FARMERS BANK IS SOLD TO FIRST SECURITY BANK

Salt Lake City, Utah, Aug. 19 — First Security Bank of Idaho, National Association, has received final approval from the Comptroller of the Currency for the acquisition of The Farmers Bank of Kendrick. The announcement was made by V. R. Steffensen, president of First Security Bank of Idaho.

Mr. Steffensen said the bank will be known as the Kendrick office of First Security Bank of Idaho. A. O. Kanikbeberg, a long-time Kendrick banker, will serve as manager of the bank and L. D. Crocker will become assistant manager.

Commenting on the acquisition of the bank, Mr. Steffensen said: "We are pleased that approval from Washington now permits the joining of our banks which has been pending for some time."

"Our operations in northern Idaho, which are already extensive, will be enhanced by the opportunity to serve the Kendrick and surrounding area. Our strong interests and considerable experience in agriculture in the region will permit First Security to continue the fine service which The Farmers Bank of Kendrick has provided for many years to this productive region of the state.

"In addition, we will be bringing to the Kendrick area the complete full service banking which it provides throughout the Intermountain West," Mr. Steffensen said.

Mr. Kanikbeberg said he was pleased that the long tradition of banking service to the people of Kendrick and surrounding areas will be continued.

Commenting on the merger of the two banks, Mr. Kanikbeberg said: "It will be of real value to the community to have a large and progressive banking organization such as First Security serving the people of the Kendrick area."

GEORGE R. PETERS DIES IN CAR PLUNGE

Coeur d'Alene, Aug. 18 — Kootenai County Coroner Dr. William T. Wood said that a 43-year-old St. Maries man, whose pickup Monday plunged into the waters of Lake Coeur d'Alene's Beauty Bay, died of an "apparent heart attack."

Wood said he had advised the family of George R. Peters to have an autopsy performed. State police said there were no skid marks where his pickup truck veered off U. S. Highway 95A and tumbled down a steep bank into the lake. They said there was no indication Peters had tried to escape from the cab or that he had been knocked unconscious.

Skin divers recovered his body from the truck cab. State police said Peters death will not be added to the Idaho 1964 traffic fatality toll. — Lewiston Tribune.

Mr. Peters was a son-in-law of Mrs. Sylvia O. Peters, Spokane, and a brother-in-law of Gordon Peters of Kendrick. His wife is the former Bernadine Peters. He is also survived by a son, Kim Robert. 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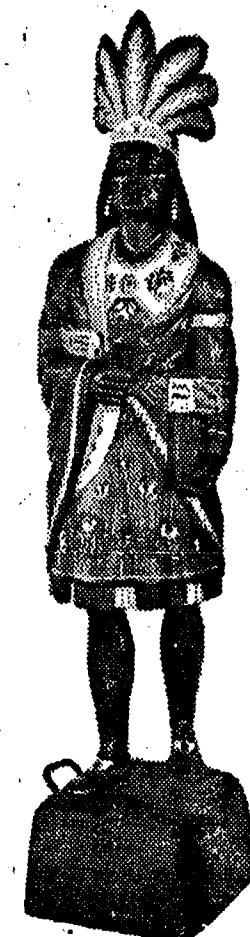

