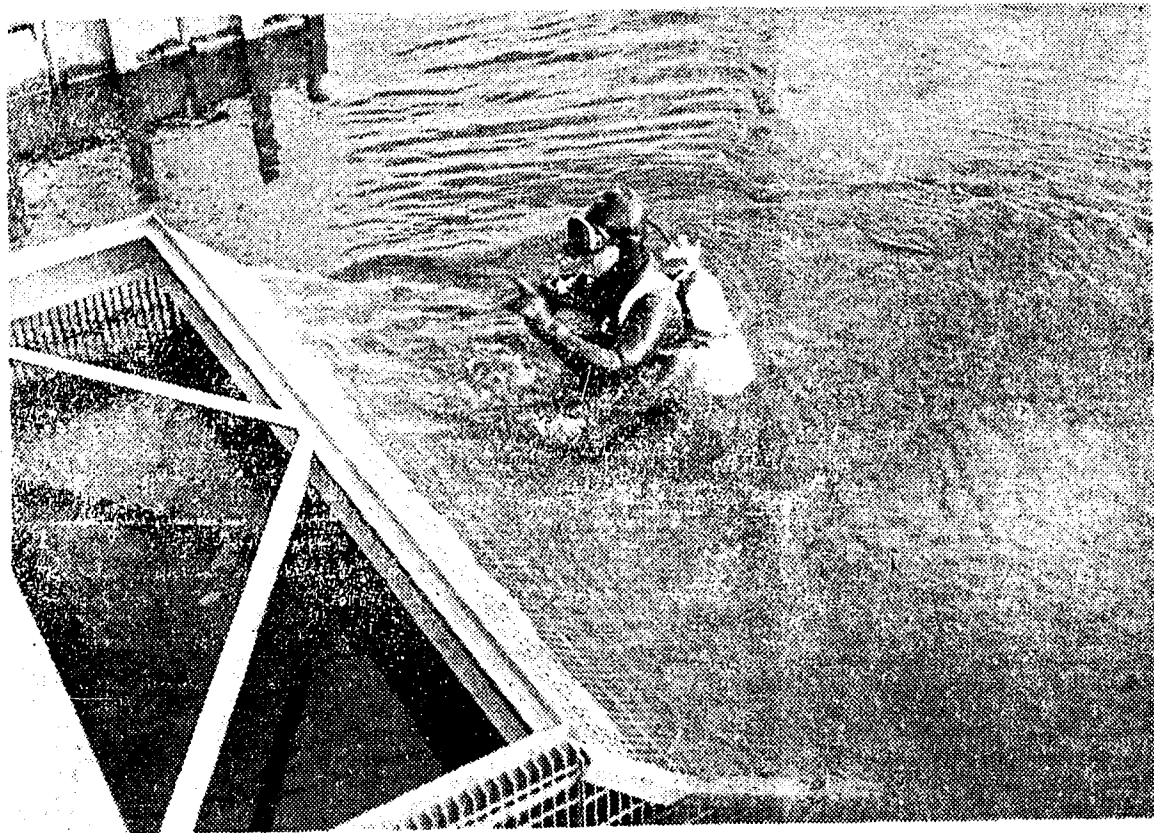

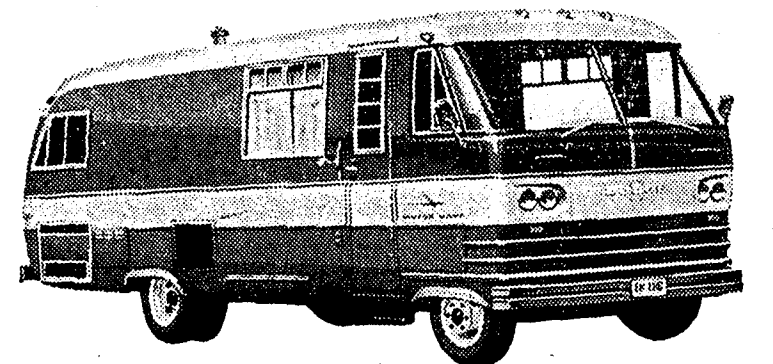

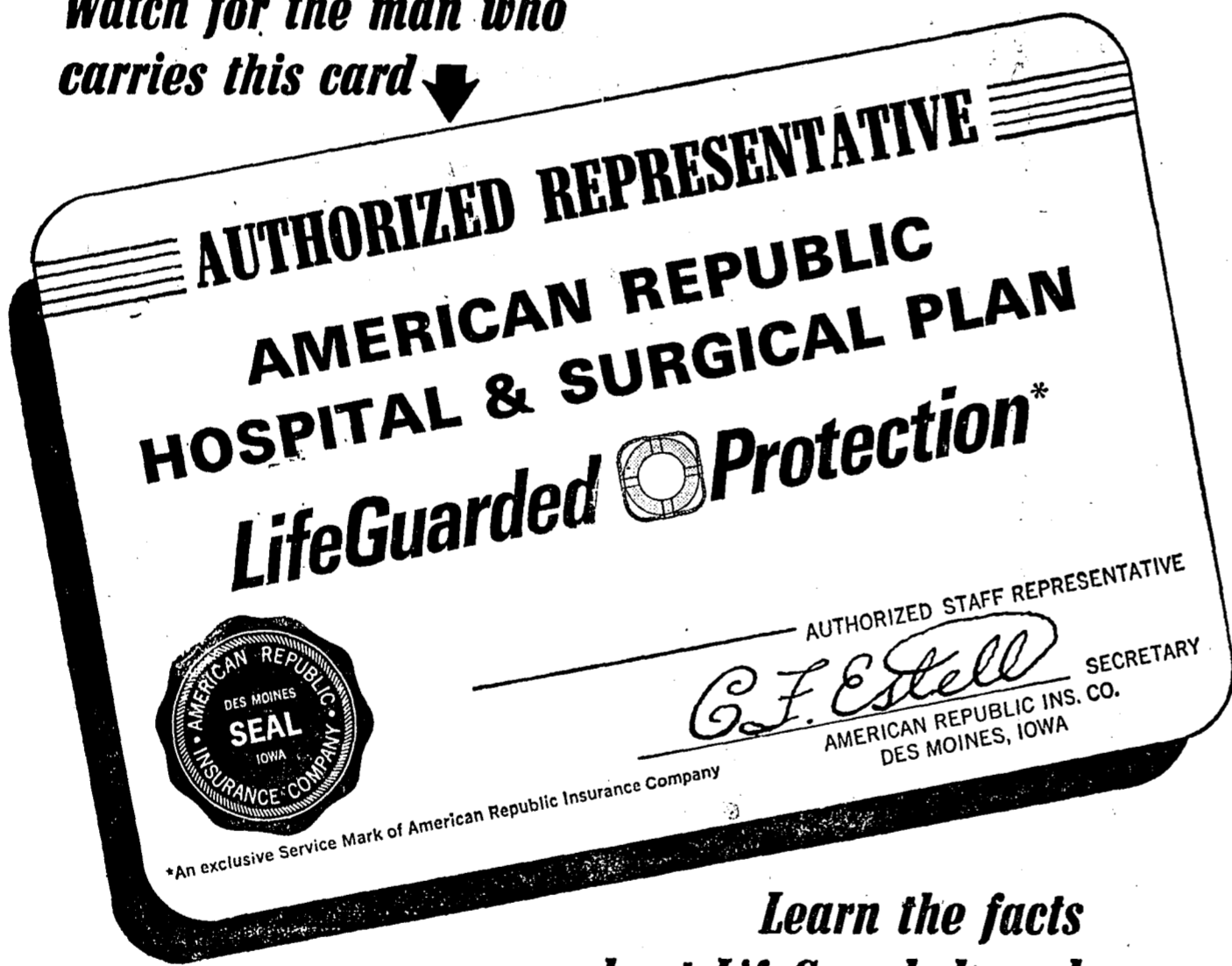

#### ORDINANCE NO. 514

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE PAYMENT OF A PART OF THE COST AND EXPENSE OF THE CONSTRUCTION OF ADDITIONS AND BETTERMENTS TO THE STORM AND SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM IN THE VILLAGE OF KENDRICK, LATAH COUNTY, IDAHO, AT THE TOTAL ESTIMATED COST OF \$121,000.00, OF WHICH \$30,000.00 WILL BE RAISED BY THE ISSUANCE OF GENERAL OBLIGATIONS BONDS, SUBJECT HOWEVER TO THE APPROVAL OF THE INCURRING OF SAID INDEBTEDNESS BY THE QUALIFIED TAXPAYER ELECTORS OF THE VILLAGE OF KENDRICK AT THE SPECIAL ELECTION ORDERED HEREIN; DESCRIBING SAID BONDS; PROVIDING FOR EQUAL ANNUAL TAX LEVIES AND ANNUAL BOND PRINCIPAL TAX LEVIES, FOR THE CREATION OF A SINKING FUND FOR THE PAYMENT OF THE PRINCIPAL AND INTEREST OF SAID BONDS; CALLING A SPECIAL ELECTION FOR THE SUBMISSION TO THE QUALIFIED TAXPAYER ELECTORS OF SAID VILLAGE THE QUESTION OF THE RATIFICATION OR REJECTION OF SAID BOND ISSUE AND OF SAID INDEBTEDNESS; PROVIDING FOR NOTICE OF SUCH ELECTION AND THE PUBLICATION THEREOF, AND PROVIDING FOR THE PUBLICATION AND EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS ORDINANCE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF KENDRICK, IDAHO:

Section 1: That the Board of Trustees of the Village of Kendrick, Latah County, Idaho, deem it advisable to issue municipal coupon bonds of the Village of Kendrick, Idaho, in the sum of \$30,000.00 and incur a municipal indebtedness of said Village in said amount, for the purpose of paying a part of the cost of the construction of additions and betterments to the sewer system of said Village.

Section 2: That the following shall be done:

(a) The construction of additions and betterments to the storm and sanitary sewer system.

The foregoing construction is in accordance with the maps, plans and specifications of said Village, for the carrying out of the Plan of Construction, complete details for which said Project are fully set forth and specified in the above maps, plans and specifications, which said maps, plans and specifications have been filed, and are now on file in the office of the Clerk of said Village, which said maps, plans and specifications are hereby expressly adopted and approved.

The Board of Trustees may make such changes in the Plan of Construction prior to, or in the course of actual construction, which shall be found necessary and desirable and which will not substantially affect or change said Plan; also said Works when finished shall conform to the standards of the State Department of Health.

Section 3: The cost and expense of all the foregoing, together with all necessary costs and engineering expenses, legal costs, labor costs and incidental costs, as estimated by the Board of Trustees, will be \$121,000.00, of which \$30,000.00 will be raised by the issuance of General Obligation Bonds and the balance will be paid for by the issuance and sale of Revenue Bonds and from a Federal Grant.

Section 4: The foregoing General Obligation Bonds, in the amount of \$30,000.00 shall be of the denomination of \$1000.00 each, shall run for a period of twenty (20) years after their date of issue, which shall be the ultimate maturity of said bonds; the annual amortized bond principal maturities thereof and the bond principal amounts which shall be paid annually, shall be payable as follows: \$1000.00 in each of the years 1966 to 1973, both inclusive, and \$2000.00 in each of the years 1974 to 1984, both inclusive, which said bonds shall bear interest at a rate, or rates, not exceeding Five per cent (5%) per annum which shall be payable semi-annually after date, and said principal amounts, together with accruing interest on all outstanding bonds of this bond issue, shall be met and paid by an equal annual tax levy for the payment of the principal of said bonds and the interest thereon during the term of years for which said bonds shall be issued; which said bonds in denominations and in all other respects shall be as provided by law and be consistent with the provisions of said Municipal Bond Law and the law of this State and as subsequently prescribed by the Board of Trustees of the Village of Kendrick, Idaho.

Section 5: The Board of Trustees of the Village of Kendrick, Idaho, shall levy, and cause to be levied and collected annually, at the time when, and in the manner in which other general taxes of said Village are levied and collected, upon all the taxable property within the limits of this Village, in addition to all other authorized taxes and assessments, an annual tax in each year sufficient in each annual amount to meet and pay the interest of such indebtedness as it falls due, according to the foregoing, and also to meet and pay the foregoing bond principal amounts as they mature and also to constitute a Sinking Fund for the payment of the principal of said indebtedness and said bond issue as said bonds mature and within twenty (20) years from the date of contracting said indebtedness, as required by law; and said tax levies thus specified are hereby ordained and directed to be made, and said Sinking Fund is hereby ordained and directed to be made, and is hereby constituted and created in the office of the Treasurer of this Village. Nothing expressed herein shall be construed as denying to said Village the right to apply other funds legally available thereto, to the payment of said

bonds and interest thereon.

Section 6: That a special election of the qualified electors of this Village who are taxpayers thereof, shall be, and is hereby ordered to be held in said Village on TUESDAY, the 9th day of June, 1964, between the hours of 12:00 o'clock, noon and 8:00 o'clock, P.
