STORM AID TALLIED

Olympia (UPI) The federal government contributed \$663,810 toward the cost of repairing public property damaged by the Columbus Day 1962 windstorm. Gov. Albert D. Rossellini announced the final figures on April 14th.

Two-thirds of the total went to governmental units in Clark and Cowlitz counties, which were hardest hit by the storm.

Clark County Public Utility District received \$208,710, the largest single grant. Cowlitz County Public Utility District was in second place at \$125,914. Tacoma City Light placed third with \$54,403.

Aid to all government agencies in Clark county totaled \$222,121, while Cowlitz county units received \$215,042. — The Spokane Daily Chronicle.

With Uncle Sam (the taxpayer) standing by with an open wallet, it is understandable that "public" power might sometimes appear to be "cheaper" than "private" power. The investor-owned companies asked no one to "foot the bills" for the millions of dollars in damages to their electrical systems inflicted by the same Columbus Day storm.

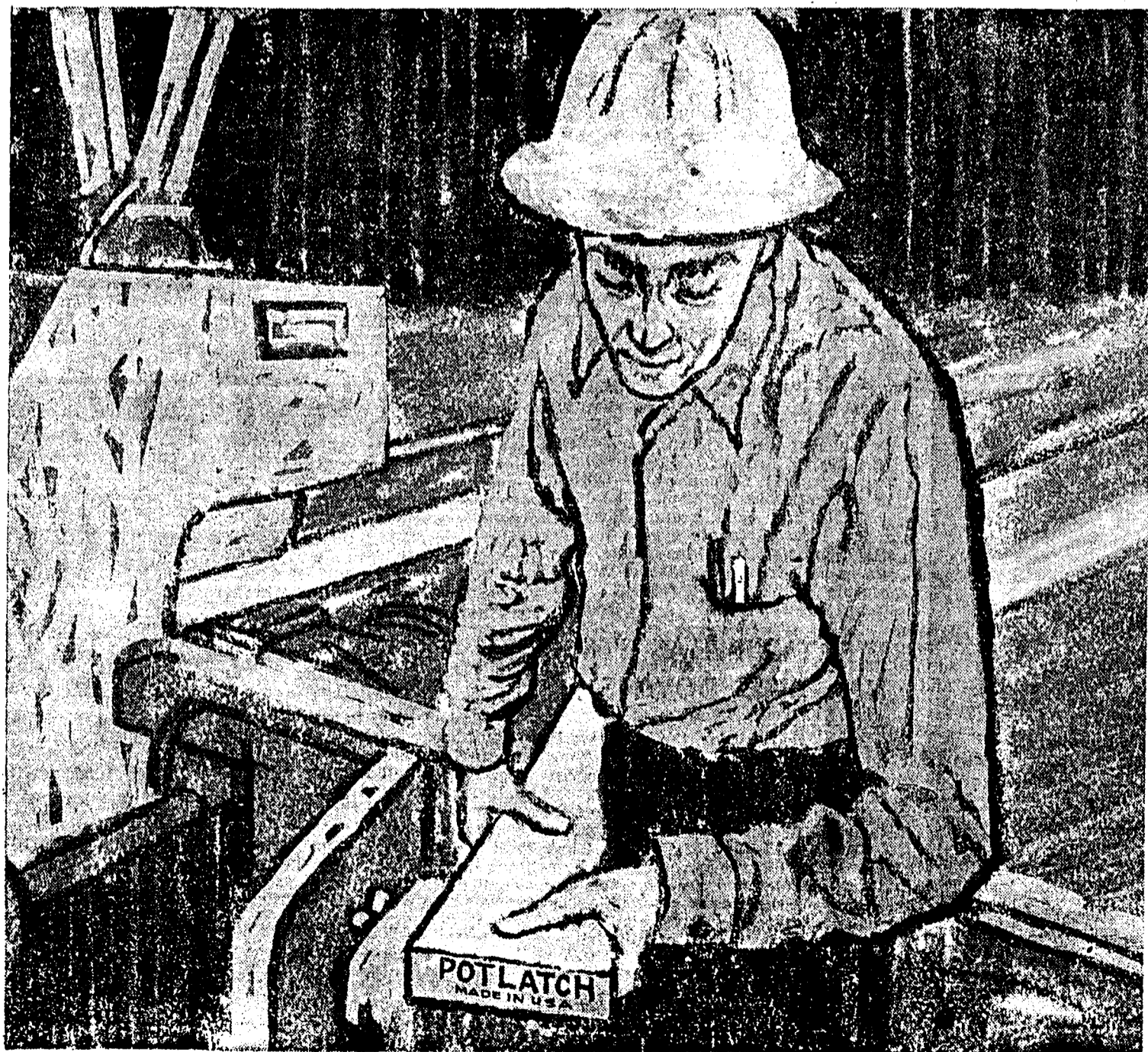

**WEED CONTROL
INCREASES YIELDS**

Moscow — Research proves weed control will increase crop yields, reports John Gaiser, Latah County Weed Supervisor.

