## AREA PIONEER DIES AT SPOKANE

Walter Ennald Dahl, 84, East 628 22nd, Spokane, retired blacksmith and resident of Spokane and the Inland Empire 78 years, died July 1st in a Spokane hospital. Funeral services were held at Smith's with Rev. Raymond E. Blackstone of the Hamblen Park Presbyterian Church officiating. Interment was at Riverside Cemetery.

Born in Hillsboro, N. D., Mr. Dahl was brought to Spokane in 1886 at the age of 6 by his late parents, the E. J. Dahls. They were one of the first settlers at Park, Idaho. His parents and family later moved to Big Bear ridge where they farmed. Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Dahl were among the organizers of the Bethany Lutheran Church on Big Bear ridge.

Upon returning to Spokane in 1902 the father and son owned and operated the E. J. Dahl Shingle Mill on Havermale Island for a time. Later Walter Dahl had his own blacksmith shop on North Division.

An ardent fisherman and hunter Mr. Dahl spent much of his time at his summer home on Fend Oreille lake. His wife, Rhoda, passed away nine years ago.

Surviving in Spokane are a step-son, Jesse Hahn; a sister, Mrs. William Leland, a brother, Roy E. Dahl, and a sister in Knickerbocker, Texas. Mrs. Mellick Tweedy. He is also survived by numerous nieces and nephews. Mrs. Oscar Slind of Kendrick, is a niece.

## J. M. MEAD, 62, DIES AT LEWISTON MON. OF HEART ATTACK

John M. (Jack) Mead, 62, president of the Mead & Howard Lumber Co., Inc., at Juliaetta and Kendrick, and one of the areas most prominent business men, died Monday, July 6, at 2:00 p. m. at the St. Joseph's Hospital in Lewiston after suffering a heart attack. He had been ill for a few days.

Mr. Mead and his wife, the former Pearl Minister, whom he married at Sandpoint, Oct. 2, 1944, spent most of their married life in Idaho.

Mead was born May 31, 1902, at Cheney, Wash., where he lived until 1922. From 1922 to 1930 he lived at Spokane and worked at the sheriff's office.

In 1930 he moved to Coeur d'Alene, where he owned a grocery store and was a partner in the Lake City Investment Co. From 1944 to 1947 he lived at Hayden Lake, and in California, in semi-retirement, moving to Juliaetta in 1947, where he established the J. M. Mead Lumber Products Co., which later became Mead & Howard.

He was a director of the Western Forestry & Conservation Ass'n, a board member of the Timberman's Protective Ass'n, district representative of the Western Pine Ass'n, and a member of Calam Temple of the Shrine, York Rite of Knight Templar, the Kendrick Masonic Lodge, the Clarkston Golf & Country Club, and Early Birds of Spokane. He was a member of the Elks Lodge for 31 years, and belonged to the Presbyterian Church.

Survivors include his wife, Pearl, at the family home in Juliaetta; a daughter, Mrs. Lowell Thomas of Spokane; a step-daughter, Mrs. James Denholm of Coeur d'Alene; two sisters, Mrs. Ida Cameron and Mrs. Myrtle Barnhart, both of Spokane; three grandchildren and three step-grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held today (Thursday, July 9) at 10 a. m. at Brower-Wann Chapel, Lewiston. A committal service will be conducted by the Masonic Lodge at 3:00 p. m. at Coeur d'Alene Cemetery.

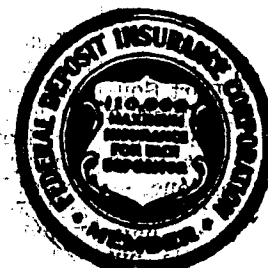

 In the afternoons we went on tours of Washington, D. C., where we saw all the monuments, the National Archives, the Library of Congress, the Supreme Court, and everything else we could crowd into six days.
