WEATHER? YES, IT REALLY WARMED UP

There's no doubt about it — the "good old summer time is really here!" It arrived the middle of last week, and has been very steadily "bearing down" since that time.

Thursday we had a reading on the "official thermometer" of 89 degrees; Friday it was up, reading 94 degrees; Saturday it read 98 degrees and Sunday — to cap the climax, 102 degrees!

Sunday night humidity began to increase, and a "muggy" atmosphere prevailed. At 10:00 o'clock Sunday evening the reading was still 84 degrees! However, under cloudy skies, there came a breeze, and by 11:00 o'clock the reading had dropped to 70 degrees and sleep was possible.

Monday, with over-cast skies, the reading went to 88 degrees, but humidity was higher than usual, and as one local resident put it, "It was really swell sweat-in' weather!"

Monday night and early Tuesday morning there came several brief spatters of rain — hardly enough to wet the pavement, and they had no effect on the temperature readings. Tuesday the thermometer recorded a high of 90 degrees.

Haying is the order of the day with farmers in this area, and they find this weather just right for the quick curing of hay, which is reported to be "excellent" in general.

Dee Magnuson, Water Safety Instructor at the Area Living War Memorial Pool in Kendrick announced Monday:

Many In Classes

Participation in the Red Cross lesson program neared the 200 mark during the first week, and attendance at the regular public swim sessions of the pool has increased. Parents Can Help

Parents can help their children in the swimming lessons program most by trusting completely in their child's teacher and instilling this confidence in their young swimmer. Children can be encouraged in their first efforts to learn to swim, but they can never be forced to learn to swim! Only after the youngster has a real desire to learn can he or she be taught to swim — too much pressure from home can have an adverse effect. However, the child must feel his parents are interested in his efforts, and parents and teacher can cooperate in the vital encouragement necessary to the beginning swimmer.

Please Mark Belongings

Parents are again reminded to mark their children's bathing suits, caps, towels, beach jackets, etc., so that they can be returned to the owners when left at the pool. During the first week of lessons approximately 50 different items have been forgotten in the morning rush during the lesson hours.

STANDARDS SET ON WHEAT GRADES

Moscow — Broken kernels in a load of wheat make a big difference in the grade, according to standards recently put into effect by the Department of Agriculture. Homer Futter, Latah county agent, reminded growers that grading on shrunken and broken kernels is more severe now than it has been in previous years. Shrunken kernels are usually the result of weather conditions, but broken kernels are commonly caused by harvesting operations. The careful use of machinery can reduce damage.

Wheat that has no more than three percent shrunken and broken kernels can make Grade One. If the amount is above three percent, the grade drops to Two. Five percent drops the grade to Three, and so-on to 12 percent, which is Grade Five. Over 20 percent, it is sample grade.

As the harvest progresses, the county agent said, this requirement is something for growers to note so that this kind of damage may be held to a minimum as the grain moves from the field to elevator.

M. GROSECLOSE, 86, JULIAETTA PIONEER, DIES FRIDAY, JULY 10

Marion G. Groseclose, 86, a pioneer resident of this area, died at 4:45 o'clock Friday afternoon at the home of his brother, Edward Groseclose, Juliaetta. Death was due to the infirmities of age.

He had been a resident of the Juliaetta-Arrow Junction area since April 22 of 1902. He was born on Aug. 6, 1877, at Ceres, Va., and moved to Arrow in 1902 with his parents. He later took up a homestead six miles west of Juliaetta. He farmed and raised Shorthorn cattle.

As time went by Mr. Groseclose acquired between 800 and 1,000 acres of timber and brush land in Clearwater county, 12 miles west of Orofino.

Groseclose attended schools at Ceres and Sharon College near that community. He was married to Estella Penland at Juliaetta. She died in 1946.

In February of 1952 Mr. Groseclose sold his cattle herd and a few years later his Clearwater county property. He had maintained his homestead until two years ago, when failing health required that he sell it. He had made his home with his brother the past two years.

He is also survived by another brother, Houston, also of Juliaetta.