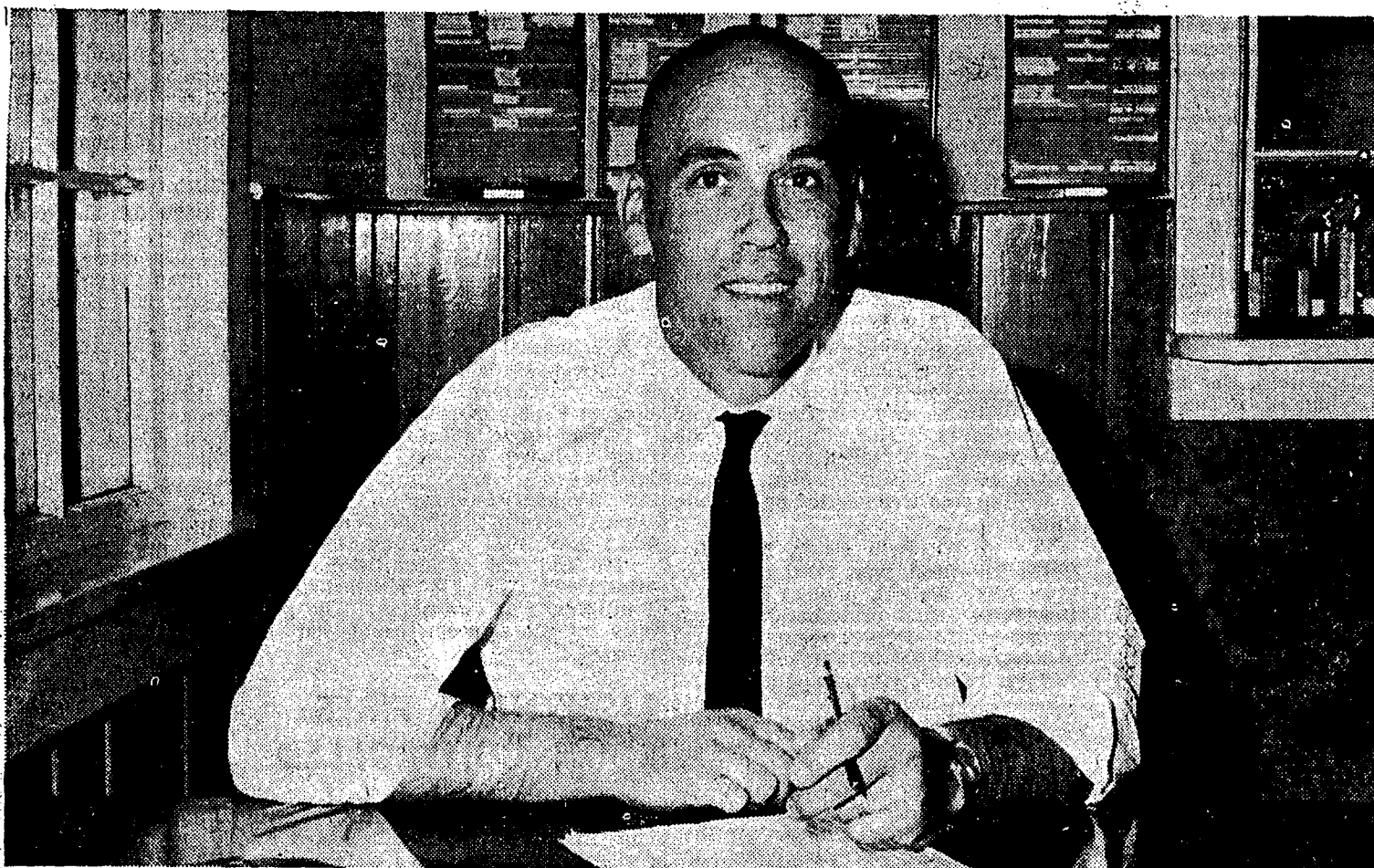

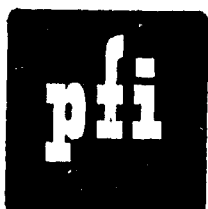

J. EDGAR HOOVER WRITES ABOUT FLEEING FELONS

(By J. Edgar Hoover)

Fleeing felons seeking remote sanctuaries to escape justice for their misdeeds, have always been a perplexing problem to law enforcement. Aside from the obvious threat to public safety and the increased burden on police agencies, these fugitives create other difficulties. For one thing, their success in avoiding capture and punishment encourages others to defy law and order.

Recognizing the growing menace of such far-ranging hoodlums, Congress in 1961 enacted a new law to extend the Fugitive Felon Act. Previously the FBI could assist local authorities in the investigation and apprehension of fugitives who fled across state lines to avoid prosecution, custody or confinement for certain specified violations. Under the expanded legislation the FBI is permitted to work with local and state agencies to effect the apprehension of any fugitive who flees across state lines to avoid prosecution, custody or confinement after conviction for a crime, or an attempt to commit a crime, punishable by death, or which is a felony under the laws of the place from which the fugitive flees.

The significance of the strengthening of this weapon against elusive, fast-moving fugitives can best be illustrated by noting the results obtained. During fiscal year 1961 and prior to the action taken by Congress, 1,418 fugitives were located by the FBI for local and state law enforcement agencies. In fiscal year 1963 this number jumped to 2,514, an all-time high.

