HORSE SHOW IS SET FOR LEWISTON

Lewiston, Idaho — More than 150 of the finest Appaloosa horses in the Pacific Northwest will compete in the 10th annual Palouse Empire Appaloosa show here June 6 and 7. The show is sponsored by the Palouse Empire Appaloosa Horse Club and the Rotary Club of Lewiston.

Roy Parvin, Pullman, president of the Appaloosa Club, and Kermit H. Malcolm, Lewiston Rotary Club show chairman, noted that entries already have been received from Idaho, Oregon, Washington and Montana.

The show at the Lewiston Round-up grounds, class for halter classes Saturday at 9:00 a. m., junior events at 1:30 and performance classes at 7:30 p. m., with halter classes continuing Sunday at 9:00 a. m. and the final events of the performance classes Sunday at 1:30 p. m. All events are open to the public, with admission to be charged only at the Saturday evening and Sunday afternoon events.

Although the distinctive mottled flanks of the Appaloosa appear in Chinese and Persian art dating to 500 B. C., the horse was developed to a high standard of stamina, speed and sure-footedness as the war pony of the Nez Perce Indians during the 18th century. Probably imported by the Spanish into Mexico about 1600, Appaloosas were bred by the Nez Perces in great numbers in the sheltered canyons of the Snake, Clearwater and Palouse rivers. Its name seemingly is a corruption of the word "Palouse."

When the Palouse rangeland was put to the plow, Appaloosas dwindled in number. Their postwar resurgence is largely due to their excellence as "wilderness ponies."

The Appaloosa Club's share of the proceeds will be used for promotion and development of the breed. The Rotary Club's share will be used for the club's youth activities program. The show last was held in Lewiston in 1961.

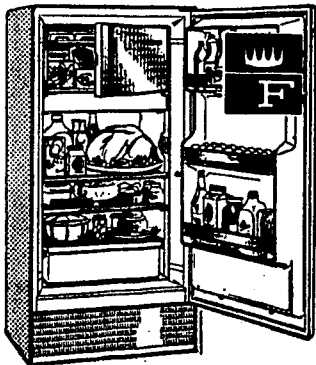

SAFETY CHECK HAS REAL INTEREST

Idaho communities are going all out to participate in the national Vehicle Safety-Check program during May and June, according to E.

R. Hopper, Commissioner of the Department of Law Enforcement.

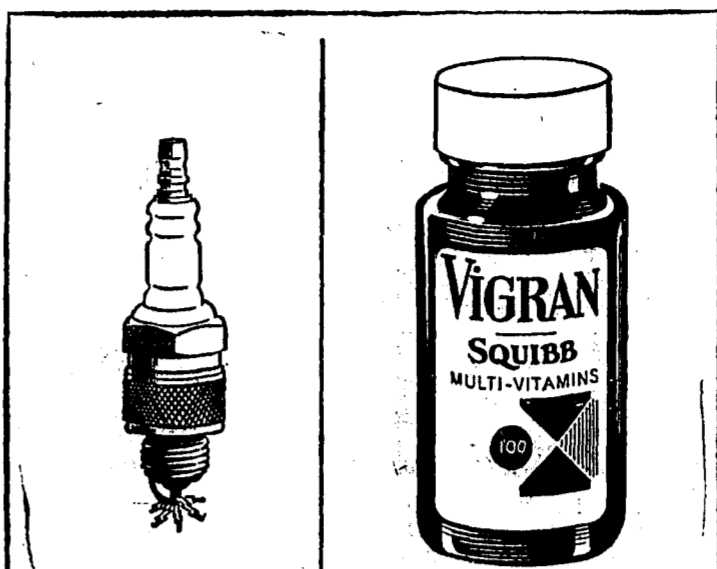
Hopper predicted that between 30 and 40 thousand passenger cars will be checked voluntarily in 45 different communities. The Commissioner reported that arrangements have been made with 26 Jaycee organizations Rotary, Lions and Exchange

clubs as well as police departments and mayors in all of the cities for at least one day for the voluntary Safety-Check program.

Carl Eurt, field man for the Department's Traffic Safety Division, has spent the past two weeks with Joe Fetzer, representing the Auto Industries Highway Safety Committee, in all parts of Idaho to complete arrangements for the program.

The Commissioner said that 10 items requiring checking are brakes, front lights and turn signals, rear lights and turn signals, steering, tires, exhaust system, glass, windshield wipers, rear view mirror and horn. "This work will be done without charge by local mechanics in each community," Hopper explained. Civic organizations, police and Boy Scouts have been enlisted to assist with traffic control and record keeping, he said.