Selective spraying of wheat with 2,4-D can add bushels to the wheat yield, and as an extra bonus, can increase pea yields the next year by several hundred pounds. The same results of yield increase work when peas are selectively sprayed with the dinitro chemicals. Gaiser points out that many farmers are holding weed loss to a minimum by using 2,4-D in wheat and dinitros in peas, along with I. P. C., Avadex and Carbyne for wild oat control. Weed control is getting to be a regular farming operation, like plowing, and is one practice that pays big dividends.

The season for practicing weed control in fall wheat is here, says Gaiser. Wheat should have at least five leaves and be six inches tall for the best control. Most farmers use 1½ to 2 pounds actual acid 2,4-D in 20 gallons of water, or nitrogen solution, per acre. Weeds are easier to kill when small

and waiting for ideal spraying weather can be a poor policy. Using too weak a 2,4-D solution can be a bad mistake as it will eliminate only the easy-to-kill weeds, and will allow the hard-to-kill weeds more room to flourish and produce seed for next year.

With many new chemicals on the market, Gaiser offers his services to farmers with weed control problems.

LATEST NECKWEAR**

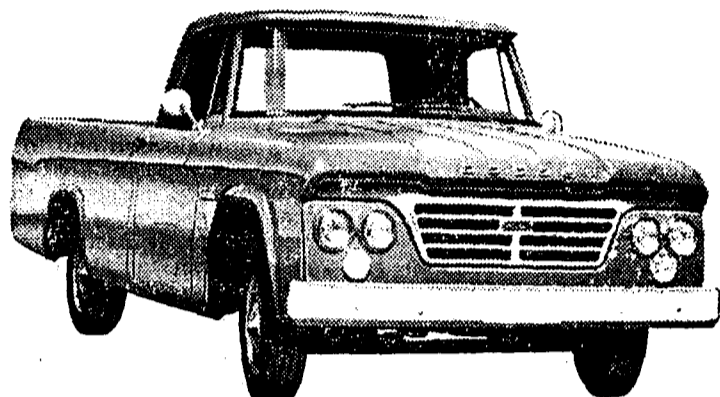

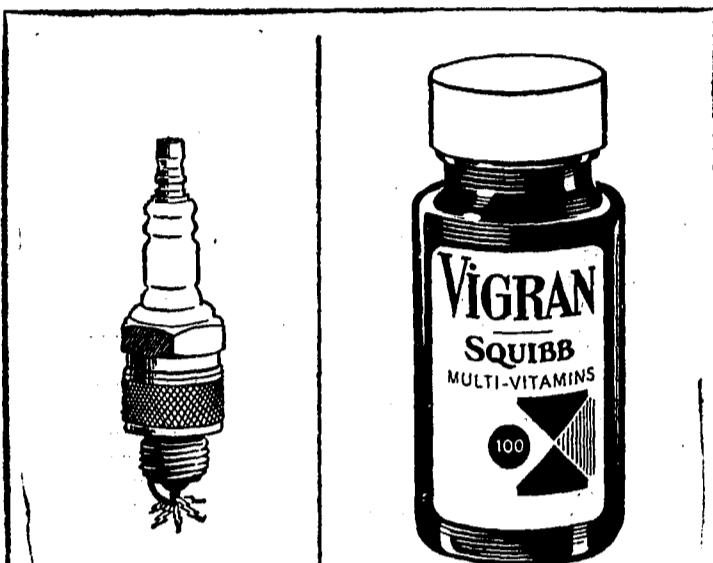