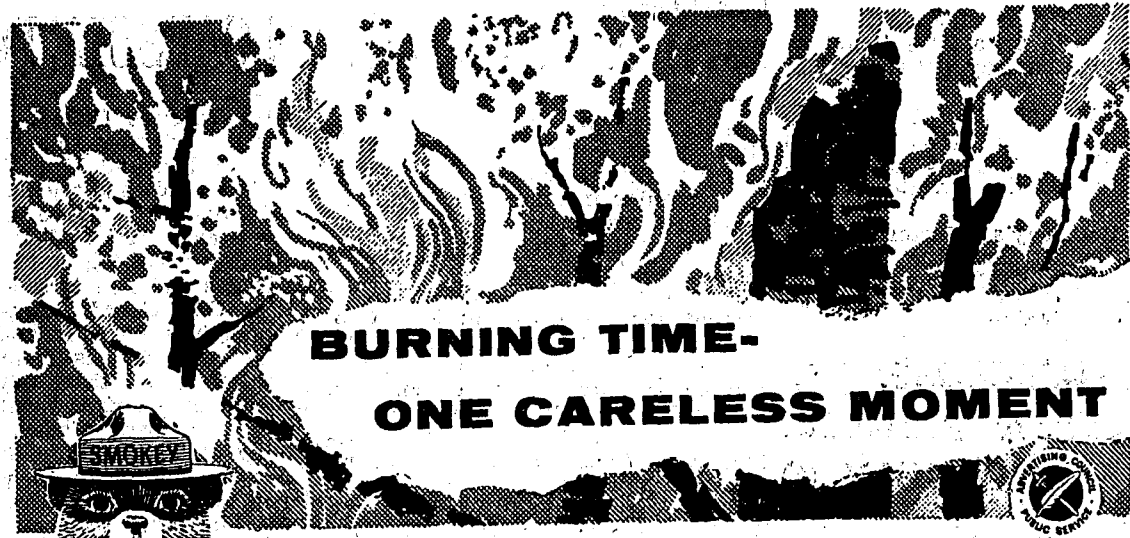

 - 5 drops liquid hot pepper sauce

To cook, add 2 tablespoons butter, oil, or meat drippings to beans and soaking water. Bring to boiling point. Reduce heat. Cover and simmer 1 hour. Then add remaining ingredients. Simmer, covered, for 1 and 1/2 hours or until beans are tender. Taste for added chili powder.

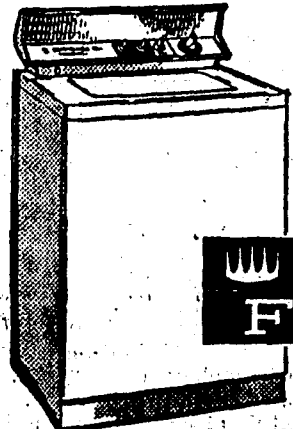

Boise — Farmers or partnerships operating two or more farms should consolidate all their farm-use gasoline purchases into a single claim to obtain their federal tax refunds.

Only one claim for the entire one-year period ending June 30 can be allowed to any individual or partnership, Internal Revenue officials say. An amended claim can be filed before Sept. 30 if the original one has not been paid. However, once the original claim has been paid a subsequent one cannot be allowed.

Federal gas tax refunds are made annually to farmers for non-highway use agricultural purposes on claims filed between July 1 and Sept. 30.

W. W. P. PAYS HUGE TAX BILL

Representatives of the Washington Water Power Company will deliver checks totaling \$959,661.35 to the treasurers of nine Idaho counties this week, in payment of the utility's last-half (1963) property tax bill.

William A. Lowery, District Manager for W. W. P., said that the company's total 1963 Idaho property tax bill will amount to \$1,922,911.77. Tax payments will range from \$45,000 in Lewis county to almost \$640,000 in Bonner county, he said. "Our Idaho property tax bill is up more than \$145,000 over what the company paid last year."

W. W. P. is the largest taxpayer in seven of the nine Idaho counties in which it owns generating or distribution properties. It is one of the largest taxpayers in the State of Idaho. The company has estimated that it takes the total revenue from all of its 130,000 residential electric customers for the first five months of each year to pay its annual Federal, State and Local tax bill.

W. W. P.'s first-half Idaho property tax payments, with the 1963 totals in parentheses, are as follows: Benewah county \$29,000 (\$58,005); Bonner county \$319,844 (\$639,689); Clearwater county \$29,073 (\$58,146); Idaho county \$34,713 (\$69,426); Kootenai county \$175,509 (\$351,018); Latah county \$78,763 (\$157,526); Lewis county \$24,066 (\$48,133); Nez Perce county \$178,309 (\$356,618); Shoshone county \$90,388 (\$180,776).

PROPOSE NEW WILDERNESS PARK

San Francisco, Calif. - Floyd Iverson, regional forester of the U. S. Forest Service and Ed Hummel, regional director of the National Park Service, have announced that their agencies are beginning a joint study of the Sawtooth Mountain area in Idaho.

It was noted that Fred Overly, regional director of the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation, will send representatives to participate in certain phases of the study. The National Park Service and Bureau of Outdoor Recreation are bureaus in the Department of the Interior. The Forest Service is under the administration of the Department of Agriculture.

Legislation proposing that a Sawtooth Wilderness National Park be established in the area, which is a part of the Sawtooth, Boise and Challis National Forests has made the new study necessary, according to the two agencies. Field representatives will analyze the capabilities of these lands to produce public benefits and recommend to the respective bureaus the status and management that will best realize these potentials. It is expected that the study will be completed within a year. The Sawtooth Mountains were inspected from both the air and ground by bureau representatives.

U. OF I. OFFERS TIPS FOR BETTER EGGS
Moscow — As the weather gets warmer, poultrymen will do well to watch closely some of the important practices that influence egg quality. Frequent gathering, immediate cooling and early marketing are recommended by Robert Black, poultry specialist of the University of Idaho extension service. Adequate facilities, handling equipment and handling methods are necessary.
The temperature and humidity determine whether eggs maintain high quality or lose it quickly, Black says. High temperature causes the rapid thinning of egg albumen because of the loss of carbon dioxide. Low humidity, particularly with high temperature, results in enlarged egg cells. Both contribute to the downgrading of eggs.
Temperatures of 50 to 55 degrees and relative humidity of 70 to 80 are most desirable.
These essentials for production and maintenance of high quality eggs are listed: Clean, dry litter in the laying house. Clean, dry nesting material. Not fewer than one nest for every four layers. Egg collection at least three times a day, and four times daily in hot weather. Wire baskets are preferred. Collected eggs should be moved immediately to the cooler.
Keep layers confined all the time. Feed high quality rations. Feeding affects quality in terms of yolk color, shell quality and egg flavor. Certain feeds such as corn and alfalfa meal contain carotene and xanthophyll pigments that affect egg color and may indirectly affect the grade. Shell and interior egg quality decline as laying hens get old.

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
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