Governor Robert E. Smylie has proclaimed May and June as Vehicle Safety-Check months in Idaho.

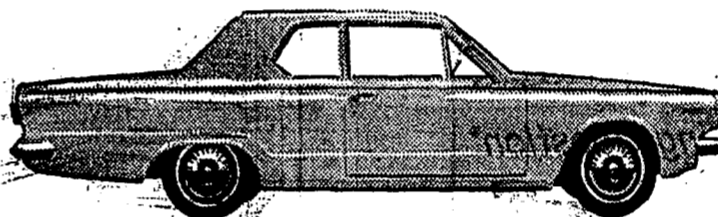

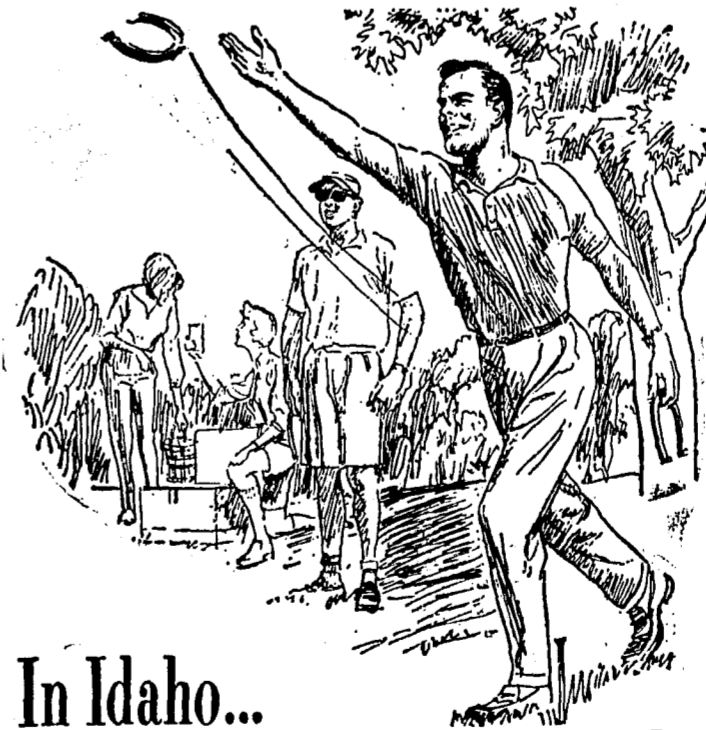

FOREST SERVICE SETS UP TWO NEW SCENIC AREAS

Missoula — Two new National Forest scenic areas have been established near the Canadian border, in northwestern Montana, Neal M. Rahm, northern region forester, announced this week.

Ten Lakes Scenic Area covers 6,641 acres in the Kootenai National Forest. In the Galton Range of the Whitefish mountains, with small glaciated basins, clear lakes and mountain meadows, it is about nine miles northeast of Eureka, Mont.

Northwest Peak Scenic Area covers 6,641 acres in the Kamiksus and Kootenai National Forests. Located in the Purcell mountains, the area is approximately 38 miles north of Troy, Montana, and 30 miles northeast of Bonners Ferry, Idaho.

"The areas were established under U. S. Department of Agriculture regulations as areas of outstanding, matchless beauty, which require special management to preserve these qualities," Rahm explained. "The areas will be maintained as nearly as possible in an undisturbed condition."

Prominent mountain peaks in the Ten Lakes Scenic area are Green Mountain (7,830 feet), Pogoniat Mountain, Independence Peak, Ksanika Peak and St. Clair Peak. The area provides summer range for mule deer and a few elk. Grizzly bear and mountain sheep have been reported in the area.

Small game includes blue grouse, Franklin grouse, marten, marmots and rock rabbits. Rainbow and cutthroat trout can be caught in Bluebird Lake, Wolverine lake and Rainbow Lake. There are five permanent lakes with a total area of 45 acres.

Chief recreation attractions in the Ten Lakes Scenic area are fishing, camping, hunting, horseback riding and hiking. Forest Service trails in the area will be improved. Unloading ramps and hitching racks have been installed at the end of the Bluebird and Wolverine trails. Garbage and toilet facilities will be installed at popular camping and picnicking spots.

The Northwest Peaks Scenic Area is high ridge country, embracing the headwaters of the West Fork of the Yaak river on the east and American Creek on the west. There are seven lakes in the area, extending over a total of 64 acres. Production of water and recreation are the two primary uses of this area. Rainbow and cutthroat trout are caught in Burk, Upper and Lower Hawkins lakes. There are white tail deer, mule deer, elk, mountain goats and bear in the area.