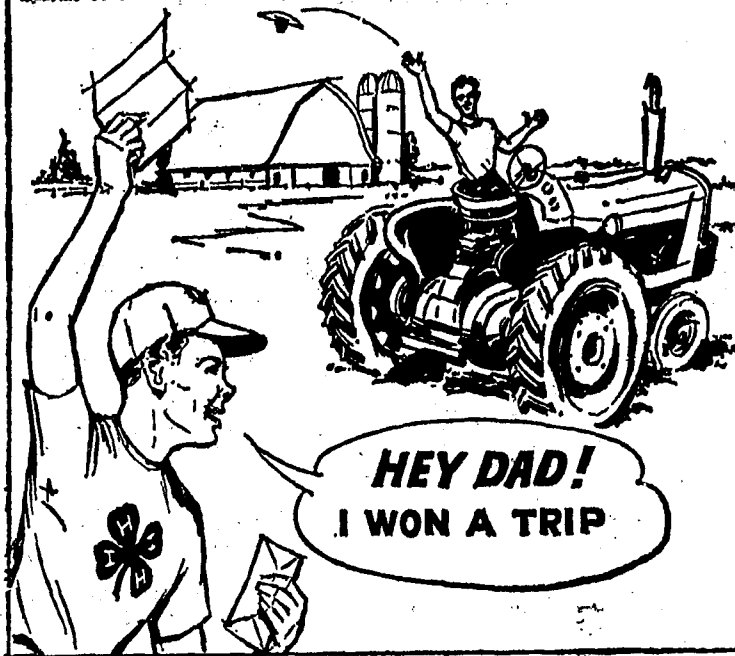
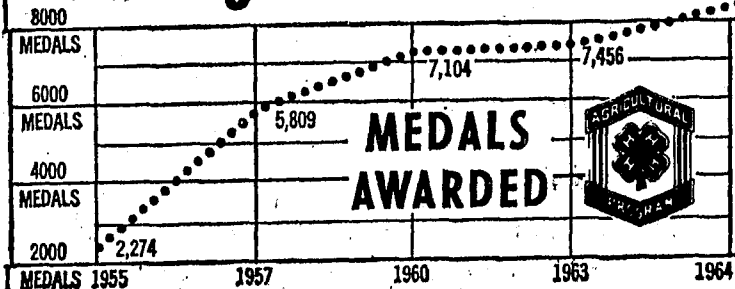
For example, one large metropolitan police department requested the FBI to assist in the location and arrest of a medical doctor who had fled the state to avoid prosecution for abortion and was a strong suspect in the murder of the abortion victim. Under the old provisions of the Fugitive Felon Act, the FBI would have been powerless to act, as the crime of abortion was not among the violations specifically named. However, under the new provisions, investigation was begun immediately. The FBI traced the doctor's flight to a European country where arrangements were made with the foreign authorities for his arrest and extradition. Subsequently the doctor was convicted in state court of a second-degree murder.

While there has been an appreciable increase in the number of fleeing fugitives located since the Act was expanded, it is believed the full potential of the provision is yet to be realized. In an endeavor to spotlight the maximum effectiveness of this law, a special series of FBI Law Enforcement Conferences is currently being held throughout the country.

300% Increase In 4-H Agricultural Awards



It will soon be awards time in 4-H, and this year should see nearly 3,000 winners added to the steadily growing list of top-rated agricultural club members.

Fifty of the 800,000 boys and girls enrolled in the national 4-H Agricultural program will win a free trip to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago next November. Six will receive a \$500 scholarship and the remainder will merit county medals.

Delegates to the Congress will help to celebrate 10 years of sponsorship by International Harvester in this particular program. However, the company has supported 4-H in several areas since 1919, according to the National 4-H Service Committee.

Agricultural projects undertaken by 4-H'ers throughout the state help to improve the home farm and to prepare the way for future jobs on and off the farm.

Local 4-H Club leaders, county and state extension workers, parents and residents of the community all have a share in helping the youngsters select and complete one of the many projects in the agricultural program.

The county extension office can supply additional information about joining a 4-H Club or organizing a new one.

TRUCK TAX DUE

Boise — Aug. 31 is the deadline for truckers to pay the federal highway use tax, say Internal Revenue officials. C. H. Edmison, IRS administrative officer, said the tax varies from \$81 to \$180 depending on the weight of the truck, and is for the year beginning July 1.

He explained that for trucks put into use after July, a fractional tax must be paid within the month following. For example: On a truck first used in August, the tax to next June 30 is due by September 30.

U. OF I. ARTISTS WORK AT PAINTING

U. of I., Moscow — Showing saleable goods within a corral would usually indicate that the product was animal in nature. Not so at Stanley, recently, where cars blocked the roadway as patrons inspected and bought the works of participants in the eighth annual University of Idaho Workshop on Wheels.

Sparkling paintings by water color enthusiasts and deep shadowed canvases by oil painters decorated the inner walls of a cattle corral at Stanley. The artists were displaying their works following a three-week traveling course in painting.

According to Prof. Theodore J. Prichard, head of the department of art and architecture, the university's two nationally known painting professors, Mary B. Kirkwood, teaching oil, and water-colorist Alfred C. Dunn, returned to the university after one of the most successful workshop outings since its inception in 1956. More than 100 persons participated in the course.

Making three stops, one each week throughout the state, the workshop began in Harrison. Thirty-four students registered there for the course that permits study for college credit. Accomplished and beginning painters alike spent their time doing works of lake and river scenes.

A week later the traveling workshop set up camp on the shores of Payette Lake at McCall. From there the artists took side trips to a ghost town, glacial lakes and flower covered mountain meadows, providing them with an array of scenic beauty to capture in pigment.

Following the week-long stay at

McCall, where 34 more students signed for painting instructions, the workshop moved its final location to Stanley. Later more than 50 painters registered to paint the majestic Sawtooth mountains.

