DEATH CLAIMS A JULIAETTA PIONEER RESIDENT, AUG. 5

Alvin (Mike) Nye, 56, a lineman for the Clearwater Power Co., and a resident of Clarkston for 20 years, died of a heart attack at the Tri-State Memorial Hospital in Clarkston at 6:40 p. m. Aug. 5. He had been ill just two days.

He was born Jan. 16, 1908, at Juliaetta, a son of Fred and Edna Nye. He was educated at Juliaetta and grew to maturity there.

He was employed as a lineman by the Clearwater Power Co. at Juliaetta in 1941, and had worked for the firm since. In 1944 he was transferred to Clarkston, where the family home was maintained.

He married Arlee Fix at Juliaetta, Sept. 2, 1932. She survives at the family home. Other survivors include two sons, Robert, Campbell, Calif.; and Melvin, Clarkston, a daughter, Mrs. Doris Grow, Lewiston; a brother, Lloyd, Juliaetta; three sisters, Mrs. Samuel Haddock, Moscow, Mrs. Einar Twest, Mandan, N. D., and Mrs. Onal Cope, Juliaetta, and seven grandchildren.

Funeral services were held at 11 a. m., Saturday, Aug. 8, at the Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel in Lewiston. Officiating was the Rev. Arlie T. Whybark of the United Brethren Church, Clarkston. Interment was in the Fix Ridge Cemetery, Juliaetta.

Music was furnished by Mrs. DeVoe Miller, who played the organ and sang. Honorary pallbearers were: Art Elben, Harvie Shepherd, Ted Moody, Howard Gibbs, Max Stewart and Dan Braach. Active bearers were Wallace Clark, Blake Jones, Delbert Turner, Everett Millard, Ralph Millard and Dale Turner.

60TH ANNIVERSARY OF GREAT FIRE

Wednesday morning, Aug. 5th, at 11:30 o'clock, the Gazette received a phone call from Wade T. Keene at Lewiston, announcing that it was just 60 years ago, almost to the hour that the great fire began (1904) in which Kendrick was almost completely destroyed.

Mr. Keene said the fire began in a frame building on about the spot where Blewett's Store now is located — and that burning embers, pieces of shingles, etc., spiraling high in the air, came to earth as far away as Central ridge and Genesee. He added that when the evening train came in from Lewiston it brought in a big shipment of cold beer, and within a few minutes "Judge" Terry was selling that beer from a tent near where the Kendrick Garage now stands.

FINAL SECTION OF SCOUT REPORT

Reaching the Gazette too late for last week's publication, here is the final installment on the big Boy Scout Jamboree trip by Gary Renfrow:

July 19 — It started raining about noon. We had to dig ditches around our tents because it was raining so hard, but the water ran into the tent anyhow, because it was raining so hard. It washed out the grass around us and made a mud hole of the alley between the troop's camps. We had a mud fight that lasted about an hour. During this time the Jamboree photographer shot one side of a roll of movie film on that mud fight.

July 20 — The tents were all taken down by noon. After dinner we S-O-S'd the grills, pots, pans, and the charcoal broilers. After this we took the quartermaster and latrine tents down. Then we packed all of the items we were taking home with us into one patrol box. At 3 o'clock we packed all our equipment to the moving van that was waiting for us.

I had the honor of being one of 102 Boy Scouts chosen to represent the 50,000 Scouts at the Jamboree to lower the National and State flags for the President of the United States of America, who gave us a special talk on "Scouting." When the program was over we lighted 50,000 candles.

July 21 — We rode the train to Chicago, where we stopped, enjoyed a swim at Montrose Beach, then finished the trip home.

Special Note — At Valley Forge we had to put cotton in our ears at night because beetles would crawl into them if we didn't. We had shade trees in our part of camp — the rest of the area having but a very few.

We (the correspondents) for our Lewis-Clark area, won a tape recorder for the Lewis-Clark Council, and I also won and "Adventure" Award.