Participants in the workshop came from all parts of the United States, Canada and Mexico.

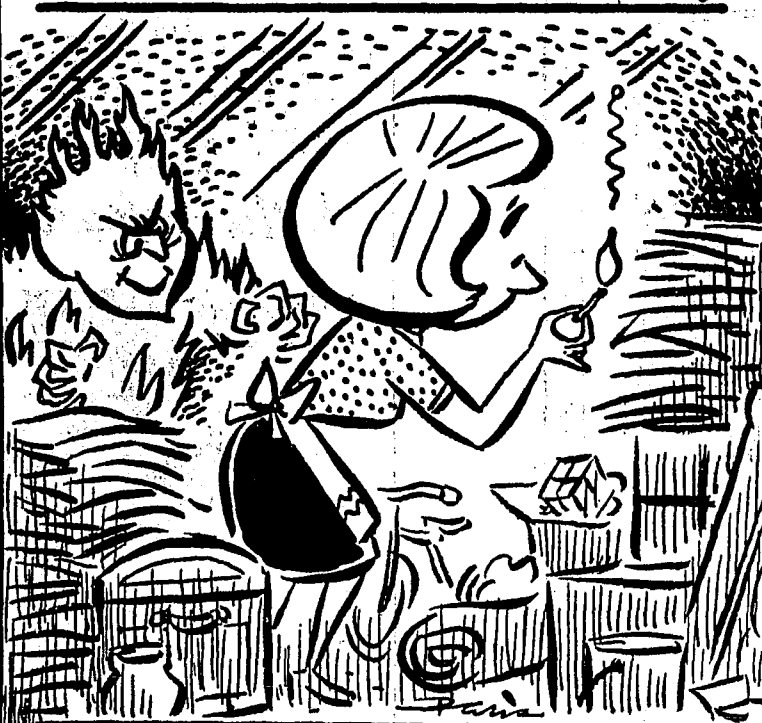

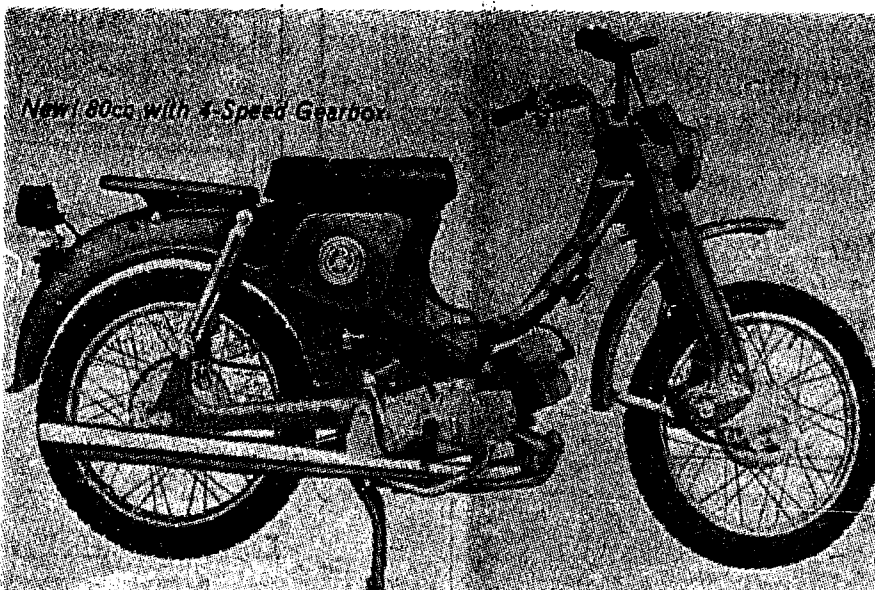

NOTICE TO PARENTS AND GUARDIANS OF SCHOOL AGE CHILDREN

In compliance with the requirements of 33-203, notice is hereby given that: In all school districts of this state, every parent or guardian of any child between the ages of seven and sixteen years, shall cause such child to be instructed in certain specified subjects. Every such parent or guardian shall cause such child to attend a public, private or parochial school, during a period equal to that portion of each year during which the public schools are in session in such district, and shall cause such child to conform to the attendance regulations established by the board of trustees of such school district.

When a duly licensed physician or psychiatrist shall certify in writing that the physical or mental condition of a child is such that it does not permit attendance at school and upon a finding by the board of trustees that the best interests of the child or the school will be served by exempting such child from attendance, then the board of trustees may grant such exemption during the continuance of such disability. A petition for exemption for such cause may be initiated by the child or by its parent or guardian.

Before the board of trustees may exempt any child who is an habitual truant whose conduct would disrupt school order or discipline, the board shall notify the parents or guardian and afford them an opportunity to appear and show cause why the exemption should not be granted. When exempted for such cause, the probate court shall be notified, and said child shall come under the purview of the youth rehabilitation law.
